

University of Northern Colorado Series XLII, February, 1992, No.1. The University maintains an educational record for each student who is or has been enrolled at the University. In accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended (hereafter "Act"), the following student rights are covered by the Act and afforded to all eligible students at the University.

- 1. The right to inspect and review information contained in the student's educational records.
- 2. The right to request amendment of the contents of the student's educational records if believed to be inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy or other rights.
- The right to prevent disclosure without consent, with certain exceptions, of personally identifiable information from the student's educational records.

Parents of dependent students as defined by Internal Revenue Code of 1954, Section 152 as amended are exceptions. All students under age 21 shall be assumed dependent unless the student notifies the Registrar's Office in writing when they consider themselves to be of independent status of a student 21 years of age or older or one who has notified the Registrar's Office of his/her independent status, a certified copy of the parent's most recent federal income tax form shall be required before any educational records or components thereof shall be released to the parents of the student.

- 4. The right to secure a copy of the University's policy.
- 5. The right to file complaints with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the University to comply with the provisions of the Act.

Each of these rights, with any limitations or exceptions, is explained in the University's policy statement, a copy of which may be obtained in the Registrar's Office.

The items listed below are designated as Directory Information and may be released as to any student for any purpose at the discretion of the University unless a written request for nondisclosure is on file:

Category I: Name, addresses, telephone number, dates of attendance, classification.

Category II: Previous institution(s) attended, major field of study, awards, honors, degree(s) conferred.

Category III: Past and present participation in officially recognized sports and activities, physical factors of athletes (height and weight), date and place of birth.


Current eligible students may prohibit general disclosure of this Directory Information by notifying the Registrar's Office in writing, specifying the categories to be withheld, within 10 calendar days after the first scheduled class day of each term. The University will honor the request until the student notifies the Registrar's office in writing to allow the release of directory information. The student should carefully consider the consequences of any decision to withhold any category of Directory Information. Regardless of the effect upon a student, the University assumes no liability that may arise out of its compliance with a request that such information be withheld. It will be assumed that the failure on the part of a student to request the withholding of Directory Information indicates the student's consent to disclosure.

Any questions concerning the student's rights and responsibilities under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act should be referred to the Registrar's Office.





Welcome



Summer at UNC

There is a mystique about Colorado, a beckoning. It has called travelers here, often to a new frontier, where they have visited or settled, forged adventures, and created legends.

Woven into the heritage of the American West is what author and alumnus James A. Michener has called a "feisty" institution, today's University of Northern Colorado.

In 1889 Governor Job A.Cooper signed legislation creating this "State Normal School.." Today only four other institutions in the nation surpass our university in the number of teachers they train. But more than that, with more than 10,000 students in graduate and undergraduate programs each year, UNC has not only become a world leader in teacher preparation, but has created other excellent academic programs in the arts and sciences, business, health and human sciences, and the performing and visual arts.

The UNC Summer Session has become a celebrated tradition too. Thousands of professionals in education and other fields will travel to Greeley to enhance their professional life. Those who come will find a major state university operating on the semester system. Besides its continuing excellence, they'll find the University's highly personalized academic environment enhanced by the interaction of regular Summer faculty, guests and about 5,000 students.

They will find an environment featuring a 236-acre campus with greenery, open space, ivy-covered buildings and modern educational facilities, including a library system with more than 1.2 million holdings and computerized access to millions more.

An Ideal Location

Greeley, a city of more than 63,000 friendly people, offers a special blend of tranquility and energy, culture, and the western spirit. The summer home of the Denver Broncos, it affords and often celebrates a rural lifestyle, while providing cultural events and entertainment that rival those in major metropolitan areas.

Denver is only an hour's drive away with its cosmopolitan amenities. And summer in Colorado just wouldn't be complete without a visit to one of the nation's greatest natural assets — Rocky Mountain National Park — only an hour west of Greeley.



The Summer Format

Summer Session is divided into three individual sessions; a four-week Interim Session from May 11 to June 5, a one-week Pre-Session from June 8 to June 12, and an eight-week Regular Session from June 16 to August 7 that includes courses that run in a variety of length, from one day to one week to four weeks.

This scheduling format is designed to serve our varied audience as fully as possible. A variety of undergraduate and graduate courses are available. Summer Session courses and workshops are offered in intensive time formats, but there is no reduction in their academic requirements.




For the Kids Too

- The Campus Child Care Center provides care for children 6 weeks to 5-1/2 years of age. Every effort is made to accommodate the variety of short-term needs that occur as a result of the summer's schedule. Enrollment priority is for full-time, full-week care. Due to great demand and limited space, early application is recommended. Contact the Campus Child Care Center, phone (303) 351-2071.

Summer Only

Undergraduate students planning to attend UNC Summer Session only must return the Statistical Information and Course Selection forms in the back of this publication. Attendance in the Summer Session does not assure admission for subsequent semesters. Official application for admission must be made if you are planning to continue a degree program at UNC.


Freshmen

If you are entering UNC as a degree candidate for the first time, write to the Admissions office for information and application forms. The Colorado Commission on Higher Education has set admissions standards for all state universities. Standardized test scores and a high school transcript are required, and will be reviewed by the UNC staff.

