Flexible Format

Greeley

Greeley's excellencies lie in its ambience of tranquility and energy; an interesting blend of historical and new; and a mixture of culture and the Western spirit. The location of this pleasant city of 64,000 is the center of rich farmland, open prairie and cattle ranches to the east and north, the excitement of urban Denver to the south, and the grandeur of the Rocky Mountains to the west.

A Summer with the Arts

Guest artists of national and international stature join University students and faculty in the annual Summer Festival of the Arts, a highlight of the summer session. The festival is sponsored by the College of Performing and Visual Arts and features a wide variety of cultural events, including art exhibits, plays, musical comedy, opera, recitals, and band and orchestra concerts. UNC performing groups include the summer companies of Opera Theatre and Little Theatre of the Rockies, the Festival Orchestra and Wind Ensemble and the Summer Symphonic Band.

The Summer Festival Orchestra and Wind Ensemble perform five orchestral concerts, one opera and two wind ensemble concerts, highlighted by appearances of guest conductors and guest artists. The Summer Symphonic Band performs four Concerts Under the Stars,

Little Theatre of the Rockies (LTR), and Opera Theatre, provide summer students an opportunity to enjoy a professional experience in legitimate resident theater. The program of six productions in as many weeks includes four dramas, an opera and a musical. Company members are involved in both the acting and technical aspects of professional theater, working under the excitement and intensity of a rigorous production schedule.

Members of the summer company are chosen from outstanding applicants from across the nation. They include college and university students, teachers of drama and performers seeking to increase their repertoire and technical experience.

University credit hours, tuition waivers, scholarships and salaried positions are available to qualified applicants. For Your Family

The entire family is included in UNC's concern for excellence.

Individualized reading classes (K-adult) are available through the Reading Center, McKee Hall 1, (351-2908), including individual and group tutoring in remedial reading. Greeley School District Six (352-1543) conducts classes for youngsters from second grade through high school.

Talented, gifted and creative children (grades five through twelve) may apply for acceptance in the Summer Enrichment Program by writing Dr. George Betts, Kephart Center, School of Special Education and Rehabilitation, Bishop-Lehr Hall 112A (351-2680).

If you choose residence hall living, children ages seven through 14 may be included in UNC's recreational and cultural activities, (351-2067). And a comprehensive program of arts, sports and other activities is offered for all ages by Greeley's Recreation Division, (353-6123).



Library Services

With 500,000 volumes contributing to a total of 1.2 million learning units, a wealth of material is available for the enrichment of students in the James A. Michener Library. Among the learning units are periodicals, government documents, pamphlets, reference materials, microforms, motion pictures, film strips, slides, maps, phonograph records, tapes, braille writing, video tapes and audio cassettes.

You will find recordings, scores, listening equipment, and a special selection of books in the Music Library. Children's and young adult literature is located in the Laboratory School Library of Bishop-Lehr Hall.

Films, photo duplication and microform reading and storage are available for use in the Multimedia Services area. Education materials such as textbooks, curriculum guides and testing materials are housed for teaching professionals in the Educational Resources Center.

Films, video tapes, film strips and other media materials are yours for the asking in Educational Materials Services.



Doctor of Arts

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the doctor of arts is designed to prepare you for a lifetime of creative teaching at the junior (community) or senior college level with a supplementary commitment to research. The doctor of arts is offered in the following disciplines: Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Geography, History. Mathematics, or Music. You must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, you must write and defend an acceptable dissertation. The doctor of arts degree may also be earned through the SECD.

Doctor of Education

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the doctor of education degree requires coursework with research of a professional nature. The doctor of education is offered in the following disciplines: Business Teaching; Curriculum and Instruction; Educational Administration; Elementary Education; Elementary Education - Early Childhood; English; English Education; Health and Physical Education; Industrial Arts; Mathematics Education; Music Education; Psychology, Counseling and Guidance; Reading; Rehabilitation Counseling; Science Education; and Special Education. You must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition you must write and defend an acceptable dissertation. The doctor of education degree may also be earned through the SECD.



