THE UNIVERSITY

Established in 1889 as a state normal school and in 1935 as the Colorado State College of Education, the University of Northern Colorado was granted university status in May, 1970 in recognition of the institution's extensive graduate and undergraduate programs. Committed to excellence in education, the university is a member of and accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The 10-week summer program at UNC has been designed to give the student an educational and cultural opportunity of both distinction and quality. The 243-acre University Campus is divided into three main campuses; the East campus with housing and Jackson athletic field; the Central campus which includes class and administration buildings and faculty housing; and the new Darrell Holmes campus which contains the James A. Michener Library and other class buildings and dormitories. Facilities on the campus include a laboratory school, placement service, an off-campus instruction program, an educational resources building center, an instructional materials center, KUNC-FM radio station, bureaus of research, health and counseling services, an alumni association, the Butler-Hancock Hall, the new Health, Physical Education and Recreation building. Special workshops, travel-study tours and an outstanding faculty, administration and nationally known speakers and artists all help to enrich the regular academic program.

LABORATORY SCHOOL

Many educational opportunities are available for youngsters. Morning classes are planned by the Laboratory School (kindergarten and grades one through six), the Special Education School and nursery school are conducted by the Home Economics Department. Summer sessions are planned for grades two through twelve by Greeley School District Six. More information on these programs may be obtained through the individual schools or the school district offices.

GREELEY

Greeley is a growing city of 57,000 and the county seat of agricultural Weld County. Greeley is located 30 miles east of the picturesque Rocky Mountain Range and 52 miles north of Denver, the state capital. Founded in 1870 by Horace Greeley and originally known as the Union Colony, Greeley still boasts wide, tree-lined streets and avenues, numbered for easy reference.

Greeley's cultural and recreational opportunities include a city recreation program, 12 parks, 3 golf courses, 2 historical museums, 2 public libraries, and the Greeley Philharmonic Society, the oldest symphony orchestra west of the Mississippi River. There is also the new Greeley Mall, a large shopping center south of town containing convenient shops and restaurants.

The Academic Program at UNC is organized into two colleges and seven schools:

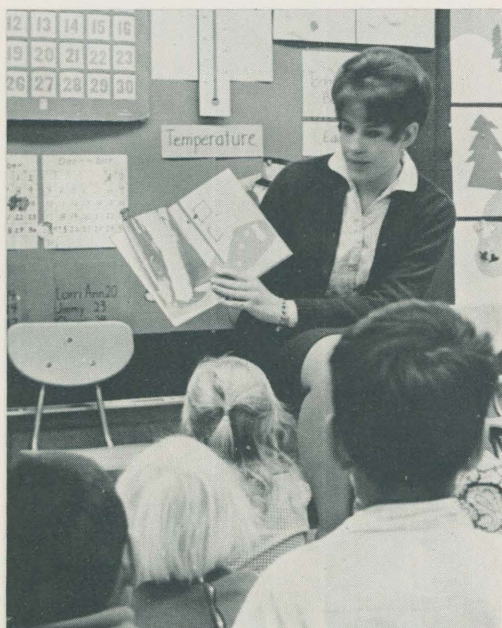

Majors are offered in the teaching profession by numerous academic departments. Students studying for teacher certification must apply for admission to the Professional Teacher Education Program prior to their junior year. Courses applicable to pre-law, pre-medicine, pre-dentistry, and pre-engineering are designed for students who want to begin their studies at UNC.

Since the university operates on a four-quarter basis, all programs of study are available to the summer student. The four-quarter plan helps a student complete his undergraduate requirements for graduation in three years, if he elects a program of continuous study.

Please consult the general catalog, available upon request, for further information.

POLICY

Students applying for admission to the University of Northern Colorado for Summer Quarter should complete and return the form on page 60. Additional information required as part of application for admission depends upon the status of the students as defined below. Inquiries concerning the graduate program or graduate admissions should be directed to the Dean of the Graduate School. Undergraduates should contact the Director of Admissions for application forms. The application for the baccalaureate and master's degrees and for the graduate student certification program must be accompanied by a \$10.00 transcript evaluation fee.