Transfers

The University accepts a maximum of 90 semester or 135 quarter hours of transfer credits for undergraduate programs. No more than 64 semester or 96 quarter hours of credit may be accepted from accredited junior or community colleges.

Students seeking a degree must submit an official application for admission and a transcript from each college they have attended. Transfer applicants who have completed less than 30 semester hours or 45 quarter hours at other institutions must also submit a high school transcript and standardized test scores. Application forms are available from the Office of Admissions.




Graduate Applications

Contact the Graduate School for application forms. Graduate Record Examination Aptitude Test scores must accompany the doctoral application.

Unclassified Graduates

An unclassified graduate student (not officially admitted to a graduate degree program) may sign up for classes by reporting directly to the Registration Center or by using the mail-in selection form in the back of this publication. Only 10 semester hours or 15 quarter hours (or like combination) of unclassified work can be transferred into a degree program. If you have not previously attended UNC, complete the Statistical Information form before or at the time of registration.





Registration

In order to maintain a breadth of course offerings during the semester, many are contingent upon sufficient enrollment and faculty assignment. Minimum enrollments for courses will vary. Register at the earliest possible date in order to increase the likelihood that required course enrollments will be met. Course cancellations usually are announced before the first day of class and will occur no later than that date. In the event of course cancellation, efforts will be made to notify you in advance.

You are responsible for meeting all deadlines in this publication and for fulfilling requirements and policies as stated in the UNC *Bulletin*.

Course selection materials for Summer Session are mailed to students who were enrolled Spring 1992 and/or Summer 1991. You may select classes by telephone for a one-time \$3 charge (351-2825), in person at the Registration Center in the University Center, or by mail, using the form in the back of this publication. Mail-in registrations must include payment. You should register before the beginning of class at the Registration Center, by telephone (351-2825), or by mail. Registration is not complete until the tuition and fee payment process is completed.



In Person

Select courses at the Registration Center, second floor of the University Center, anytime on or after the date that appears on the course selection form mailed to students who were enrolled Spring 1992 and/or Summer 1991.

Beginning April 27, the Registration Center is open to all students for registration and schedule changes on all regular working days between 9 am and 4 pm. Payment for tuition and fees may be made in person or by mail (See Tuition and Fees section in this publication). On Monday, June 15, the Registration Center will be open from 8 am to 4 pm ONLY for those students who have not registered early. You are admitted to the Registration Center at the time assigned below. If your name begins with the following letters, select courses at or after the time indicated.

By Mail

Use the forms in the back of this publication. All course selection forms received by mail must include payment for tuition and fees. To register, complete and mail the Course Selection Mail-In form, Statistical Information form, and the Immunization Record form with your check or money order (payable to University of Northern Colorado) or credit card information to: Registration Center, UNC, Greeley, Colorado 80639. Mail-in registration and payment must be received five working days before the starting date of your first course. Mail-In Course Selection forms received without payment will be returned to you with instructions for completing registration.

By Telephone

You may complete registration transactions, using the touchtone telephone registration system for \$3. The fee is assessed only once during the Summer Session. You may use a touchtone telephone to complete initial class registrations and drop-add transactions virtually any time of the day or night after your assigned initial registration time. If you did not attend UNC during the 1991-92 academic year. you must mail the completed Statistical Information and Immunization Record forms to UNC for processing before calling. Allow two weeks for the University to process these forms.

The Personal Access Code (PAC) required for telephone registration is 2580 for all students during Summer Semester 1992. For step-by-step instructions, see the form in the back of this publication. Payment of tuition and fees may be made in person or by mail. (See Tuition and Fees section).



Course Audits

Students participating in any course must register for either credit or no credit (audit). If you are registering for no credit (audit) you must indicate 00 hours in the variable credit hours column of the Course Selection form. Tuition and fees are assessed at the same rate for audit as for credit registrations.



Registration

Course Load

During the summer, you may register for a maximum of 2 semester hours of coursework during the one-week Pre-Session (and all other one-week periods in which three-semester-hour classes are taken), 6 semester hours of coursework during the four-week Interim Session, and 10 semester hours of coursework during the eight-week Regular Session. In addition, you may not take more than 16 semester hours during the Summer Session without requesting permission for an overload. The course load limitations refer to work completed in either the on-campus or off-campus programs or in a combination of the two. Additional tuition is charged for every credit hour over 18. A total of 12 to 15 semester hours represents a heavy course load in the summer.

Numbering

Courses numbered 100 to 499 are for undergraduate credit. Those numbered 500 to 799 are for graduate credit. Undergraduates may not enroll in courses numbered 500-799; however, juniors and seniors with cumulative grade point averages of 3.00 may enroll in courses numbered 500.

Restrictions


Several courses listed in this publication are restricted to certain groups of students. The appropriate restriction is indicated under the course title. When such a restriction is noted, you must present to the terminal operator a special Permit to Enroll card obtained from and signed by the course instructor.

