Undergraduate Programs

The academic program at UNC is organized into two colleges; College of Arts and Sciences, and College of Education, and five schools; The School of Arts, The School of Business, The School of Music, The School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, and The School of Nursing. Majors are offered within the following: Arts and Sciences, Teaching Professions, and Applied and Professional Studies. Three undergraduate degrees are available: B.A., B.S., and B.M.

Majors are offered in the teaching profession by numerous academic departments. Students studying for teacher certification must apply for admission to the Professional Teacher Education Program prior to their junior year. Courses applicable to pre-law, pre-medicine, pre-dentistry, and pre-engineering are designed for students who want to begin their studies at UNC.

Since the university operates on a four-quarter basis, all programs of study are available to the summer student. The four-quarter plan helps a student complete his undergraduate requirements for graduation in three years, if he elects a program of continuous study.

Graduate Programs

The Graduate School offers five advanced degree programs leading to the Master of Arts (M.A.), Specialist in Education (Ed.S.), Doctor of Arts (D.A.), Doctor of Education (Ed.D.), and Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.).

Detailed information concerning advanced degrees may be obtained by consulting the 1972-73 Graduate School Catalog or by writing Dr. A. R. Reynolds, Dean of the Graduate School, UNC 80631.

Master of Arts

The Master of Arts degree may be earned in three summer quarters of full-time study. The master's degree is awarded upon completion of a minimum of 45 quarter hours of credit. Candidates must be on campus, enrolled as full-time students for two quarters (*at least ten weeks and 10 quarter hours per quarter*), to satisfy the minimum residence requirement.

The Master of Arts degree is offered by the following departments or disciplines: Anthropology¹; Biological Science; Botany; Business; Chemistry; Curriculum and Instruction; Economics¹; Educational Administration; Educational Media; Elementary Education; English; Fine Arts; Geography¹; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; History; Home Economics; Industrial Arts; Mathematics; Music; Physical Science; Physics; Political Science¹; Psychology, Counseling and Guidance; Reading; Science Education; Social Science; Sociology¹; Special Education; Speech Communication and Journalism; Theatre Arts; and Zoology.

Specialist in Education

The Specialist in Education degree is a one-year program beyond the master's degree, assuming that the area of specialization is compatible with the undergraduate and Master of Arts major.

Doctor of Arts

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the Doctor of Arts Degree is designed to prepare a student for a life time of creative teaching at the junior (community) or senior college level together with a supplementary commitment to research. All candidates are required to spend three consecutive quarters in residence in full-time study (*at least ten weeks and 10 quarter hours per quarter*). The University operates four full quarters per year (Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer). A student must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, he must write and defend an acceptable dissertation.

Doctor of Education

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the Doctor of Education degree requires course work and research of a professional nature. All candidates are required to spend three consecutive quarters in residence in full-time study (*at least ten weeks and 10 quarter hours per quarter*). The University operates four full quarters per year (Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer). A student must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, he must write and defend an acceptable dissertation.

Doctor of Philosophy

A two-year program beyond the master's degree or a three-year program beyond the baccalaureate degree, the Doctor of Philosophy degree requires course work and research to prepare graduate students for creative and meaningful teaching at the college level in one of the following areas: College Student Personnel Work; and Research and Statistical Methodology.

1. The departments of Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Science, and Sociology offer a Master of Arts degree in Social Science. The student may concentrate in the discipline of his choice.

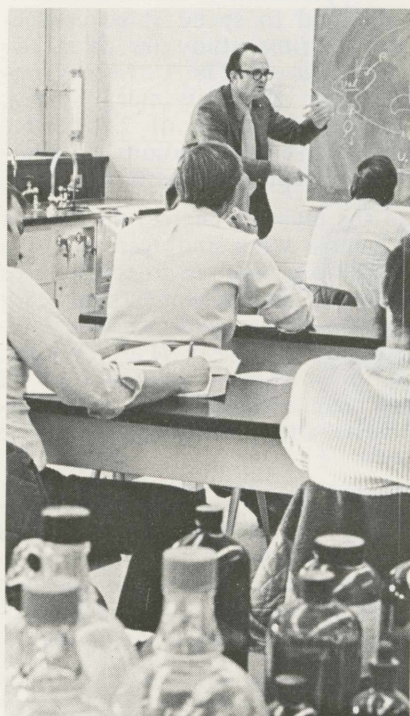

The Trustees for the State Colleges in Colorado, the governing body for the University of Northern Colorado, reserves the right to alter charges when necessary but will ordinarily do so not later than 30 days prior to the first date for registration for a summer quarter.