GRADUATE STUDENTS

The University requires that the Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test scores accompany the doctoral application. If a student's score is below the minimum acceptable score in the Aptitude Test, he will be denied admission to the doctoral program. Students seeking a graduate degree from the University of Northern Colorado may transfer eight quarter hours toward a master's or Specialist in Education degree and 12 quarter hours toward a Doctoral degree. If the work is acceptable to all members of the Oral Comprehensive Examination Committee, a doctoral student may transfer an additional 23 quarter hours of work.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

The University accepts a maximum of 135 quarter hours transfer credits on undergraduate programs. Credit earned at a junior or community college after completion of the sophomore year, or beyond 96 quarter hours will not be transferable. All degree-seeking students must submit an official Application for Admission, a transcript of high school studies, two transcripts of previous college work and a health report. Application forms may be obtained by writing to the Director of Admissions.

FRESHMEN

Students who are entering college for the first time should write to the Director of Admissions for information and application forms. To be eligible to apply for admission, students must graduate in the upper one-half of their class or have scores on the American College Test which are at or above national averages. Other minimal admission standards are defined in the Undergraduate catalog.

SPECIAL STUDENTS

An undergraduate student planning to attend the University of Northern Colorado for the Summer Quarter **only** must return the appropriate forms on page 60 and 61. Attendance for the summer quarter does not assure admission for subsequent quarters. Official application for admission must be made if the student plans to continue his degree program at the University of Northern Colorado.

GRADUATE PROGRAMS

The Graduate School offers six advanced degree programs leading to the Master of Arts (M.A.), Master of Science (M.S.), Specialist in Education (Ed.S.), Doctor of Arts (D.A.), Doctor of Education (Ed.D.), and Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.).

Detailed information concerning advanced degrees may be obtained by consulting the 1975-76 Graduate School Catalog or by writing Dr. A.R. Reynolds, Dean of the Graduate School, UNC 80639.

Course Load and Credit. The normal load for graduate credit applicable to a degree is fifteen hours per quarter. Overloads (16 to 19 quarter hours) must be approved by the Dean of the Graduate School. Under no circumstances may a student count in a degree program more than 19 hours of course work in a fall, winter, spring, or summer quarter; more than 15 hours in an eight weeks summer session; or more than 9 hours in a five week enrollment.

MASTER'S DEGREE

The Master's degree may be earned in three summer quarters of full-time study. The master's degree is awarded upon completion of a minimum of 45 quarter hours of credit. Candidates must be on campus enrolled as full-time students for two quarters (*at least ten weeks and complete ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and complete ten quarter hours during the summer quarter*) to satisfy the minimum residence requirements.

The master's degree is offered by the following departments or disciplines: Anthropology¹; Biological Science; Botany; Business; Chemistry; Communication; Curriculum and Instruction; Earth Sciences; Economics¹; Educational Administration; Educational Media; Elementary Education; English; Fine Arts; Foreign Languages; Geography¹; Gerontology; Health, Physical Education and Recreation; History; Home Economics; Industrial Arts; Mathematics; Music; Physics; Political Science¹; Psychology, Counseling and Guidance; Reading; Research and Statistical Methodology; Science Education; Social Science; Sociology¹; Special Education; Theatre Arts; and Zoology.

SPECIALIST IN EDUCATION

The Specialist in Education degree is a one-year program beyond the master's degree, assuming that the area of specialization is compatible with the undergraduate and master's major.

¹The departments of Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Science, and Sociology offer a Master of Arts degree in Social Science. The student may concentrate in the discipline of his choice.