Doctor of Philosophy

A two-year program beyond the master's degree or a three-year program beyond the baccalaureate degree, the doctor of philosophy requires coursework and research to prepare graduate students for teaching at the college level in either College Student Personnel Administration or Statistics and Research Methods.


Residence Requirements For All Doctoral Degrees

As a degree candidate, you are required to meet the on-campus residence requirement established for your degree. UNC operates for four full quarters each year: Fall, Winter, Spring, and Summer.

Master's and Educational Specialist Degrees

You must satisfactorily complete ten or more quarter hours of graduate credit on campus for each of two quarters. This may be eight weeks' attendance and ten quarter hours during Summer Quarter.

Check with your department or the Graduate School for alternate methods of meeting the master's and educational specialist residence requirements.



All Doctoral Degrees

As a doctoral candidate, you must satisfactorily complete ten or more quarter hours of graduate credit on campus for three consecutive quarters. This may be eight weeks' attendance and ten or more quarter hours during the Summer Quarter.

Check with your department or the Graduate School for the alternate method of meeting the doctoral degree residence requirements.



Study-Travel Courses

Political Science in Greece and Bulgaria

PSCI ID 308-508, July 26-Aug. 15, 10 credit hrs.

A unique opportunity to discover at first hand the significant political, social and economic differences between the age-old democracy of Greece and one of Communism's most orthodox regimes, The Peoples' Republic of Bulgaria. Yet, beyond the socio-political contrasts, study tourists will perceive two historic cultures that transcend the modern world.

We will walk among Athenian ruins that once echoed the democratic orators of the Age of Pericles. Then we are transported to the little-known but ancient Bulgar society celebrating its 1,300th year in 1980-81.

One week of preliminary study (July 20-24) on campus will precede travel. Estimated cost is \$2,400. Application deadline is May 1, 1981 For further information, contact Dr. Richard Perchlik, Political Science Department, University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, CO 80639. Phone: (303) 351-2058.

Caribbean Oceanography OCN 599-502, June 13-21 and Aug. 5-13, 3 credit hrs.

An oceanographic cruise and study tour of the British Virgin Islands and Caribbean coral reefs will be made twice during the summer of 1981: June 13-21 and August 5-13. Biological, geological, chemical, and physical aspects of the Caribbean Sea will be studied and field observations will be emphasized. Scuba diving is optional, and students will be expected to help sail and navigate.

There are no prerequisites, but background in geology and biology is useful. Approximate cost is \$325, plus air travel and tuition. Space is limited, so a \$100 deposit is necessary to secure a bunk for you aboard the 44-foot yacht.

Cultural Awareness: Food, Culture and Health in the Orient

HEC 393-593-570, June 11-July 3, 6 credit hrs.

A 23-day study-travel exploration of the food, culture and health of the Orient, focusing on Japan, China, Hong Kong, and Taiwan. Guided educational visits planned to cultural sites, health facilities, agricultural centers, food processing facilities, and universities in Tokyo, Beijing, Chen-Tu, Chang-sha, Kweidin, Kwang Chow, Hong Kong, and Taipai. A keen interest in the subjects, individual study of assigned reading, and participation in the pre, interim and post studytravel seminars are required. Estimated cost is \$3,000. Geology of Iceland GEOL 597, July 25-August 15, 10 credit hrs

Study and tour this land of ice and fire by land and air. Visit classic areas of glaciation, volcanism, and rifting on this island astride the mid-Atlantic Ridge. Field studies, plus classroom lectures and seminar discussions make this a course of exceptional interest. Prerequisite is one introductory geology course. Approximate cost of \$2,900 includes all tour expenses and tuition.


Russian Study Tour HIST 298-598, June 29-July 15, 10 credit hrs.

Itinerary includes Helsinki, Moscow, Kiev, Yalta, and Leningrad. Comparison of Csarist and Communist Russia is theme of tour. Visits to csarist palaces alternate with visits to Soviet nurseries, kindergartens and Pioneer camps. Performances of ballet, circus and folk ensembles blend past and

present.