Required tuition and fees are collected at registration under the terms listed below. Charges are applicable to each enrollment for partial or full study, for Colorado or non-Colorado residence classification, and for credit or non-credit enrollment.

Assessed charges are due and payable at the time shown on the billing which is mailed to the student each quarter.

Additional Fees

Fees for added services, individual instruction, independently funded programs and for courses requiring laboratory or field trip expenses will be paid in a manner jointly specified by the instructor and Accounting Office. Extra charges are incurred for programs leading to the Specialist in Education and Doctoral degrees. Consult the 1972-73 Undergraduate or Graduate School Catalog for all itemizations of extra fees and assessments. No graduate phasing fees will be altered or re-funded if a registrant fails to pursue his program or for any reason drops out of the course of study into which he has been accepted.

Scholarships

Nearly all scholarships or waivers of tuition issued apply only to the fall, winter and spring quarters. Holders of special scholarships having questions about their prospective awards should inquire about their status to the respective departments authorized to confirm their award or to the Office of Financial Aids.

Resident, Non-Resident Status

Determination of status as a resident of Colorado for tuition paying purposes is fixed at registration. Colorado Revised Statutes 1966 and Session Laws of Colorado 1967 as amended fix state regulations which apply for all state institutions of higher education in Colorado.

Refunds Policy

To be eligible for a refund of any kind, the student must present a formal, approved Notice of Withdrawal or an Add-Drop Slip at the Accounting Office. Forms may be obtained from the Records Office.

Partial refunds for full-quarter classes are granted only for early withdrawals. No refund will be granted for special, short-period classes after the first meeting of the class. Please consult the 1972-73 Undergraduate or Graduate School Catalog for the specific refund policies of the University.

Admissions

Policy

Students applying for admission to the University of Northern Colorado for Summer Quarter should complete and return the form on page 49. Additional information required as part of application for admission depends upon the status of the students as defined below. Inquiries concerning the graduate program or graduate admissions should be directed to the Dean of the Graduate School. Undergraduates should contact the Director of Admissions for application forms. The application for the baccalaureate and master's degrees and for the graduate student certification program must be accompanied by a \$10.00 transcript evaluation fee.

Graduate Students

The University requires that the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test (verbal and quantitative) scores accompany the doctoral application. If a student's score is below the minimum acceptable score in the Aptitude Test, he will be denied admission to the doctoral program. Students seeking a graduate degree from the University of Northern Colorado may transfer eight quarter hours toward a Master of Arts or Specialist in Education degree and 12 quarter hours toward a Doctoral degree. If the work is acceptable to all members of the Oral Comprehensive Examination Committee, a doctoral student may transfer an additional 23 quarter hours of work.

Transfer Students

The University accepts a maximum of 135 quarter hours transfer credits on undergraduate programs. Credit earned at a junior or community college after completion of the sophomore year, or beyond 90 quarter hours will not be transferable. All degree-seeking students must submit an official Application for Admission, a transcript of high school studies, two transcripts of previous college work and a health report. Application forms may be obtained by writing to the Director of Admissions.

Freshmen

Students who are entering college for the first time should write to the Director of Admissions for information and application forms. To be eligible to apply for admission, students must graduate in the upper one-half of their class or have scores on the American College Test which are at or above national averages. Other minimal admission standards are defined in the Undergraduate catalog.

Special Students

An undergraduate student planning to attend the University of Northern Colorado for the Summer Quarter **only** must return the appropriate forms on pages 48 and 49. Attendance for the summer quarter does not assure admission for subsequent quarters. Official application for admission must be made if the student plans to continue his degree program at the University of Northern Colorado.