DOCTOR OF ARTS

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the Doctor of Arts degree is designed to prepare a student for a lifetime of creative teaching at the junior (community) or senior college level together with a supplementary commitment to research. The Doctor of Arts is offered in the following disciplines: Biological Science; Chemistry; Geography; History; Mathematics; and Music. All candidates are required to spend three consecutive quarters in residence in full-time study (*at least ten weeks and complete ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and complete ten quarter hours during the summer quarter*). The University operates four full quarters per year (Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer). A student must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, he must write and defend an acceptable dissertation.

DOCTOR OF EDUCATION

A two-year program beyond the master's degree, the Doctor of Education degree requires course work and research of a professional nature. All candidates are required to spend three consecutive quarters in residence in full-time study (*at least ten weeks and complete ten quarter hours per quarter; eight weeks attendance and complete ten quarter hours during the summer quarter*). The University operates four full quarters per year (Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer). A student must earn a minimum of 72 quarter hours of credit and pass comprehensive examinations. In addition, he must write and defend an acceptable dissertation.

DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY

A two-year program beyond the master's degree or a three-year program beyond the baccalaureate degree, the Doctor of Philosophy degree requires course work and research to prepare graduate students for creative and meaningful teaching at the college level in one of the following areas: College Student Personnel Work; and Research and Statistical Methodology.



FINANCIAL INFORMATION

TUITION AND FEES

All rates quoted are those estimated for Summer Quarter 1975 and are subject to a provision that the University reserves the right to change tuition, fees and other charges without notice. As with all state-supported institutions, the rates are affected by legislative action which may not be finalized until late spring of any given year.

(If a student was not enrolled full-time--for more than six credit hours--Spring Quarter 1975, he does not have health insurance coverage for the Summer Quarter of 1975. This insurance can be obtained only by requesting coverage at registration or at the Student Health Center during the first week of the quarter.)

Tuition and Student Services Fees are incurred during each quarterly registration period and are due and payable at the time shown on the billing which is mailed to the student each quarter. Charges are assessed for the total of partial or full programs whether taken for credit or non credit.

ADDITIONAL FEES

Special Program Fees such as bowling, field trips, golf, etc. are billed at cost. Extra charges are incurred for programs leading to the Specialist in Education and Doctoral degrees. Consult the 1975-76 Undergraduate or Graduate School Catalog for all itemizations of extra fees and assessments. No graduate phasing fees will be altered or refunded if a registrant fails to pursue his program or for any reason drops out of the course of study into which he has been accepted.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Nearly all scholarships or waivers of tuition issued apply only to the fall, winter and spring quarters. Holders of special scholarships having questions about their prospective awards should inquire about their status to the respective departments authorized to confirm their award or to the Office of Financial Aids.

RESIDENT, NON-RESIDENT STATUS

Determination of status as a resident of Colorado for tuition paying purposes is fixed at registration. Colorado Revised Statutes 1966 as amended 1973, fix state regulations which apply for all state institutions of higher education in Colorado.

REFUND POLICY

To be eligible for a refund of any kind, the student must present a formal, approved Notice of Withdrawal or an Add-Drop Slip at the Accounting Office. Forms may be obtained from the Records Office.

Partial refunds for full-quarter classes are granted only for early withdrawals. No refund will be granted for special, short-period classes after the first meeting of the class. Please consult the 1975-76 Undergraduate or Graduate School Catalog for the specific refund policies of the University.





SINGLE

University housing is available in residence halls for single men and women. All accommodations in the residence halls include room and board. The rooms are arranged to accommodate two persons per room.

Room and Board: \$390.00 per person for the summer quarter.*

FAMILY

The University offers family housing in two residence halls containing house-keeping facilities for married students with one or two children or for couples without children.

Furnished suites with Kitchenette: Turner Hall, \$350.00 and Lawrenson Hall, \$400.00.

Cafeteria meal service is available on an optional basis.

*Rates quoted above are subject to a provision of the Trustees that the university reserves the right to change rates prior to the beginning of any academic quarter.