No prerequisites. Anyone qualified to enroll at UNC may go. Estimated inclusive tour cost: \$1865 from New York; \$2190 from Denver. Tuition is \$300 for out-of-state as well as in-state students. General Information



Housing

All rates quoted are subject to the provision that the University reserves the right to change rates prior to the beginning of any academic quarter.

Single

University housing during the summer quarter for single men and women, registered for eight or tenweek undergraduate or graduate programs, is provided on a roomand-board basis in Harrison Hall. Room and board cost is \$509 per person for the eight-week summer quarter.

Family

The University offers furnished, air-conditioned apartments in Lawrenson Hall for married couples, (with a limit of two children) who are registered for eight or ten-week academic programs. The cost is \$550 per family for the eight-week summer quarter.

Meal service is available in an airconditioned hall on an optional basis for families residing in Lawrenson Hall.

Workshop Housing


Housing is provided in Turner Hall for students attending summer quarter workshops of four weeks or less in duration. These student facilities consist of two-bedroom airconditioned apartments. Meal service is available in an airconditioned dining hall on an optional basis for short-term workshop students living in Turner Hall

Off-Campus

The Off-Campus Renters Information Service located in the University Center provides bulletin board assistance to students seeking off-campus housing in the Greeley area. Current listings of private rooms, apartments, houses and mobile homes are posted daily at the office. Prospective UNC students are welcome to write or call (303) 351-2172 for information.



Parking Services

The Department of Parking Services is responsible for the enforcement of the campus parking regulations. Decal sales, fine payments, and hearings are handled through this office located at 1027 20th Street.

During the summer session only J lot, south of the west campus dormitories, is free. All of the other lots require a properly displayed decal. Decals are valid for specific lots and are valid in those lots only. Decals go on sale for the summer beginning June 1, 1981.

Motorcycles and mopeds are also required to display decals and park in designated motorcycle and moped areas. Decals are also available for permanently handicapped, wheelchair drivers, and those with temporary health problems.

Fines are imposed for violation of parking regulations. The amount of the fine is based on the seriousness of the violation. Fines may be paid or a hearing requested at the Parking Services office. Any fine not paid, or a hearing applied for within 10 calendar days from the date of the courtesy reminder, is assessed a \$5 per notice penalty fee. Uncleared notices are billed to student accounts.

If you plan to park a vehicle at the University, please acquire the necessary permit before parking on campus. For more information, contact University Parking Services, phone (303) 351-2131.

(a) University, Student, and Health Services Fees are committed for the support of student activities programs, the Student Health Center, and the Student Representative Council. No part of these fees is remitted to those students who may not desire to make use of any or all of the privileges provided. Students will receive a Certificate of Registration upon completion of Step 3 of the registration process, that will be required for University events.

(b) Health Insurance coverage is optional during the summer quarter only. If you were not enrolled in the student health insurance program spring quarter, 1981, you do not have health insurance coverage for the summer quarter, 1981. This insurance can be obtained only by requesting coverage at registration or at the Student Health Center during the first week of the quarter.

Your right as a student to classification as a resident for tuition payment purposes in a state institution of higher education is determined under State Law Title 23, Article 7, Colorado Revised Statutes 1973, as amended. Administrative procedures fix status before or at the time of registration. If, following a registration, the status conferred on a student is questioned for revision, appeal may be made during the first five days of classes on a specific form and the case will be reviewed by the University Committee on Residence Status. The determination by the committee following the review is final. All matters concerning residency status rulings shall be filed with the Office of the Registrar, where referrals will appropriately be made to the University Committee on Residence Status.

Tuition for courses offered through Continuing Education is assessed separately from on-campus tuition and fees, and on a different schedule as mandated by the Colorado Commission on Higher Education.





Payment of Student Accounts

Any student who enrolls in the University is responsible for the payment of tuition, fees, housing, food service, or any other charges and should be prepared to pay the full amount at the beginning of the term.