Housing

Single

University housing is available in residence halls for single men and women. All accommodations in the residence halls include room and board. The rooms are arranged to accommodate two persons per room.

Room and Board (includes applicable state and local taxes): minimum, \$298.00; maximum, \$333.00.

Family

The University has a limited amount of family housing in two residence halls containing housekeeping facilities for married students with one or two children or for couples without children.

Rooms only, with kitchenette: Harrison Hall, \$235.00; Turner Hall, \$250.00.

Off-Campus

Many students find rooms, apartments and houses in the Greeley area. Room and apartment listings are available to any student who desires to contact the Housing Office. Arrangements for accommodations with private householders cannot be made by the Housing Office, but must be conducted by the student directly with the landlord. Students and landlords are both advised to have a clear understanding, preferably in writing, as to facilities, privileges, prices and intended length of tenancy.

Application for Campus Housing

If after applying, the student desires to cancel his application for either single or family housing in the residence halls for Summer Quarter, he should notify the Director of Housing, in writing. The following policy will apply:

Cancellations for Summer Quarter received before May 15, 1972, \$25 will be refunded. THERE ARE NO REFUNDS FOR APPLICATIONS MADE AND THEN CANCELLED AFTER May 15, 1972.

Registration

General Instructions

Proper registration is the responsibility of each student. No person may register for another student. The University does not have facilities for registering "IN ABSENTIA" or at times other than those designated in these instructions. Students should read the catalog and know course requirements, and register for both regular classes and workshops at the same time. Students attending workshops only must register in person before the first class session.

Classes begin June 14. No registration for 10-week classes will be permitted after 12:00 noon, June 20. ALL HOLDS MUST BE CLEARED BEFORE REGISTRATION.

Contact Adviser

After obtaining your supplies, contact your adviser in his office on June 12-13 (except undergraduate majors in Anthropology, Business, Economics, Elementary Education, Geography, History, Political Science, Psychology and Sociology). If you do not know who your adviser is, please go to the departmental office of your major. All cards must be completed and the Emergency Locator-Second Preference Card must be signed by your adviser before you will be permitted to register. Second Preference courses should be approved ALTERNATE COURSES (not sections).

Unclassified Graduate Students and those not following a degree program will report to Student Council Room, University Center, on June 12-13 for clearance. None of the work taken by a graduate student who is enrolled in an unclassified status may be counted in meeting the minimum residence requirements.

Report to the appropriate department stations in the Ballroom, University Center, to pick up the class cards. If you have a schedule conflict, a faculty member "trouble shooter" will be available to assist you. If a course is closed for which you are registering, the Second Preference Courses Schedule will be used to make up a complete schedule. Undergraduate students may not enroll for 600-700 level courses. All courses for which you are registering must show on the Emergency Locator Card and be initialed by the authorized departmental representative. This is your official study program. Proceed to the Checking Stations to leave your packet.

Fee Payment

Veterans on G.I. Bill and students with Financial Aid (Vocational Rehabilitation and ALL scholarships and grants) report to Office of Financial Aid, Frasier Hall, Room 101 during the week of Registration. Students will be billed for fees and tuition on or about June 23, 1972, at rates per credit hour as approved at that time and according to their current resident status. Students must present all copies of the Bill to the Accounting Office according to their scheduled day as shown on the Bill. Payment of the amount due should be made on this day.

A fee of \$5.00 the first day and \$2.00 for each additional day will be charged.

Arrange deferrals in Room 8, Frasier Hall (bring your Bill).

Students registering for 10-week courses who complete registration after June 13 will be assessed a late registration fee at the rate of \$5.00 the first day and \$2.00 each additional day.

Workshops

Registration for workshops may be completed during regular registration, June 12-13, or at the Records Office, Frasier 126, after June 13, on the first day of the particular workshop offered. Students must register in person before the first class session. It is the student's responsibility to learn when his first class meets.

A student may register for a class for no credit by paying appropriate tuition and fees. No audit or visitors cards are issued—only "no credit" cards.