OFF-CAMPUS

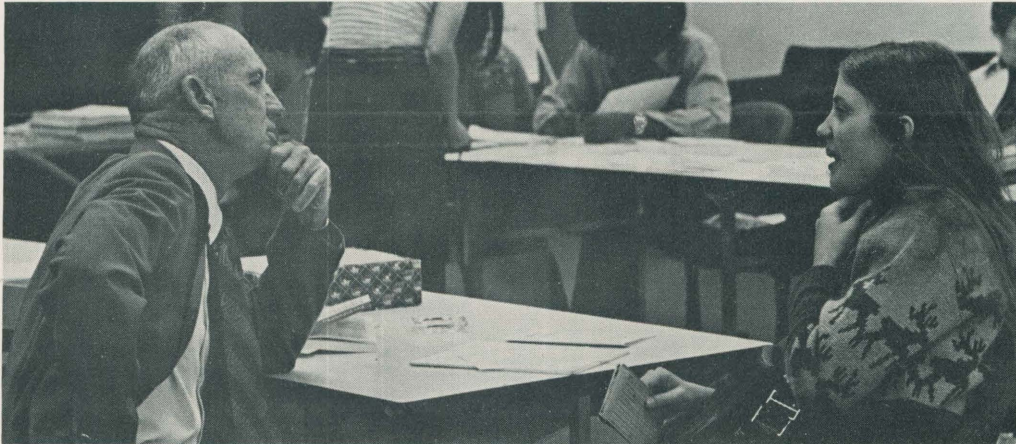
Many students find rooms, apartments and houses in the Greeley area. Room and apartment listings are available to any student who desires to contact the Housing Office. Arrangements for accommodations with private householders cannot be made by the Housing Office, but must be conducted by the student directly with the landlord. Students and landlords are both advised to have a clear understanding, preferably in writing, as to facilities, privileges, prices and intended length of tenancy.

APPLICATION FOR CAMPUS HOUSING

Address correspondence to the Housing Office, Gordon Hall, University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, Colorado 80639.

If after applying, the student desires to cancel his application for either single or family housing in the residence halls for Summer Quarter, he should notify the Director of Housing, in writing. The following policy will apply:

Cancellations for Summer Quarter received before May 15, 1975, \$25 will be refunded. **There are no refunds for applications made and then cancelled after May 15, 1975.**



GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

Proper registration is the responsibility of each student. No person may register for another student. The University does not have facilities for registering "In Absentia" or at times other than those designated in these instructions. Students should read the catalog and know course requirements, and register for both regular classes and workshops at the same time. Registration is scheduled for **Monday, June 16**. *Students attending workshops, 8 and 10 week classes should register for their entire summer program at that time.* Students attending workshops only may register in person before the first class session.

Eight and ten week classes begin June 17. No registration for 8 and 10 week classes will be permitted after 3:00 p.m., June 20. **All holds must be cleared before registration.**

CONTACT ADVISER

After obtaining your supplies, contact your adviser in his office on June 13 or June 16 (except undergraduate majors in Anthropology, Business, Economics, Elementary Education, Fine Arts, Geography, History, Home Economics, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology and graduate majors in CSPW). If you do not know who your adviser is, please go to the departmental office of your major. All cards must be completed and the Emergency Locator-Second Preference Card must be signed by your adviser before you will be permitted to register. Second Preference courses should be approved Alternate Courses (not sections).

Unclassified Graduate Students and those not following a degree program will report to Student Council Room, University Center, at Registration. None of the work taken by a graduate student who is enrolled in an unclassified status may be counted in meeting the minimum residence requirements.

Report to the appropriate department stations in the Ballroom, **University Center**, to pick up the class cards. If you have a schedule conflict, a faculty member "trouble shooter" will be available to assist you. If a course is closed for which you are registering, the Second Preference Courses Schedule will be used to make up a complete schedule. Undergraduate students may not enroll for 600-700 level courses. Juniors and Seniors may enroll in 500 level courses with permission. All courses for which you are registering must show on the **Emergency Locator Card** and be initialed by the authorized departmental representative. This is your official study program. Proceed to the checking stations to leave your packet.