Your financial obligation to the University must be paid before registration is considered final (Step 4 of the registration process). This payment is to be completed at the Cashier's Office in Frasier Hall through one of the following methods or combination thereof: (1) payment in full, (2) payment through financial aid, (3) payment through the deferral plan of at least 50 percent of the total current bill plus a deferral fee on the unpaid balance as shown under Incidental Extra Fees or (4) payment by a sponsor (not financial aid).

Two additional statements of account will be mailed to your local address if any additional charges are incurred. You are required to notify the Registrar's Office promptly of any change in your local address or permanent mailing address.

Your current quarter past due financial obligation to the University is subject to a late payment fee as indicated in the Incidental Extra Fees list.

The University will not register you, release a diploma, provide a transcript, nor provide placement services or other University services to any student or former student who has any financial obligation to it (other than a loan not yet due).

Any student who presents to the University a check that is not accepted for payment by the bank, because of insufficient funds, nonexistence of an account, or other reason for which you are responsible, is charged a fee of \$8. A notice of this fee and the amount of the "bad check" is placed on your account and mailed to your local address or to your permanent mailing address. A "bad check" presented in payment of tuition, fees, and housing charges will be considered as a nonpayment and may result in withdrawal of your enrollment.

Policy on Reassessment, Refunds and Withdrawals

Adjustments in tuition or fees are permitted after registration only under specified conditions. A change in a course of study which results in a change of registered hours during the period ending with the last day for adding classes will result in a reassessment of tuition and fees. Tuition and fees will not be adjusted after the last day for adding classes.

To be eligible for a refund of any kind upon withdrawal from school you must present a formal, approved Withdrawal Clearance form at the Accounts Receivable Office. Refunds are not prorated; rather, they are made in terms of the policy statements below and the residence halls lease.

Refunds allowed against paid tuition and student services fees upon withdrawal are provided as follows:

• No refunds will be granted for special short-period classes (presession, post-session, interim session, or workshops) after the second meeting of the class.

- On programs of nine credit hours or less, the student will be assessed a \$15 withdrawal fee if withdrawal occurs during the first week of the term, \$30 if withdrawal occurs during the second week, \$45 if withdrawal occurs during the third week, and \$60 if withdrawal occurs during the fourth week. If the total tuition and fees are less than the withdrawal fee, the lesser amount will be charged. If you withdraw after the fourth week of the term, you will be required to pay the full amount of tuition and student services fees.
- On programs of ten or more credit hours, you will be assessed a \$25 withdrawal fee if withdrawal occurs during the first week of the term, \$50 if withdrawal occurs during the second week, \$75 if withdrawal occurs during the third week, and \$100 if withdrawal occurs during the fourth week. If you withdraw after the fourth week of the term, you will be required to pay the full amount of tuition and student services fees.
- Refunds allowed against assessed quarterly board and room charges, apartment rentals, and the housing deposit are permitted under the terms of the housing lease. The Housing Office, when consulted at withdrawal, will provide information on the computations applied.

Incidental fees and health insurance are not refunded for any cause at anytime.

If individual refund circumstances warrant review, contact the Director of Accounting Services.

*Drop/Add Deadline. You are permitted to make individual drop/add changes in your program through the end of the drop/add period. Courses dropped during this time will not appear on your record nor will you be assessed the corresponding tuition charges.

†Withdrawal Deadline. You are permitted to withdraw from a course until the mid-point of the course. A withdrawal will appear on your record as a W which will not affect the grade point average. Tuition will be charged for these courses.

Registration Instructions

Registration consists of the following four steps:

- 1. Distributing Course
 Selection Materials and
 Advising
- 2. Selecting Courses
- 3. Picking Up Schedule of Classes and Statement of Account
- 4. Paying Student Account. Registration is complete only after all four steps are completed.

Step 1. Distributing Course Selection Materials and Advising

Course selection materials for summer quarter are mailed to currently enrolled students and are available at the Registration Center, Room 247 of the University Center, beginning April 27 for students who wish to select classes in person. If you wish to select classes by mail use form 4 on page 63. On June 15 and June 22 course selection materials are available in the lobby of the University Center.