Graduation

10:00 a.m., Saturday, August 12, in the Garden Theatre. Students are encouraged to attend graduation. Those who choose not to participate must notify the Office of the Registrar (Graduate School for graduate students) at least two weeks (July 28) prior to graduation so that appropriate addresses can be confirmed and graduation details can be clarified with Colleges, Schools and Departments. Students who participate in graduation are required to wear appropriate academic costume. Caps and gowns may be rented from the University Bookstore. No applications for graduation will be accepted after June 26, 1972.

Transcripts

JOUR 200-5 Journalism Internship (Beginning Photography—Not a laboratory course)

1 hour credit July 3-July 14
(Class meets 11:15 to 12:05 MTWThF)

Instructed by Bob Waters, official UNC photographer, this workshop will emphasize the basic relationships and applications of photo-journalism.

MATHEMATICS

MED 471 Instructional Materials in Secondary School Mathematics

3 hours credit June 19-June 30
(Class meets 1:25 to 5:30, MTWThF)

Topics include the following: the mathematics laboratory, models, films and filmstrips, overhead projector materials, tape recordings (audio and video), computers and calculators, and problems of special students. Elementary teachers will also be welcome.

MED 577 Mathematics Teachers' Workshop

3 hours credit July 31-August 11
(Class meets 2:30 to 5:30, MTWThF)

The emphasis in this workshop will be upon individualization of instruction in mathematics at junior and senior high school levels. The low achiever, the mathematics laboratory, and other special problems of learning and teaching mathematics will be studied in a workshop setting.

MED 678 Special Topics in Mathematical Education

3 hours credit June 12-August 18
(Class meets 10:10 to 11:00, MWF)

Implications of Piaget research for teachers of pre-school, elementary school, and secondary school.

MATH 401 Foundations of Arithmetic

3 hours credit June 12-August 18
(Class meets 7:00 to 7:50 a.m., MWF)

Professionalized content for teachers in grades 4-8.

SCIENCE

SCI 507-7 Aerospace Workshop

3 hours credit July 3-July 14
(Class meets 1:25 to 2:15, MTWThF)

The purpose of this course is to provide the elementary and secondary teacher with a general background in aviation

and an understanding of the air and space age. Subject matter will include the elementary concepts of aircraft, rocket and satellite development, weather, navigation, theory of flight, and aviation in education.

SCI 608-7 Elementary Science Workshop

3 hours credit July 17-July 28
(Class meets 1:25 to 2:15, MTWThF)

A subject matter course for the improvement of science background through experimentation and demonstration. Opportunity is provided for the solution of individual problems through the guidance of the instructors. Visual aids, laboratory materials, discussions, professional literature, and field trips are other resources.

SCI 676-4 History of Science

3 hours credit June 14-July 21
(Class meets 10:10 to 11:00, MTWThF)

The fundamental purpose of the course is to show the evolution of scientific thought and how it has contributed to contemporary methods of research. Emphasis will be devoted to the origin of the underlying principles, theories, laws of science, and the techniques used by various scientists in formulating their conclusions.

SCED 679-7 Science Curriculum in the Junior High School

3 hours credit July 31-August 11
(Class meets 1:25 to 2:15, MTWThF)

A course designed to acquaint students with the science curriculum in the junior high school. Existing curricula and "new" curricula will be discussed and evaluated.

SPEECH COMMUNICATIONS

SP 400-2 Theories of Group Process

3 hours credit June 19-July 14
(Class meets 8:00 to 9:55, MWF)

This course is designed to acquaint the student with a systematic overview of current theory and knowledge of small group discussion as derived and synthesized from significant experimental investigation. Emphasis is placed on an understanding of the variables which affect discussion and how knowledge of these variables can enhance participation in task-oriented groups.

SP 490-7 Workshop in Speech Communication: General Semantics

3 hours credit June 19-June 30
(Class meets 1:25 to 4:25, MTWThF)

An analysis of verbal and nonverbal communication including a study of the media and other signs and symbols and how they influence us. Emphasis is placed on innovative and effective teaching methods and improving human relations generally. The course is interdisciplinary in nature as it deals with the relationship among language, thought, and behavior.