FEE PAYMENT

Veterans on G.I. Bill should report to the Veteran's Affairs Office and Students with Financial Aid (Vocational Rehabilitation and All scholarships and grants) report to Office of Financial Aid, Carter Hall, during the week of Registration. Students will be billed for fees and tuition on or about July 1, 1975, at rates per credit hour as approved at that time and according to their current resident status. Students must present all copies of the Bill to the Accounting Office according to their scheduled day as shown on the Bill. Payment of the amount due should be made on this day.

A late fee of \$5.00 the first day and \$2.00 for each additional day will be charged.

Students registering for 8 and 10 week courses who complete registration after June 16 will be assessed a late registration fee at the rate of \$5.00 the first day and \$2.00 each additional day. (See Calendar on page 23 for last day of Registration.)

WORKSHOPS

Registration for workshops may be completed at registration June 16 or at the Records Office, Frasier 126, on the first day of the particular workshop offered. Students must register in person before the first class session. It is the student's responsibility to learn when his first class meets. Withdrawals from workshops must be made before the workshop ends.

A student may register for a class for no credit by paying appropriate tuition and fees. No audit or visitors cards are issued -- only "no credit" cards.

GRADUATION

10:00 a.m., Saturday, August 23, in the Garden Theatre. Students are encouraged to attend graduation. Those who choose not to participate must notify the Office of the Registrar (Graduate School for graduate students) at least two weeks (August 8) prior to graduation so that appropriate addresses can be confirmed and graduation details can be clarified with Colleges, Schools, and Departments. Students who participate in graduation are required to wear appropriate academic costume. Caps and gowns may be rented from the University Bookstore. No applications for graduation will be accepted after June 27, 1975.

TRANSCRIPTS

Grades for the current quarter will not be available for at least two weeks after the close of the quarter.

SPECIAL EVENTS

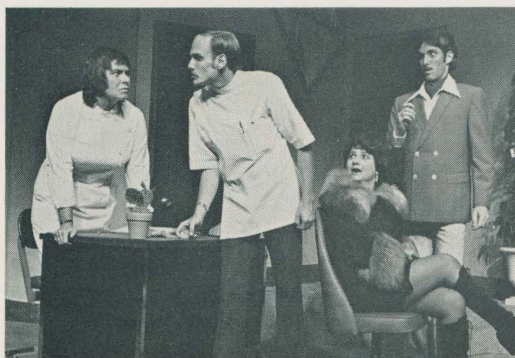

Workshop: Simulation and Gaming Techniques in Vocational Education

Workshop in Fine Arts:

Design and Illustration for Non-Art Majors

FA 331-531 July 21-August 8 3 hrs. credit

(Class meets 9:05 to 11:00 MTWThF)

Working in their own area of designing interest, students use different types of drawing and painting mediums, separately and in combinations, to learn basic techniques and methods of presentation. Areas of interest may be drawn from industrial, commercial, architectural, mechanical, literary, scientific or other. Specific course requirements will vary with the level of instruction.

Workshop in Fine Arts:

Intermediate and Advanced Ceramics

FA 331-531 August 4-15 3 hrs. credit

(Class meets 9:05 to 4:00 MTWThF)

Steamboat Springs, Colorado (Scandinavian Lodge)

Bring your own Potter's wheel (or use one of the five that will be available) to the Scandinavian Lodge in Steamboat Springs for an intensive two weeks of work with clay. Instruction will be offered in intermediate and advanced wheel throwing, handbuilding, decorating techniques, glazing, kiln stacking and firing and raku. Understanding Children's Art

FA 398-598 June 17-July 18 3 hrs. credit

(Class meets 9:05 to 11:00 MWF)

A survey of the seven prevalent theories of understanding children's art with distinctions made between children's art and school art. Students are encouraged to examine the prevalent theories and to develop a personal understanding of children's

art forms from pre-school through adolescence. This course will be of help to any teacher in any grade level. Specific course requirements will vary with level of instruction.