. Students may confer with advisors at designated times established by the advisor through appointments. The course selection card must be signed by you and your advisor (except forms for graduate majors in CSPA and EDSE, and undergraduate majors in ANT, BUS, ECON, EDEL, EDSE, GEOG, HEC, PSY, and SOC which do not require an advisor's signature) before proceeding to Step 2.



Special Undergraduate Registration Instructions

1. Undergraduate students may not enroll in 500-700 level courses, except that qualified juniors and seniors may enroll in 500-level courses if they present a properly signed permit to enroll form.

2. The normal undergraduate course load for a quarter is 18 hours of credit. Beginning June 22 and ending June 29, you may get permission to enroll for more hours if necessary. Undergraduate overloads must be approved by the Dean of Students or assignee who signs the permit to enroll card. This card is presented to the terminal operator at the Registration Center when selecting classes that involve an overload. Additional tuition is charged for every credit hour over 18

3. Student Teachers. All full or part-time student teachers, not taking any other courses, complete their registration materials and turn them in to the EDFE Office and do NOT go to the Registration Center. Student teachers taking other courses while student teaching complete Step 2 for the other courses only. EDFE 444, Supervised Teaching (student teaching), registration is done in the EDFE

ffice only.

Special Graduate School Registration Instructions

1. All unclassified graduate students (not officially admitted to a graduate degree program) must report to the Graduate School Office, Frasier Hall, Room 108, for advising before proceeding to Step 2. The course selection card must be completed and signed by Dr. George Leach. Please note that anyone who has not received an official admission notice from the Graduate School Office is not in a degree program.

2. The Graduate School Bulletin states "The normal load for graduate credit applicable to a degree is 15 hours per quarter. Overloads (16 to 19 quarter hours) must be approved by the Dean of the Graduate School. Under no circumstances may a student count in a degree program or certification more than 19 hours of coursework in fall, winter, spring or summer quarter....The maximum number of hours includes work completed in either the on-campus or off-campus programs or in a combination of the two_types of programs."

Students who wish to count more than 15 hours in a degree program must secure the signature of the Dean of the Graduate School (Graduate School Office, Frasier 108) by 4 p.m. of July 20, 1981. The Dean will provide the Authorization to Take an Overload form and will have the form placed in the student's permanent file for use by the graduation clerk at the time the student applies for graduation.

Step 2. **Selecting Courses**

In Person

Select courses at the Registration Center in Room 247 of the University Center anytime on or after the date that appears on the course selection form. The Registration Center is open to process course selections and schedule changes on all regular working days between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. All "holds" must be cleared by the appropriate department before you may select courses.

On Monday, June 22, students are admitted to the Registration Center at the time assigned below and follow the procedure for course selection outlined below.

Procedure for selecting courses:

a. Check course status board to determine whether or not the desired section is available. Every section that has closed or is canceled is so marked. (This course status board is constantly changing as students add or drop courses from their schedule; therefore, you should check the board before making any course selections.)

b. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the course selection form. The course identification number is found at the left of each course entry in the Summer Bulletin. The desired number of credit hours is to be entered only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you desire to enroll for no credit.

c. If you do not wish to pay the \$2.00 CoPIRG fee, you should initial the appropriate box on the course selection form. (See explanation of CoPIRG fee below.)

d. Present the course selection form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.

e. You will receive a Registration confirmation showing what you have just selected as you leave the Registration Center. This should be checked for accuracy.







By Mail

If selecting courses by mail use form 4 on page 63. (If you have never enrolled at UNC or have not been enrolled since Fall 1959 you must also complete form 3 page 61 and return to the Admissions Office or Graduate School along with form 4.) Course selection forms received after May 22 will not be processed and will be returned to sender.

a. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the course selection form. The course identification number is found at the left of each course entry in the Summer Bulletin. The desired number of credit hours is to be entered only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you desire to enroll for no credit.

b. If you do not wish to pay the \$2.00 CoPIRG fee, check the appropriate box on the course selection form. (See explanation of CoPIRG fee below.)

c. You will receive by mail after May 27 a printed copy of your registration schedule showing what you have selected, as well as a statement of account including tuition, fees and miscellaneous charges (Step 3). Payment must be made by June 29, or registration will not be considered final, and class space will be released to other students (Step 4).