SP 490-27 Workshop in Speech Communication: Directing Forensics

3 hours credit July 3-July 14
(Class meets 1:25 to 4:25, MTWThF)

The workshop will involve a critical examination of contemporary practice and standards in intercollegiate and inter-high school forensic activities. Included will be evaluation of the various events such as debate, extemporaneous speaking, original oratory, and oral interpretation. The act and art of judging these events will also be investigated.

SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

BUED 580-7 Workshop—Creativity in Business Classes

3 hours credit June 19-June 30
(Class meets 1:25 to 4:25, MTWThF)

Dr. Blockhus, instructor, has worked extensively in the creativity area. Opportunity will be provided for class members to work out creative ideas that they could use in their own teaching.

BUS 508-7 Workshop—Consumer Materials
3 hours credit July 3-July 14

(Class meets 1:25 to 4:25, MTWThF)

This workshop will survey and evaluate materials which might be helpful to consumer. Dr. Stewart M. Lee, instructor, is nationally known for his work with various consumer materials and consumer action.

BUED 580-27 Workshop—Reading Improvement in Business Classes

2 hours credit July 24-July 28
(Class meets 1:25 to 4:25, MTWThF)

This workshop will provide an opportunity for business teachers to discuss with Dr. Peter Hasselriis, who has done specific research in this area, what can be done in business classes about reading problems.

BUS 508-8 Workshop—Management
2 hours credit June 12-August 18

(Class meets 2:30 to 4:30 Mondays)

A study of management from the standpoint of processes and developments in managerial behavioral science, organizational psychology, information systems, motivation, communication, decision making, creativity, direction and leadership. (S-U, satisfactory-unsatisfactory grades will be given in this course.)

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

The University of Northern Colorado has a comprehensive program for undergraduate and graduate students and is recognized as an approved state institution for the training of vocational teachers, supervisors, administrators, and para-professional personnel.

The following special courses, along with the courses listed elsewhere in the bulletin, represent a comprehensive summer program for those individuals seeking credentials or an advanced degree. Students attending will register on the first day of the following special programs. The Department

of Vocational Education, however, WILL NEED AN ADVANCED PRE-REGISTRATION COUNT ON ALL PARTICIPANTS in these programs in order to arrange facilities and consultants. Pre-registration through the department will assure your admittance to the program. Participants will still be admitted after the dates listed if space is available. VE 509-37 Writing Vocational Objectives Seminar

2 hours credit July 10-July 14
(Class meets 1:00 to 5:00, MTWThF)

Vocational teachers and administrators learn to write behavioral objectives related to specific occupational fields. Individuals are encouraged to bring course units or outlines to be used in identifying specific objectives. Participants should arrange for enrollment by June 12 with the seminar director, Lois Bennett, McKee Hall—Room 318.

VE 508-2 Multimedia Curriculum Construction Workshop for Occupational Programs

6 hours credit July 17-July 28
(Class meets 8:00 to 4:00, MTWThF)

The purpose of this workshop is to provide vocational teachers an opportunity to construct multimedia in a workshop-laboratory environment. Individuals will select a "mini" occupational unit of instruction for which multimedia instructional material will be prepared. Participants should arrange for enrollment by June 12 with the workshop director, Lois Bennett, McKee Hall—Room 318.

VE 642-7 Curriculum Restructuring for Career Development—Kindergarten through Grade Six

3 hours credit June 14-June 23
(Class meets 1:15 to 5:00, MTWThF)

This two-week program will focus on concepts of career development as these relate to an integrated curriculum K-6. Participants will become involved in curriculum models, strategies for instructional programs, and implementation. Participants should arrange for enrollment by May 15 with the Program Specialist for Career Development Education, Maurice Ward, McKee Hall—Room 318.

