

Summer Quarter 1973 University of Northern Colorado 69th Session – June 12-August 17

The University

Established in 1889 as a state normal school to supply teachers for Colorado, the University of Northern Colorado has always been committed to excellence in education. The 10-week summer program has been designed to give the student an educational and cultural opportunity of both distinction and quality. Facilities on the 243-acre University Campus include a laboratory school, a placement service, an off-campus instruction program, a new 326,000 volume library, an educational resources center, an instructional materials center, KUNC-FM radio station, bureaus of research, health and counseling services, and an alumni association. Special workshops, travel-study tours and an outstanding faculty, administration and nationally known guest speakers and artists all help to enrich the regular academic program.

Laboratory School

Educational opportunities for youngsters are also available. Morning classes are planned by the Laboratory School (kindergarten and grades one through six), the Special Education School and a nursery school conducted by the Home Economics Department. Summer sessions are planned for grades two through twelve by Greeley School District Six. For information, contact the individual school or district.

Greeley

Greeley is a pleasant city of 44,000 located 30 miles east of the towering Rocky Mountain Range and 52 miles north of Denver, the state capitol. Founded in 1870 as a planned city, Greeley still boasts wide, tree-lined streets and avenues, numbered for easy reference, and an orderly growth pattern provided for by both a city and county planning commission. Greeley's cultural and recreational opportunities include a city recreation program, 12 parks, 3 golf courses, 2 museums, 2 public libraries, the Mezzanine Art Gallery, and the Greeley Philharmonic Society, the oldest symphony orchestra west of the Mississippi River.



School of Music

Each summer the School of Music presents a full and varied series of concerts, recitals, and musical theatre. Featured will be the Summer Symphonic Band, presenting weekly concerts in the outdoor Garden Theatre, the Chamber Orchestra and the Summer Concert Choir. These fine musical organizations draw performers from many parts of the United States and present musical programs of exceptional distinction.

This summer another exciting time of musical theatre has been planned. Scheduled are Puccini's popular opera *La Boheme* and the Cole Porter Musical *Kiss Me Kate*. Nationally known artists will head casts completed by UNC faculty and students.

Undergraduate Programs

The academic program at UNC is organized into two colleges; College of Arts and Sciences, and College of Education, and seven schools; The School of Arts, The School of Business, The School of Music, The School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, The School of Nursing, The School of Educational Change and Development, and The School of Special Education and Rehabilitation. Majors are offered within the following: Arts and Sciences, Teaching Professions, and Applied and Professional Studies. Three undergraduate degrees are available: B.A., B.S., and B.M.

Majors are offered in the teaching profession by numerous academic departments. Students studying for teacher certification must apply for admission to the Professional Teacher Education Program prior to their junior year. Courses applicable to pre-law, pre-medicine, pre-dentistry, and pre-engineering are designed for students who want to begin their studies at UNC.

Since the university operates on a four-quarter basis, all programs of study are available to the summer student. The four-quarter plan helps a student complete his undergraduate requirements for graduation in three years, if he elects a program of continuous study.

Admissions

Policy

Students applying for admission to the University of Northern Colorado for Summer Quarter should complete and return the form on page 55. Additional information required as part of application for admission depends upon the status of the students as defined below. Inquiries concerning the graduate program or graduate admissions should be directed to the Dean of the Graduate School. Undergraduates should contact the Director of Admissions for application forms. The application for the baccalaureate and master's degrees and for the graduate student certification program must be accompanied by a \$10.00 transcript evaluation fee.

Graduate Students

The University requires that the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test scores accompany the doctoral application. If a student's score is below the minimum acceptable score in the Aptitude Test, he will be denied admission to the doctoral program. Students seeking a graduate degree from the University of Northern Colorado may transfer eight quarter hours toward a master's or Specialist in Education degree and 12 quarter hours toward a Doctoral degree. If the work is acceptable to all members of the Oral Comprehensive Examination Committee, a doctoral student may transfer an additional 23 quarter hours of work.

Transfer Students

The University accepts a maximum of 135 quarter hours transfer credits on undergraduate programs. Credit earned at a junior or community college after completion of the sophomore year, or beyond 90 quarter hours will not be transferable. All degree-seeking students must submit an official Application for Admission, a transcript of high school studies, two transcripts of previous college work and a health report. Application forms may be obtained by writing to the Director of Admissions.

