For 93 years, the University of Northern Colorado has hosted a nationally recognized Summer Session. A highly personalized and intellectually stimulating academic environment exists at UNC and is enhanced in the summer when the student body tapers from nearly 10,000 to 5,000, while prominent lecturers are invited to participate in various workshops on the campus.

Summer Session fully employs the 236acre campus, which combines greenery, open space, ivy-covered buildings and efficient, modern facilities, including the James A. Michener Library System which boasts over 1.2 million holdings as well as computerized access to a wide range of research materials.

The University is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Various academic programs also have special accreditation by the following: American Chemical Society, American Psychological Association, Colorado State Board of Accountancy, Colorado State Board of Nursing, National Association of Schools of Music and National League for Nursing.

An Ideal Location

Greeley's location is special. The city itself offers a special blend of tranquility and energy, culture and the western spirit. It is a friendly city with large trees, green parks, wide streets and 63,000 people. Summer brings America's largest Fourth of July Rodeo with a parade and festivities, an Arts Picnic and various cultural events. The city is located in the midst of rich farmland, open prairie and cattle ranches to the east and north, the excitement of urban Denver an hour's drive to the south, and the grandeur of the Rocky Mountains less than an hour's drive to the west.





Majors in the teaching profession are offered by numerous academic departments. If you wish teacher certification, you must apply for admission to the Professional Teacher Education Program prior to your junior year. Courses, applicable to pre-law, professional health fields including pre-medicine and predentistry, as well as pre-engineering are available for students who want to begin these studies at UNC.

Because the University operates on a four-quarter academic year, all programs of study are available to the summer student. The four-quarter plan can help you complete your undergraduate requirements for graduation in three years if you elect a program of continuous study. Please consult the UNC *Bulletin* (catalog) or your advisor for further program information.

Graduate

Residence Requirement

Master's and Educational Specialist Degrees. Resident credit is credit earned under the conditions specified herein and may be applied toward the attainment of graduate degrees at the University of Northern Colorado. The following conditions must be satisfied regardless of the location in which the course is given.

1. Instruction: The instructor must be a member of the Graduate Faculty of UNC or of the "Graduate Lecturer Faculty" for a particular course under Graduate Council policy.

2. Course(s): The content of each course must be approved by regularly established college and University curricular processes before the course is scheduled or offered.

Doctoral Degrees. After admission to a doctoral program:

1. The applicant must complete a minimum of any two quarters as a fulltime student (10 quarter hours) registered for resident credit offered on-campus at UNC and applicable to the doctoral degree. *Some departments may have more stringent residence requirements.* (Check with your department).

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3. Course(s) The content of each course must be approved by regularly established college and university curricular processes before the course is scheduled or offered.

All residence requirements must be completed after the student has been admitted to the doctoral degree program. NOTE: Unless the doctoral student is registered for at least six additional hours of classes taken on campus in Greeley, he/she shall *not* count DS or Departmental Prefix courses 601, 622, 701, and 797 to satisfy the residence requirements.

Departmental prefix or DS 799 may not be used under any circumstances to meet the residence requirement.

Admission & Registration

Undergraduate Admissions

Freshmen. If you are entering college as a degree candidate for the first time, write to the Director of Admissions for information and application forms. To be eligible for automatic admission, you must have graduated in the upper one-half of your class or have earned a score on the American College Test that is at or above the national average. Other minimal admission standards are defined in the UNC *Bulletin*.

Transfer. The University accepts a maximum of 135 quarter hours of transfer credits on undergraduate programs. No more than 96 quarter hours of credit may be accepted from accredited junior or community colleges. If you seek a degree, you must submit an official application for admission, a transcript of high school studies and one from each previously attended college. Application forms are available from the Director of Admissions.

Special Students. As an undergraduate student planning to attend the University of Northern Colorado Summer Quarter only, you must return forms 1 and 2 starting on page 57. Attendance for Summer Quarter does not assure admission for subsequent quarters. Official application for admission must be made if you plan to continue your degree program at UNC.