VE 642-27 Curriculum Restructuring for Career Development—Grade 7 through 12

3 hours credit June 26-July 7

The focus of this one-week seminar will be the responsibility for working with business and industry to identify manpower needs. VE 508-22 Workshop for Group Career Guidance Teachers—Topic: "Career Cluster Explorations"

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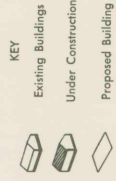
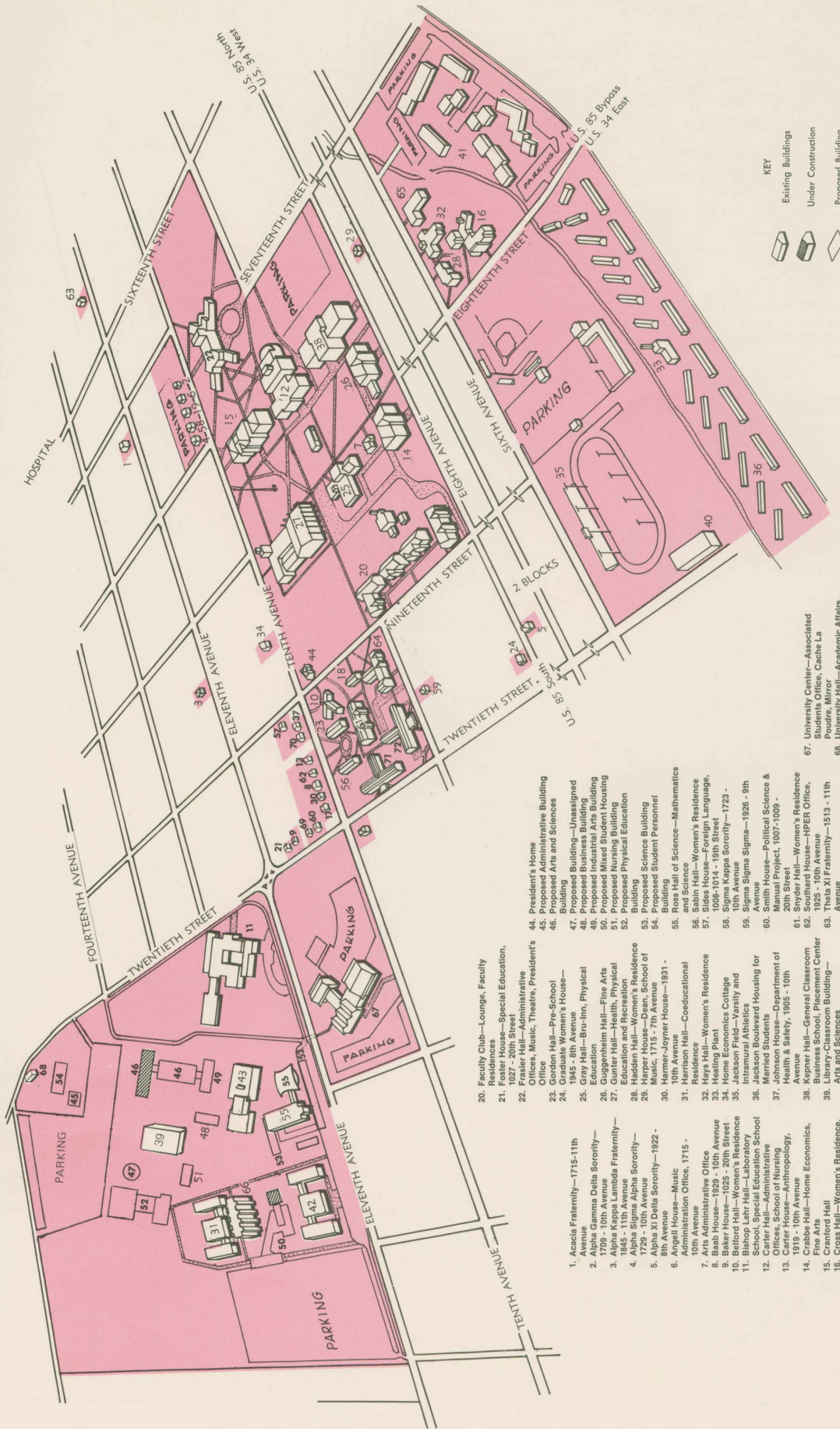
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BULLETIN SUPPLEMENT to the University of Northern Colorado