Freshmen

Students who are entering college for the first time should write to the Director of Admissions for information and application forms. To be eligible to apply for admission, students must graduate in the upper one-half of their class or have scores on the American College Test which are at or above national averages. Other minimal admission standards are defined in the Undergraduate catalog.

Special Students

An undergraduate student planning to attend the University of Northern Colorado for the Summer Quarter **only** must return the appropriate forms on pages 54 and 55. Attendance for the summer quarter does not assure admission for subsequent quarters. Official application for admission must be made if the student plans to continue his degree program at the University of Northern Colorado.



The Graduate School offers five advanced degree programs leading to the Master of Arts (M.A.)., Master of Science (M.S.), Specialist in Education (Ed.S.), Doctor of Arts (D.A.), Doctor of Education (Ed.D.), and Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.).

Detailed information concerning advanced degrees may be obtained by consulting the 1973-74 Graduate School Catalog or by writing Dr. A. R. Reynolds, Dean of the Graduate School, UNC 80631.

Master's Degree

The master's degree may be earned in three summer quarters of full-time study. The master's degree is awarded upon completion of a minimum of 45 quarter hours of credit. Candidates must be on campus, enrolled as full-time students for two quarters (at least ten weeks and complete ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and complete ten quarter hours during the summer quarter), to satisfy the minimum residence requirement.

The master's degree is offered by the following departments or disciplines: Anthropology¹; Biological Science; Botany; Business; Chemistry; Curriculum and Instruction; Economics¹; Educational Administration; Educational Media; Elementary Education; English; Fine Arts; Geography¹; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; History; Home Economics; Industrial Arts; Mathematics; Music; Physical Science; Physics; Political Science¹; Psychology, Counseling and Guidance; Reading; Research and Statistical Methodology; Science Education; Social Science; Sociology¹; Special Education; Speech Communication and Journalism; Theatre Arts; and Zoology.

1. The departments of Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Science, and Sociology offer a Master of Arts degree in Social Science. The student may concentrate in the discipline of his choice.

Graduate Programs (Continued)

Specialist in Education

The Specialist in Education degree is a one-year program beyond the master's degree, assuming that the area of specialization is compatible with the undergraduate and master's major.

Doctor of Arts

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the Doctor of Arts degree is designed to prepare a student for a lifetime of creative teaching at the junior (community) or senior college level together with a supplementary commitment to research. The Doctor of Arts is offered in the following disciplines: Biological Science; Chemistry; Geography; History; and Mathematics. All candidates are required to spend three consecutive quarters in residence in full-time study (at least ten weeks and complete ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and complete ten quarter hours during the summer quarter). The University operates four full quarters per year (Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer). A student must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, he must write and defend an acceptable dissertation.

Doctor of Education

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the Doctor of Education degree requires course work and research of a professional nature. All candidates are required to spend three consecutive quarters in residence in full-time study (at least ten weeks and complete ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and complete ten quarter hours during the summer quarter). The University operates four full quarters per year (Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer). A student must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, he must write and defend an acceptable dissertation.

Doctor of Philosophy

A two-year program beyond the master's degree or a three-year program beyond the baccalaureate degree, the Doctor of Philosophy degree requires course work and research to prepare graduate students for creative and meaningful teaching at the college level in one of the following areas: College Student Personnel Work; and Research and Statistical Methodology.

All rates quoted are existing charges and are subject to a provision of the trustees that the university reserves the right to change tuition, fees, and other charges on published notice prior to the beginning of any academic quarter. As with all state-supported institutions, the rates are affected by legislative action which may not be finalized until late spring of any given year.

Financial Information (Continued)

Tuition and Student Services Fees are incurred during each quarterly registration period and are due and payable at the time shown on the billing which is mailed to the student each quarter. Charges are assessed for the total of partial or full programs whether taken for credit or no credit.

Additional Fees

Special Program Fees such as bowling, field trips, golf, etc. are billed at cost. Extra charges are incurred for programs leading to the Specialist in Education and Doctoral degrees. Consult the 1973-74 Undergraduate or Graduate School Catalog for all itemizations of extra fees and assessments. No graduate phasing fees will be altered or refunded if a registrant fails to pursue his program or for any reason drops out of the course of study into which he has been accepted.