Graduate Admissions

Master's, Specialist and Doctoral Applications. Contact the Graduate School for application forms. Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test scores must accompany the doctoral application.

Unclassified Graduate Student. An unclassified graduate student (not officially admitted to a graduate degree program) may sign up for classes by reporting directly to the Registration Center or by using the Mail-in Selection form in the back of the book. Students who have not previously attended UNC should complete Form 1, Statistical Information, before registering.

Registration

Proper registration is the responsibility of each student. Registration consists of the following four steps:

- Step I Obtaining Course Selection Materials and Advising
- Step 2 Selecting Courses
- Step 3 Picking Up Statement of Account and Change of Address forms Step 4 Paying Student Account Registration is complete only after all

four steps are completed.

Step I. Obtaining Course Selection Materials and Advising

Course selection materials for Summer Quarter are mailed to students who were enrolled Spring Quarter 1984 and/or Summer Quarter 1983. Beginning April 30, you may select classes in person at the Registration Center, University Center 247. To select classes by mail, you may use the Mail-In Selection form in the back of the book, it must reach the Registration Center by May 25.

You may enroll in the Pre-Session June Il at the Registration Center prior to the beginning of class, at the first class session, or by mail.

You may confer with advisors by appointment. The course selection form must be signed by the student and the advisor (except forms for CSPA, NURS, and undergraduate BUS majors which do not require an advisor's signature) before proceeding to Step 2.

Step 2. Selecting Courses In Person

Select courses at the Registration Center, University Center 247, on or after the date on the course selection form. The Registration Center is open to process course selections and schedule changes on all regular working days between 9 am and 4 pm. All "holds" must be cleared by the appropriate department before you may select courses.

On Monday, June 18, students are admitted to the Registration Center at the time assigned below and should follow the procedure for course selection outlined below.

Procedure in the Registration Center:

a. Check t.v. monitor in University Center lobby for course identification numbers of all courses with time and/or date changes, or which have been closed or cancelled. These change constantly as students add or drop courses; therefore, check the monitor before making any course selections. Check the posted Added Classes List for course meeting time changes or sections added since the Schedule of Classes was printed.

b. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the course selection form. The course identification number is found with each course entry in this *Bulletin*. The desired number of credit hours should be entered only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you wish to enroll for no credit (audit). Tuition and fees apply to audit registrations. c. If you do not wish to pay the \$2 CoPIRG fee, initial the appropriate box on the course selection form. (See explanation of CoPIRG fee below.)

d. Present the course selection form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.

e. Pick up a Registration Confirmation Form showing what you have just selected as you leave the Registration Center. Check this for accuracy and time conflicts. You are responsible for proper registration.

By Mail

If selecting courses by mail, use form 3 in the back of the book. Course selection forms received in the mail after May 25 will not be processed and will be returned to the sender.

Procedure by Mail:

a. Enter the course prefix, number, section and the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the course selection form in the first choice column. You will be placed in your second course choice only if the first choice section is closed. The course identification number is found with each course entry in this *Bulletin*. Enter the desired number of credit hours only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if you desire to enroll for no credit (audit). Tuition and fees are assessed for audit registrations.

b. Mail-in registrations do not require advisor's signatures.

c. If you do not wish to pay the \$2 CoPIRG fee, you should initial the appropriate box on the course selection form.

d. You will receive a confirmation form by mail, showing the courses for which you are registered.

e. After May 30 you will receive by mail a statement of account including tuition, fees and miscellaneous charges (Step 3). Payment must be made by June 25 or registration will not be considered final, and class space will be released to other students (Step 4).

Registering for Short Course/Workshop

If you are enrolling in short courses/workshops only, you may register for those courses by mail, in person at the Registration Center or in the assigned classroom during the first class meeting. Forms for this purpose are provided to faculty scheduled to teach short-term courses.