**Workshop in Fine Arts:
Science and Technology in Modern Art**
FA 331-531 June 17-August 22 3 hrs. credit
(Class meets 1:25 to 2:15 MWF)

An investigation of the relationship of modern art to developments in physics, psychology, and technology. Some of the topics deal with the influence of relativity physics on cubism, the effect of psychoanalysis on Abstract Expressionism, Kinetic and Light Art, and Computer Graphics. Emphasis is placed on discussion and individual research. No previous art history is required. Specific course requirements will vary with level of instruction.

**Workshop in Fine Arts:
Museum Experience**
FA 331/531-3 Saturdays, June 21, 28, July 12, 19
3 hrs. credit
Denver Art Museum

Denver area teachers have available to them one of the finest museums in the midwest. By becoming familiar with the museum, the teacher and student will gain confidence in their ability to relate the contents of the museum to others in a meaningful way. Emphasis will be placed on approaching the arts of the past so they are not simply monuments of the dead, but are as alive and vital as our own times. Enrollment will be on a first come, first-served basis at registration. There will be no preregistration for this class. The last three classes of the course will be held at the Denver Art Museum; the first class will be in Carter Hall, room 303. Specific course requirements will vary according to level of instruction.

**Workshop in Fine Arts:
Printing Without a Press**

(Class meets 9:05 to 12:05 MTWThF)

A new art education course designed to acquaint the student with a variety of printing processes that do not require a press and would be applicable in public school situations both elementary and secondary. Specific course requirements will vary according to level of instruction.

HOME ECONOMICS

**Workshop in Home Economics:
Exploration of Occupations in Home Economics**
HEC 508 July 14-25 6 hrs. credit
(Class meets 8:00 to 3:00 MTWThF)

An opportunity to survey home economics occupations through field trips to business and industries in the Denver metropolitan and Greeley area. Increased awareness of environmental influences and their inter-relationship to ones near environment will be developed through observation assignments, discussion and readings. Consideration will be given to alignment of resources which affect the well being of individuals in the near environment.

**Workshop in Home Economics:
Partnership in Learning -- Reading and Home Economics**
HEC 508 June 17-July 11 3 hrs. credit
(Class meets 1:25 to 4:25 TTh)

A workshop designed to assist in the effective teaching of home economics through improved level of reading. Included will be techniques for determining student difficulties in reading home economics textbooks and materials, for assessing the reading levels of the materials, and for including the prescribed vocabulary and study skills as a part of the home economics lesson. Time will be given in rewriting some materials to a lower level and in preparing other teaching aids. Applications of reading skills will include those needed in vocational and occupational programs.

**Workshop in Home Economics:
Think Metric**
HEC 508 August 11-15 1 hr. credit
(Class meets 1:25 to 3:20 MTWThF)

Metrication is inevitable. The workshop will explain the logic and convenience of the metric system.

Leathercraft (first five weeks)
IA 216/516-1 June 17-July 18 3 hrs. credit
(Class meets 7:00 to 8:50 MTWThF)

Leathercraft (second five weeks)
IA 216/516-3 July 21-August 22 3 hrs. credit
(Class meets 9:05 to 11:00 MTWThF)

Development of the basic skills in leathercraft, including designing, tooling, carving, and constructing leather projects for the industrial arts programs, such as general shop, camp activities, and recreation programs. Specific course requirements will vary with the level of instruction.

**World of Manufacturing
IACP Workshop**
IA 308/508-7 June 17-July 18 3 hrs. credit
(Class meets 1:25 to 4:30 MTWThF)

The objective of this workshop is to familiarize the participants with the Industrial Arts Curriculum Project materials developed. Opportunity will be provided for hands on activity and for intensive study of the methods and materials developed by the IACP staff. Specific course requirements will vary with the level of instruction.