Making Schedule Changes and Corrections

Corrections and changes to your schedule of classes are made by using the schedule change form on the reverse side of the registration confirmation form. These changes can be made any time (except June 22), after you first select courses for summer quarter until June 29.

a. Check the course status board to determine whether or not the desired section is available.

b. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the add portion of the schedule change form. The desired number of credit hours is to be entered only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you desire to enroll for no credit.

Enter the four-digit course identification number of each course you wish to drop from your schedule on the *drop* portion of the schedule change form.

c. Present schedule change form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.

d. Before leaving the Registration Center, you will receive a copy of the registration confirmation form

for the quarter in which you are making the transaction.

Special Notes

Course Restrictions. There are several courses listed in the Summer Bulletin that are restricted to certain classes of persons. The appropriate restriction is indicated under the column prerequisites and notes. When such a restriction is noted, you must present to the terminal operator a special permit to enroll card which is signed by the appropriate faculty member.

Nonscheduled Courses. Students are permitted to enroll in nonscheduled courses with the permission of a supervising faculty member. Nonscheduled course enrollments are processed at the same time as other course selections at the Registration Center. Use 8000 as the course identification number and indicate the number of hours for which you wish to enroll on the course selection form or schedule change form. Present the completed nonscheduled course form to the terminal operator at the time of the transaction.

CoPIRG Fee. "CoPIRG is the Colorado Public Interest Research Group, an action and research oriented organization established by the university students of Colorado. Student contributions of \$2.00 and student energy have enabled CoPIRG to provide free moneysaving consumer help and to work toward the protection and betterment of our environment."

Step 3. Picking up Schedule of Classes and Statement of Account

If you complete Step 2 prior to 4 p.m., May 22, you will receive your schedule of classes and statement of account by mail after May 27. Payment must be made by 3:30 p.m., June 29, or the registration will not be considered final and class spaces will be released to other students.

If you complete Step 2 on May 26 through June 16, you must pick up your schedule of classes and statement of account in Frasier Hall after 12:30 p.m. on or after June 17.

If you complete Step 2 on June 17 through June 22, you must pick up your schedule of classes and statement of account in Frasier Hall after 12:30 p.m. on or after June 23.

Step 4. Paying Student Account

Any student who enrolls in the University is responsible for the payment of tuition, fees, housing, food service, or any other charges and should be prepared to pay the full amount at the beginning of the term

Your financial obligation to the University must be paid prior to 3:30 p.m., June 29, before registration is considered final. This payment is to be completed at the Cashier's Office in Frasier Hall through one of the following methods: (1) Payment in full, (2) Payment through financial aid, (3) Payment through the deferral plan of at least 50 percent of the total current bill plus a deferral fee on the unpaid balance as shown on page 10, or (4) Payment by a sponsor (not financial aid).

Notice

The Registrar's Office hereby gives notice that it has designated the following information as "directory information" under 348 (a) (5) (B) of the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. Directory information concerning students at the University will be released during the current school year without the prior consent of the student as permitted by law unless within ten (10) days after registration a student has notified the Registrar's Office, located in Frasier Hall, Room 123, that such information should not be released

without his or her consent. This notification must be made each year during which the student is registered. "Directory Information" at the University of Northern Colorado is as follows: (a) name, address, and phone listing; (b) date and place of birth; (c) major field of study; (d) participation in officially recognized activities and sports; (e) weight and height of members of athletic teams; (f) dates of attendance; (g) degrees and awards received; and (h) most recent previous educational agency or institution attended.



Special Late Registration Instructions (June 23-26)

Step 1. Obtain course selection materials at the Registration Center. Confer with an academic advisor before proceeding to Step 2.