Registrations processed in the classroom must be accompanied by full payment on the same day. If you fail to meet your financial obligation by this date, you will not be on class rolls or receive credit. Please note that enrollment is limited in some courses, and registration prior to the first course meeting is recommended.

Late Registration (June 19-25) Instructions

Step I. Obtain course selection materials at the Registration Center. Confer with an academic advisor before proceeding to Step 2.

Step 2. Select courses according to the procedures outlined in Step 2, Selecting Courses, as printed above.

Step 3. If you complete Step 2 between June 19 and 25, you must take your "UNC Registration Confirmation" to the Cashier's Office windows in Carter Hall where a statement of account and change of address form will be prepared.


Step 4. Your financial obligation to the University must be paid prior to 3:30 pm June 25, before registration is considered final. Students who fail to meet their financial obligation by this date will not be on class rolls or receive credit.

Special Registration Instructions for All Students

Course Restrictions. Several courses are listed in the *Summer Bulletin* that are restricted to certain classifications of students. The appropriate restriction is indicated under the column prerequisites and notes. When such a restriction is noted, you must present a special permit to enroll card signed by the appropriate faculty member to the registration terminal operator.

Nonscheduled Courses. You are permitted to enroll in nonscheduled courses with the permission of a supervising faculty member. Nonscheduled course enrollments are processed at the same time as other course selections at the Registration Center. Use 8000 as the course identification number and indicate the number of hours for which you wish to enroll on the course selection form or schedule change form. Present the completed nonscheduled course form, which must bear the signatures of the supervising faculty and department chair, to the registration terminal operator at the time of the transaction.

CoPIRG Fee. CoPIRG is the Colorado Public Interest Research Group, an action and research oriented organization established by university students of Colorado. Student contributions of \$2 and student energy have enabled CoPIRG to provide money-saving consumer help and to work toward the protection and betterment of our environment.



Special Undergraduate Registration Instructions

Undergraduate students may not enroll in 500-700 level courses, except juniors or seniors with cumulative grade point averages of 3.0 on a 4.0 point scale may enroll in courses numbered 500-599. Contact the Registration Center (303)351-2521, prior to enrolling.

The normal undergraduate course load for a quarter is I8 hours of credit. If courses taken during the pre-session, June 11-15, are added to the 8-and/or 10-week quarter course load and create an overload, permission may be granted for the overload. Undergraduate overloads must be approved by a counselor at the Dean of Students Office who signs the Permit to Enroll card. Present this card to the terminal operator at the Registration Center when selecting overload classes. Additional tuition is charged for every credit hour over I8.

Students registering for no credit (audit) must indicate 00 hours in the variable credit hours section of the course selection form. Tuition and fees are assessed for audit as well as credit registrations.

Senior citizens (over 60) may register for courses for no credit (audit) on a space-available basis without being assessed tuition and fees. Registration takes place in the classroom on a Special Registration Form.

Student teachers, full or part-time, who are not taking any other courses, should complete their registration materials and turn them into the EDFE Office. They should *not* go to the Registration Center. Student teachers taking other courses while student teaching should complete Step 2 for other courses only. EDFE 444, Supervised Teaching (student teaching) registration is done in the EDFE office only.



Faculty Drop

You are reminded that a faculty member may drop a student who does not attend the first two hours of class meetings, in order to make room for other students who wish to enroll. If you cannot attend the first two meetings for some reason, it is advisable to contact the instructor to guarantee registration. Not all instructors will exercise this option; therefore, do not assume that nonattendance will automatically drop you from class.

Withdrawing from Class

You are not permitted to withdraw from a class in which you are enrolled after the mid-point of the course. The last day to withdraw from an 8-week summer quarter course is noon, July 17. The last day to withdraw from a 10-week course is noon, July 24. To withdraw from a course, use the schedule change form on the reverse side of the registration confirmation form. **Procedure:**

a. Obtain a faculty signature for every section from which you wish to withdraw.

b. Enter the course prefix number and section as well as the course identification number of each course from which you wish to withdraw on the withdrawal portion of the schedule change form.

c. Present the schedule change form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.

d. Before leaving the Registration Center, you will receive a copy of the Registration Confirmation for the upcoming quarter. Check it for accuracy.