Industrial Plastics

Development of skills and knowledge in the use of thermosetting and thermoplastic materials with emphasis on industrial applications including designing and construction of molds and forms. Specific course requirements will vary with the level of instruction.

Problems in Drafting and Planning

IA 462/662-3 July 21-August 22 3 hrs. credit

(Class meets 9:05 to 11:00 MTWThF)

Objectives, course content, practices and teaching procedures in selected areas of drafting. Problems and assignments are set in terms of individual needs. Specific course requirements will vary with the level of instruction.

Electronic Circuit Applications -- Color TV Fundamentals

IA 480/680-7 August 4-15 3 hrs. credit

(Class meets 1:25 to 4:30 MTWThF)

Workshop designed for industrial arts teachers to explain basic principles of color tv to those familiar with basic electronics. Through the courtesy of the Electronics Industries Association and member color tv manufacturers, students will be given an opportunity to analyze the latest color tv's with solid state chassis for a real "hands-on" experience. Field engineers and industry trained instructors will be available for consultation and teaching. Specific course requirements will vary with the level of instruction.

The processes and principles of welding including oxy-acetylene, arc, TIG and MIG welding. Consideration given to principles of teaching, course content, welding supplies and equipment suitable for the teaching of welding at the secondary and junior college levels.

History and Philosophy of Industrial Education

IA 633-3 June 17-July 18 5 hrs. credit

(Class meets 9:05 to 11:00 MTWThF)

A study of the origin and development of the proposals and movements in industrial education together with a consideration of the philosophical thought of selected leaders.

Organization of the Metal Shop

IA 674-3 July 21-August 22 3 hrs. credit

(Class meets 9:05 to 11:00 MTWThF)

Includes objectives, course content, shop organization, evaluation and problems of teaching the various phases of metalwork.

Undergraduate General Education Courses

Beginning 1973-74 Catalog

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Students completing a Bachelor's degree at the University of Northern Colorado will complete a program of General Education which includes a minimum of sixty (60) quarter hours selected and distributed according to the following guides:

1. Courses specified in any way toward meeting the requirements for the student's first major may not count in the General Education Program. (This includes prerequisites for major courses.)
2. Courses required in the Professional Teacher Education (PTE) core as well as courses dealing with teaching methodology or pedagogical principles will NOT count toward meeting the General Education requirements.
3. Courses for General Education should be spread over the four undergraduate years.

The student will select courses from the offerings in each of five categories.

I. A minimum of two courses from each of the following two categories:

a) Communications

Courses in the communications area should help the student to develop the ability to communicate logically and clearly. Communications, English (Language, Linguistics), Foreign Language, Journalism, Mathematics.

b) Professional and Applied Studies

Courses in this category will offer the student an opportunity to explore areas available for avocational interests. Aerospace Studies, Business, Fine Arts, Health, Home Economics, Industrial Arts, Music, Nursing, Physical Education, Recreation, Theatre Arts, and Vocational Education.

II. A minimum of three courses from each of the following three categories:

a) Social and Behavioral Sciences

Courses in this category are concerned with helping the student understand himself, organized society, and his relationship to it. Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology.

b) Humanities and Integrative Studies

Courses in this category are concerned with the heritage and creative achievement of man and how they speak to human concerns. Black Studies, Education, English (Literature), History, Humanities, Philosophy, Interdisciplinary Courses, and Mexican American Studies.