Step 2. Select courses according to the procedure outlined in Step 2, Selecting Courses, as printed above.

Step 3. If you complete Step 2 on June 23 through June 26 you must take your "UNC Registration Confirmation" to room 25 in Frasier Hall where a schedule of classes and statement of account will be prepared.

Step 4. Your financial obligation to the University must be paid prior to 3:30 p.m., June 29, before registration is considered final. Students who fail to meet their financial obligation by this date will not be on class rolls or receive credit.

Special Workshop Registration Instructions

1. If you are enrolling in workshops only, you may register for those courses in the assigned classroom during the first class meeting. Registrations processed in this manner must be accompanied by full payment on the same day. If you fail to meet your financial obligation by this date you will not be on class rolls or receive credit.

Withdrawing from Class

You are not permitted to withdraw from a class in which you are enrolled after the mid-point of the course. The last day to withdraw from an eight- or ten-week course summer quarter is July 20. To withdraw from a course, use the schedule change form on the reverse side of the registration confirmation form

a. Obtain faculty signatures for every section from which you wish to withdraw.

b. Enter the course prefix number and section as well as the course identification number of each course from which you wish to withdraw on the withdrawal portion of the schedule change form.

c. Present the schedule change form to a terminal operator at the

Registration Center.

d. Before leaving the Registration Center you will receive a copy of the registration confirmation for the quarter in which you are making the transaction.

Faculty Drop for Failure to Attend the First Two Class Periods

You are reminded that a faculty member can, at his discretion, drop a student who does not attend the first two hours of class meetings in order to make room for other students who wish to enroll. If for some reason you cannot attend the first two meetings, it is advisable to contact the instructor to guarantee registration. Not all instructors will exercise this option; therefore, do not rely on the assumption that nonattendance will automatically withdraw you from class.

To Completely Withdraw

To completely withdraw from school during the quarter you must initiate the withdrawal process in the Student Resource Center, University Center. If you make a complete withdrawal from the University you will be charged a withdrawal fee. Please refer to the refund policy, page 10.

To Obtain Transcripts

Transcripts for summer quarter will be available upon request two weeks after the close of the quarter. Transcripts for the summer interim session will be available upon request two weeks after the close of the interim session.

To Be Graduated

Graduation is scheduled at 9 a.m., Saturday, August 15, in the Garden Theater. You are encouraged to attend. Those who choose not to participate must notify the Office of the Registrar (Graduate School for graduate students) at least two weeks (July 31) prior to graduation so that appropriate addresses can be confirmed and graduation details can be clarified with colleges, schools and departments. Students who participate in graduation are required to wear appropriate academic costume. Caps and gowns may be rented from the University Bookstore. No applications for graduation will be accepted after July 2, 1981.

To Register for the Summer Interim Session

Registration for summer interim session courses will be conducted at the Registration Center, Room 247, University Center. Withdrawals from these courses must be made before 3 p.m. of the mid-point day (count class days only) of the course.

Final Exams

Final examinations are not scheduled specifically but are given at the discretion of the faculty member in accordance with the policy established by the school or college. Classes are expected to meet on all scheduled periods, including the last day a class is scheduled in the quarter.

Returning Students

If you have been enrolled since 1959, you must return form 1 no later than May 8, 1981, in order to have course selection forms available for in-person course selection. If you were enrolled summer quarter 1980 or spring quarter 1981, you need not make this request.

Summer Only Students

Form 2 must be returned by undergraduate "special" students who plan to be on campus only for summer quarter 1981. If you have never attended UNC, form 3 also must be submitted

New Students

Students who have never been enrolled or students who have not been enrolled since Fall 1959 must complete form 3 and return to the Admissions Office or Graduate School. If you wish to select classes by mail submit the mail course section form 4 along with form 3 to the same office. These must be received by May 22. Graduate students wishing to enroll in a degree program should request the appropriate applications from the Graduate School. Undergraduate students wishing to be officially admitted to UNC should write to Admissions, for information and application forms.