Making Schedule Changes and Corrections

Make corrections and changes to your Schedule of Classes on the Schedule Change form on the reverse side of the Registration Confirmation form. These changes can be made any time (except June 18), after you first select courses, up to the drop/add deadline. The drop/add deadline for 8- and 10-week courses is noon, June 25. Tuition and fees will be adjusted for schedule changes made until the drop/add deadline. No refunds are given students removing themselves from classes after the drop/add deadline. (See Withdrawing From Class). The drop/add deadline for a short-term class occurs when the class has held 15 percent of its meetings. Withdrawal deadline for a shortterm class occurs when 50 percent of the class meetings have been held. For specific deadlines, refer to the Registration Center, University Center, Room 247.

Procedure:

a. To add a course, check t.v. monitor in University Center lobby to determine whether or not the desired section is available.

b. Enter the four-digit course identification number of each desired course on the add portion of the Schedule Change Form. Enter the desired number of credit hours only if the course is offered for variable credit, or if enrolling for no credit. Tuition and fees are assessed for no-credit registrations in credit courses.

c. To drop a course, enter the four-digit course identification number of each course you wish to drop from your schedule on the drop portion of the schedule change form.

d. Present the completed Schedule Change Form to a terminal operator at the Registration Center.

e. Before leaving the Registration Center, you will receive a copy of the registration confirmation for the upcoming quarter. Check this for accuracy. Proper enrollment is your responsibility.

Withdrawing from the University

To completely withdraw from school during the quarter, you must initiate the withdrawal process in the Dean of Students Office at the University Center. If you completely withdraw from the University, you will be charged a withdrawal fee. Please refer to the refund policy, page 16.

Obtaining Photo Identification Cards/Temporary Library Cards

All new students and those returning students not enrolled at UNC after Fall 1981 are expected to have a photograph taken for the University ID card. These are taken at the Registration Center between 9 am and 4 pm when you are selecting classes for Summer Quarter. Students selecting classes by mail should have their photographs taken during the first week of the quarter at the Registration Center. Student photo ID is required for checkout of library materials, use of recreation facilities and purchase of student tickets to campus entertainment and cultural events. Students attending only short courses/workshops should request temporary library cards at the Circulation Desk in Michener Library.

Step 3 Obtaining Statement of Account and Change of Address Form

If you complete Step 2 prior to 4 pm, May 29, you will receive your statement of account and change of address form by mail after May 30.

If you complete Step 2 May 30 through June 18, you must pick up your statement of account and change of address form in Carter Hall after 12:30 pm on or after June 19.

If you complete Step 2 on June 19 through June 22, you must pick up your statement of account and change of address form at the Cashier's Office windows in Carter Hall after 12:30 pm the next working day.

Payment must be made be 3:30 pm June 25, or the registration will not be considered final and class space will be released to other students.

Step 4 Paying Student Account

It is the student (not a parent, guardian, spouse, agency of a foreign government or other third party) who is responsible for the payment of tuition, fees and other charges. The student must be prepared to pay the full amount at the beginning of the term or make other arrangements in accordance with University policy and approved by the appropriate authorities. The student is required to receive his/her Statement of Account and Change of Address form as shown above in Step 3. This bill is not mailed to the student.

Each student's financial obligation to the University must be paid prior to 3:30 pm June 25. Failure to complete this step by the deadline will result in the cancellation of the selected classes.

Payment is to be made at the Accounting Services windows in Carter Hall through one of the following methods or through a combination of these methods:

- Payment in full

 Payment through financial aid as approved by the financial aid authorities in the Office of Student Finance Resources.

 Payment through the deferral plan, of at least 50 per cent of the total current bill, plus a deferral fee on the unpaid balance as explained in the Costs section, page 16.