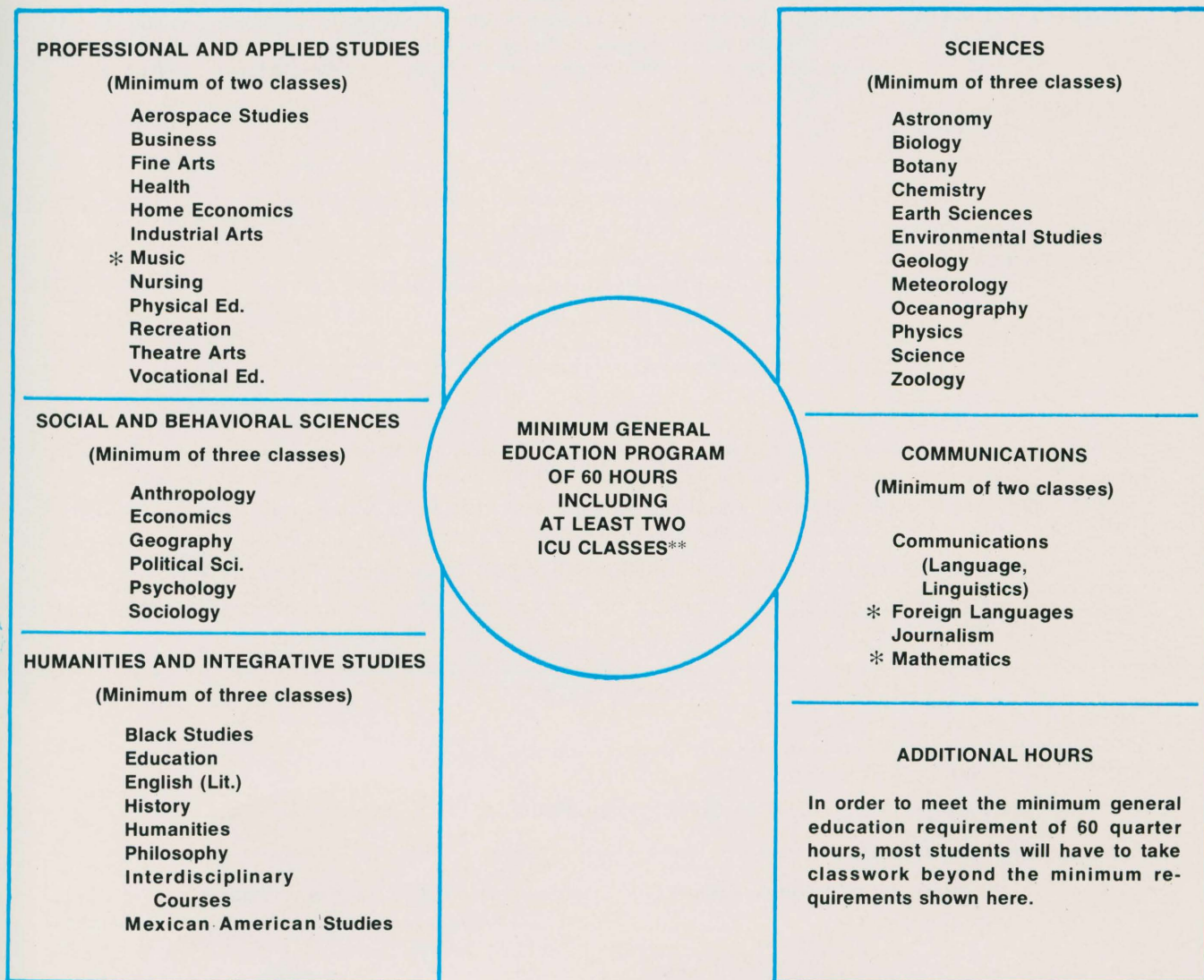
c) Sciences

General Education work in this area will provide the student with tools for understanding what science is and how specific knowledge is arrived at. Astronomy, Biology, Botany, Chemistry, Earth Science, Environmental Studies, Geology, Meteorology, Oceanography, Physics, Science, and Zoology.

III. The student will select additional hours from the course offerings of the various departments other than his major to meet the minimum requirement of sixty (60) quarter hours.

IV. Of the required sixty (60) hours of General Education, a minimum of two (2) Instructor-Course Units (ICU) must be taken from different instructors. These units, in the form of courses will be announced as they become available. A STUDENT IS NOT LIMITED TO TWO ICU'S. He may take ICU Courses to meet the category requirements above; he may even take such courses in his major should they become available.