Scholarships

Nearly all scholarships or waivers of tuition issued apply only to the fall, winter and spring quarters. Holders of special scholarships having questions about their prospective awards should inquire about their status to the respective departments authorized to confirm their award or to the Office of Financial Aids.


Resident, Non-Resident Status

Determination of status as a resident of Colorado for tuition paying purposes is fixed at registration. Colorado Revised Statutes 1966 and Session Laws of Colorado 1967 as amended fix state regulations which apply for all state institutions of higher education in Colorado.

Refunds Policy

To be eligible for a refund of any kind, the student must present a formal, approved Notice of Withdrawal or an Add-Drop Slip at the Accounting Office. Forms may be obtained from the Records Office.

Partial refunds for full-quarter classes are granted only for early withdrawals. No refund will be granted for special, short-period classes after the first meeting of the class. Please consult the 1973-74 Undergraduate or Graduate School Catalog for the specific refund policies of the University.



University housing is available in residence halls for single men and women. All accommodations in the residence halls include room and board. The rooms are arranged to accommodate two persons per room.

Room and Board: \$340.00 per person for the summer quarter.

Family

The University offers family housing in two residence halls containing housekeeping facilities for married students with one or two children or for couples without children.

Furnished suites with kitchenette: Turner Hall, \$300.00 and the New High Rise Apartment Building. (Rates to be determined.) Cafeteria meal service is available on an optional basis.

Off-Campus

Many students find rooms, apartments and houses in the Greeley area. Room and apartment listings are available to any student who desires to contact the Housing Office. Arrangements for accommodations with private householders cannot be made by the Housing Office, but must be conducted by the student directly with the landlord. Students and landlords are both advised to have a clear understanding, preferably in writing, as to facilities, privileges, prices and intended length of tenancy.

If after applying, the student desires to cancel his application for either single or family housing in the residence halls for Summer Quarter, he should notify the Director of Housing, in writing. The following policy will apply:

Cancellations for Summer Quarter received before May 15, 1973, \$25 will be refunded. THERE ARE NO REFUNDS FOR APPLICATIONS MADE AND THEN CANCELLED AFTER MAY 15, 1973.

Registration

General Instructions

Proper registration is the responsibility of each student. No person may register for another student. The University does not have facilities for registering "IN ABSENTIA" or at times other than those designated in these instructions. Students should read the catalog and know course requirements, and register for both regular classes and workshops at the same time. Registration is scheduled for June 12 and June 19. *Students attending workshops, 8 and 10 week classes can register at the first session*. Registration for those taking only 8-week classes is on June 19. Students attending workshops only must register in person before the first class session.

Ten-week classes begin June 13. No registration for 10-week classes will be permitted after 12:00 noon, June 19. Eight-week classes begin June 20. No registration for 8-week classes will be permitted after 4:00 p.m., June 22. ALL HOLDS MUST BE CLEARED BEFORE REGISTRATION.

Contact Adviser

After obtaining your supplies, contact your adviser in his office on June 11 and 12, or June 19 for those taking only 8-week classes (except undergraduate majors in Anthropology, Business, Economics, Elementary Education, Geography, History, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology). If you do not know who your adviser is, please go to the departmental office of your major. All cards must be completed and the Emergency Locator-Second Preference Card must be signed by your adviser before you will be permitted to register. Second Preference courses should be approved ALTERNATE COURSES (not sections).

Unclassified Graduate Students and those not following a degree program will report to Student Council Room, University Center, at Registration. None of the work taken by a graduate student who is enrolled in an unclassified status may be counted in meeting the minimum residence requirements.



Fee Payment

Veterans on G.I. Bill and Students with Financial Aid (Vocational Rehabilitation and ALL scholarships and grants) report to Office of Financial Aid, Frasier Hall, Room 101 during the week of Registration. Students will be billed for fees and tuition on or about June 27, 1973, at rates per credit hour as approved at that time and according to their current resident status. Students must present all copies of the Bill to the Accounting Office according to their scheduled day as shown on the Bill. Payment of the amount due should be made on this day.

A late fee of \$5.00 the first day and \$2.00 for each additional day will be charged.