— Payment by a sponsor other than a financial aid program. This arrangement applies primarily to international students, but does not in any way relieve the student of complete responsibility to see that payment is made or accept the consequences. Obtain a complete summary of the policy on sponsored-student accounts from the Office of International Students, Carter 3006, 351-2396.

 Payment through the CASE-UNC plan. This name is an acronym for "Credit Available for Student Employees at UNC." It allows students employed by the University to make arrangements through the Office of Student Employment, a unit of the Office of Student Financial Resources in Carter Hall, to apply income from student employment as it is earned to tuition, fees and other charges.

- Payment through Visa or MasterCard.

In addition to the bill for tuition, fees and other charges developed through the quarterly registration process, two additional statements of account will be mailed to the student's local address if any additional charges are incurred or if payment has not been made. Note that these bills are not mailed to the parent or guardian. Each student is required to notify the Registrar's Office promptly of any change in his or her local address, or in his or her permanent mailing address.

THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN COLORADO WILL NOT REGISTER A STUDENT, RELEASE A DIPLOMA, PROVIDE A TRANSCRIPT OR SUPPLY PLACEMENT AND OTHER UNIVERSITY SERVICES TO ANY STUDENT OR FORMER STUDENT WHO HAS AN OUTSTANDING FINANCIAL OBLIGATION TO THE UNIVERSITY OTHER THAN A LOAN WHICH IS NOT YET DUE OR ON WHICH PAYMENTS ARE UP TO DATE.

Obtaining Transcripts

Transcripts for summer quarter will be available upon written request after grades have been officially reported to and recorded by the Registrar's Office. Official transcripts (\$2 each) are processed on a first ordered/first produced basis and should be ordered as soon as possible at the Registrar-Records Office, Carter 3002.

Please alert the person taking the transcript order to your specific deadlines and specified Summer Quarter courses to be included on transcripts to be sent or picked up. When all desired grades are posted on records, normal processing time is two working days after receipt of the request.

Graduating in the Summer

Graduation is scheduled at 9 am, Saturday, August 11, in the Garden Theatre. You are encouraged to attend. Those who choose not to participate must notify the Office of the Registrar (Graduate School for graduate students) at least two weeks (July 27) prior to graduation so that appropriate addresses can be confirmed and graduation details can be clarified with colleges, schools and departments. Students who participate in graduation are required to wear appropriate academic costume. Caps and gowns may be rented from the University Bookstore. No applications for graduation will be accepted after July 6, 1984.

Costs

All rates quoted in this document are approved by the Board of Trustees and established in accordance with the appropriation policy of the Colorado General Assembly. Consequently, these rates are subject to change by action of the Board of Trustees or in response to actions by agencies of the State.

Updated information about tuition and fees is available from the Dean of Students office at the University Center, (351-2796) or from the Accounts Receivable office in Carter Hall (351-2201).

It must be understood that the individual student is responsible for the payment of charges he or she incurs. The University is not responsible for making payment arrangements with parents, guardians, embassies of foreign governments or other third parties.

1. General fees: Student fees for *in-state students only*, enrolled in 1-5 credit hours are \$4 per credit hour. Student fees for in-state students enrolled in 6-9 credit hours, or out-of-state students enrolled in 9 or fewer credit hours are \$6 per credit hour. Student fees for in-state and out-of-state students enrolled in 10 or more credit hours are \$62 total.

General University fees, student fees and health service fees are committed to support essential student activities and programs, the Student Health Center, and the Student Representative Council. Every student must pay these fees each quarter, whether or not he or she makes use of the privileges and activities underwritten by the fee.

2. In-state students taking 1-5 credit hours are charged at reduced rates.

3. Out-of-state students enrolled in reduced rate workshops will be charged as described in the Special Savings Section. See courses

marked with an * for savings.

4. Health insurance fees: \$56. Health insurance coverage is optional during the summer quarter only. If you were not enrolled in the student health insurance program spring quarter 1984, you do not have health insurance coverage for summer quarter, 1984. This insurance can be obtained only by requesting coverage at the Student Health Center during the first four weeks of the quarter.

5. Optional CoPIRG fee (\$2) may be waived in writing by the student at the time of registration.

Incidental Fees

In addition to general tuition and fees, and room and board rates for students who choose to purchase those services, a number of incidental fees have been established by the Board of Trustees. These are identified in this section.

 Application fee, a non-refundable charge, pays for transcript evaluation for students enrolling in graduate and undergraduate programs, \$15

 Music instruction fee provides individual music lessons for non-music majors, \$7.50 per quarter credit hour of instruction.

 Placement Center fee is used to develop and maintain supporting files for students and graduates seeking new employment opportunities. The placement year begins September 1, and ends August 31.

— Fee for handling of a check presented in payment of a student account which, for any reason, turns out to be non-negotiable, \$10. (Note that nonnegotiable payment is the same as nonpayment and may result in cancellation of a student's enrollment).

Certified statement of issuance of a life teaching certificate, \$2

Fee for Late Payment

In each of the four academic quarters in a calendar year, a date is established after which payment of outstanding tuition, fees and other charges is considered late. This date is stated in the official University calendar which is included in the Bulletin, in the Directory of Classes, and on the student's individual bill.

A student who has not paid his or her tuition, fees and other charges within the allotted time is assessed a late fee in accordance with the following schedule. This fee is added to the outstanding balance.

Fee for Deferral of Payment

Under certain circumstances, a student who qualifies may make arrangements with the Accounts Receivable Office (Carter Hall Main Floor, 351-2201), to defer payment of a portion of the total expense for tuition, fees and other charges. These arrangements must be made before the date on which late payment penalties are imposed. The student must pay 50 per cent of the current charges with the balance due at midquarter. The account must be paid in full before the end of the academic quarter, or the student will not be allowed to attend class in the subsequent quarter.

Refunds and Reassessments

The following summarizes the policies and procedures by which reassessments and refunds are processed. If a more complete explanation is required or if individual refund circumstances warrant review, contact the Director of Accounting Services, Carter Hall, Main Floor, phone 351-2237.

Adjustment in tuition, fees and other charges are permitted after registration only under specified conditions. A change in a course of study which results in a change of registered hours during the period which ends on the last day for adding classes will result in a reassessment of tuition and fees. However, tuition and fees will not be adjusted after the last day for adding classes. To be eligible for a refund upon withdrawal from the University, a student must present a properly processed and approved Withdrawal Clearance form to the Office of Accounts Receivable in Carter Hall, 351-2201. This form may be obtained from the Dean of Students office (University Center Room 206, phone 351-2796). Refunds are allowed against tuition and general student fees when a student withdraws from the University based upon the date the withdrawal process is completed.

A student enrolled for nine credit hours or less will be assessed a \$15 withdrawal fee if withdrawal occurs during the first 10% of the class; \$30 if withdrawal occurs during the 11-20% of the class; \$45 if withdrawal occurs during 21-30% of the class; and \$60 if withdrawal occurs during 31-40% of the class. If the total tuition and factor fac

If a student withdraws after the first 40% of the class, then he or she is required to pay the full tuition and general student fees as summarized in the beginning of this section.

On programs of ten or more credit hours, the student will be assessed a \$25 withdrawal fee if withdrawal occurs during the first 10% of the class; \$50 if withdrawal occurs during 11-20% of the class; \$75 if withdrawal occurs during 21-30% of the class; and \$100 if withdrawal occurs during 31-40% of the class. If the total tuition and fees are less than the withdrawal fee, the lesser amount will be charged.

If a student withdraws after the first 40% of the class, then he or she is required to pay the full tuition and general student fees as summarized in the beginning of this section.

No refunds will be granted after the second meeting of the class for one-week classes or workshops.

Refunds are allowed against assessed room and board charges, apartment rentals, and the housing deposit. Refund rates, policies and procedures are explained in the residence hall lease and the meal plan contract. The Housing Office (Gordon Hall, 351-2727) and Food Services (Gordon Hall, 351-2725) will provide assistance and information upon request.