Arrange deferrals in Room 8, Frasier Hall (bring your Bill).

Students registering for 10-week courses who complete registration after June 12 and those registering for 8-week courses who complete registration after June 19 will be assessed a late registration fee at the rate of \$5.00 the first day and \$2.00 each additional day. (See Calendar on page 24 for last day of Registration).

Workshops

Registration for workshops may be completed at either registration, June 12 or June 19, or at the Records Office, Frasier 126, after June 19, on the first day of the particular workshop offered. Students must register in person before the first class session. It is the student's responsibility to learn when his first class meets.

A student may register for a class for no credit by paying appropriate tuition and fees. No audit or visitors cards are issued – only "no credit" cards.

Graduation

10:00 a.m., Wednesday, August 15, in the Garden Theatre. Students are encouraged to attend graduation. Those who choose not to participate must notify the Office of the Registrar (Graduate School for graduate students) at least two weeks (July 31) prior to graduation so that appropriate addresses can be confirmed and graduation details can be clarified with Colleges, Schools and Departments. Students who participate in graduation are required to wear appropriate academic costume. Caps and gowns may be rented from the University Bookstore. No applications for graduation will be accepted after June 25, 1972.

Transcripts

Courses and grades for the current quarter will not be available for at least two weeks after the close of the quarter.

The class will meet in all day sessions on campus for one week and then spend approximately one week each in (1) UNC's mountain campus near Estes Park; (2) the San Luis Valley; (3) the Grand Mesa area, and (4) the Denver area. Social Studies teachers involved in teaching about Colorado are especially encouraged to participate.

Costs for housing, food, and transportation will be shared by the group after the initial week in Greeley. Estimated costs exclusive of tuition are about \$200.00. A minimal amount of time will be spent on the UNC campus at the beginning of the workshop to orient the students to techniques and background useful in the study of these two life zones. The majority of the class time will be spent in the field studying the plants and animals together with the ecological factors affecting their growth, development and distribution. Participants will be required to hike to the study areas and camp several nights both in the mountains and in the grasslands. Students must provide their own camping equipment. A fee of about \$10.00 will be charged to cover some of the expenses. Additional expenses will be determined at the first meeting of the class.

The first course of a sequence of two courses. An advanced study in electric fields, electric potential, magnetic fields and induced electromotive force. Prerequisites, PHYS 255, 267, and MATH 133.

IF YOU PLAN TO ATTEND ONE OF THE FOLLOWING SPECIAL VOCATIONAL EDUCA-TION PROGRAMS, NOTIFY THE SPECIFIC DIRECTOR/ COORDINATOR RESPONSIBLE FOR THE PROGRAM. VE 509-2 Seminar on Career Education 3 hours credit June 11-June 15

The purpose of the seminar is to offer educators in the field an opportunity to (1) review the latest instructional and occupational guidance materials located in the Center for Career Development, (2) review instructional designs and related media, (3) present ideas for developing and validating needed instructional materials at the participants' places of employment, and (4) return to campus to present developed materials and share refinement ideas. The time schedule includes two on-campus experiences - one at the beginning of the quarter (June 13, 14, and 15) and one toward the end of the quarter (August 1, 2, and 3). FOUNDATIONS OF EDUCATION GRADUATE BLOCK

The objective of the Graduate Block is to provide students an opportunity to study the concepts, constructs and issues treated in the foundation disciplines: philosophy, psychology, sociology and anthropology, and to apply these concepts and constructs to practical educational problems and issues.

The experiences in the Block will be organized around the analysis of problems and issues, the development and review of alternate solutions to those problems, and the development of implementation strategies rather than around the structure of discreet disciplines. Equality of educational opportunity, education for survival, fully effective cognitive and affective education, quality education for all minorities, freedom and discipline in the classroom, and community participation will be some of the problems and issues treated. The Block will be individualized, team taught and scheduled in flexible time blocks. 

This picture is similar to the nighttime photographs which appeared on the covers of the 1967 and 1969 Summer Bulletins. All three pictures are by Bob Waters, official UNC photographer. Using 4×5 Ektachrome film, Waters employed the help of 6 assistants to flash light on the building, as well as to set off more than 120 color filtered flash bulbs.