Housing

All rates quoted are subject to the provision that the University reserves the right to change rates prior to the beginning of any academic quarter.

Single University housing for single men and women registered for an 8-week program during Summer Quarter, is provided on a room-and-board basis in Harrison Hall. Room and board cost is \$672 per person double occupancy for the 8-week quarter. Additional weeks may be arranged at the time of application.

Family. The University offers furnished, air-conditioned apartments in Turner Hall for married couples registered for 8-week academic programs, with a limit of two children. The cost is \$598 per family for the 8-week summer quarter. Food service plans are optional. Additional weeks may be arranged at the time of application.

Short-term Housing. Housing and food services for programs lasting less than the full 8-week quarter are located in Turner Hall with cafeteria services in adjacent Harrison Hall Dining Room. Turner Hall is a high-rise, air-conditioned building comprised of two-bedroom apartments. Harrison Dining Room is airconditioned and is open seven days a week.



Notifying the Registrar about Directory Information

The Registrar's Office hereby gives notice that it has designated the following information as directory information under 348 (a) (5) (B) of the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. Directory information concerning students at the University will be released during the current school year without the prior consent of the student as permitted by law unless within ten (10) days after registration a student has notified the Registrar's Office, located in Carter Hall, Room 3002, that such information should not be released without his or her consent. This notification must be made each year during which the student is registered. Directory information at the University of Northern Colorado is as follows: (a) name, address and phone listing; (b) date and place of birth; (c) major field of study; (d) participation in officially recognized activities and sports; (e) weight and height of members of athletic teams; (f) dates of attendance; (g) full- or part-time enrollment status (contact Registrar's Office for definition used for certifying enrollment to outside agencies); (h) degrees and awards received; and (i) most recent previous educational agency or institution attended.



Cost Savings

Awards for Graduate Excellence

A number of scholarships for exceptional applicants to UNC's graduate summer program are available. Awards will help fund tuition and fees for the summer, 1984.

To be eligible for the Awards for Graduate Excellence, applicants must:

Special Savings Out-of-State Students

The University offers 50 special workshops at a reduced rate for out-ofstate students. A charge of \$39 per credit hour, which includes tuition and fees, will be assessed for these reduced rate workshops.

Full-time students (10-18 credit hours) who enroll in a combination of reduced rate workshops and other courses, will be charged first for the number of hours in reduced rate workshops at \$39 per credit hour; then for additional hours in other courses at the out-of-state rate. The maximum assessment of tuition and fees will be for 10 credit hours—a full-time load. Reduced rate workshop credit hours will count toward fulfillment of full-time load for tuition purposes. Adjustments to billings will be made at the time the student pays tuition and fees.

For example, a graduate non-resident student enrolled in one 3-credit hour reduced rate workshop and 10 credit hours of other courses/workshops would experience the following savings:

Resident and Non-Resident Classification for Tuition Assessment


Students who are residents of Colorado are permitted to enroll in the University at a significantly lower tuition. This is because the University is primarily supported by the taxpayers of Colorado rather than by student tuition and fees. The determination of a student's residency status is provided for under State Law Title 23, Article 7, Colorado Revised Statutes 1973 as amended.

Administrative procedures determine a student's residency status before or at the time of registration. After the student has registered, if he or she feels that the residency classification is incorrect, an appeal may be made during the first five days of classes. This appeal should be directed to and appropriate information obtained from the Registrar's Office (Carter Hall, 351-2231.)

A residency status appeal requires the student to complete a detailed form which is available in the Registrar's Office. This form and other relevant information will be reviewed by the University Committee on Residence Status in light of State law and authorized procedures. The determination by the committee is final.

Tuition for courses offered through Continuing Education are assessed separately from on-campus tuition and fees on a schedule mandated by the Colorado Commission on Higher Education. Information on new changes are available from the Continuing Education Office, Frasier Hall 11, 351-2944.