PTE Restriction

Professional Teacher Education (PTE) consists of a set of experiences, requirements, courses and proficiency examinations applicable to all students seeking teacher certification. Students wishing to enroll in PTE courses must have completed a screening process; however, some PTE courses may be taken concurrently with the screening process. Students who have already received a Colorado teaching certificate or who have completed an out-of-state teacher certification program and are seeking Colorado certification for the same endorsement are also eligible to enroll in PTE courses and do not need to complete the screening process. To register for PTE courses, contact the Teacher Education Center, McKee 103, (303) 351-2430.

Non-Scheduled Courses

You are permitted to enroll in non-scheduled courses with the permission of a supervising faculty member. Non-scheduled course enrollments are processed at the same time as other course selections at the Registration Center. Use 0746, 0747, or 0748 as the course identification number and indicate the number of hours in the variable credits column on the Course Selection form. For each non-scheduled class, a Non-Scheduled Course form, available from the academic department. is to be completed and presented to the terminal operator at the Registration Center at the time of the transaction. The form must bear the signature of the supervising faculty member and the department chairperson. You may not register for these courses by telephone.



Faculty Drop

A faculty member can at her or his discretion during the drop/add period drop a student who does not attend the first two hours of class in order to make room for other students who wish to enroll. If for some reason you cannot attend the first two clock-hours of class, contact the instructor to guarantee registration. Not all instructors will exercise the option to drop; therefore, you should not rely on the assumption that non-attendance will automatically drop you from class.

Graduation

Graduation is scheduled for 9 am, Saturday, August 8. No application for graduation will be accepted after June 5 (undergraduate) or June 26 (graduate) for Summer commencement. Students who participate in the ceremonies must wear appropriate costume. Caps and gowns may be rented at the UNC Bookstore.

Those eligible who choose not to participate must notify the Registrar (undergraduate) or Graduate School (graduate student) at least two weeks before graduation so that appropriate addresses can be confirmed and graduation details can be clarified.

Registration



Immunization Requirement

Effective Summer Session 1992, Colorado law and state Health Department regulations require all freshmen students enrolled in colleges and universities to submit a certificate of immunization showing proof of immunity to measles, mumps, and rubella or an approved exemption. Regardless of age, all freshmen must submit a certificate of immunization or exemption to the Student Health Center *before* registration.

If there is inadequate proof of immunity, an agreement will need to be signed at the Student Health Center before registration can proceed. In the event the agreement is not met, you will not be allowed to register for the next term or session until the conditions are satisfied.

A college student is defined by the state Board of Health as any student who is enrolled for one or more classes at a college or university who is physically at the institution. This includes students who are auditing classes, but not persons taking correspondence only.

Those born before January 1, 1957, will be granted an immediate exemption upon submitting an immunization certificate, but the record is needed in the event of an outbreak.

The Certificate of Immunization or Exemption is found in the back of this publication. College freshmen born since January 1, 1957, must have had two measles, two mumps, and two rubella doses, the first administered on or after the first birthday and the second at least one month later, or serologic evidence of antibodies to measles, mumps and rubella. Physician diagnosis of disease is not acceptable proof of immunity to measles, mumps, or rubella.

Immunization certificates must be signed by a physician, a nurse, or an authorized representative of any state or local department of health. Certificates signed by a parent, guardian, or student will not be accepted.

A properly signed Statement of Exemption is acceptable. However, in the event of an outbreak, exempted persons will be subject to exclusion from school and quarantine. The University is not responsible for any liability the student may suffer due to an exemption and resulting exclusion and/or quarantine.

Summer 1993, freshmen and sophomores will be required to meet the law described above. Each subsequent year a new class will be added until Summer 1995, when all colleges and university students, undergraduate as well as graduates, will be included in the requirement.

Senior Citizens

Senior citizens (over 60) may register for undergraduate lecture courses for no credit (audit) on a space-available basis without being assessed tuition and fees by using a special form available at the Registration Center.



Drop/Add

Make corrections and other changes to your schedule by completing the Schedule Change form on the reverse side of the Schedule Confirmation form and presenting it to the Registration Center or by using telephone registration. These changes can be made any time after you first select courses for summer until the drop/add deadline. No refunds are given to students withdrawing from classes after the drop/add deadlines noted on the Calendar on page 4.



Withdrawing

You are permitted to withdraw from a class until the mid-point of the course. (See Calendar, page 4.) To withdraw use the Schedule Change form on the reverse side of the Schedule Confirmation form or obtain a Withdrawal form from the Registration Center. Obtain the course instructor's signature and present the form to the Registration Center. Students withdrawing from all courses should contact the Dean of Students Office. Students withdrawing from the University will be charged a withdrawal fee. (See Tuition and Fees section of this publication.) Tuition will be charged for courses from which students withdraw.

Expenses

The student (not a parent, guardian, spouse, agency of a foreign government, or other third party) is responsible for the payment of tuition, fees and other charges. You must be prepared to pay the full amount at the beginning of the term or pay one-third of the current term charges plus all prior term charges in order for your balance to be deferred, as explained in the Payment Deferral section of this publication.

All rates quoted in this document are approved by the Board of Trustees and are subject to change.

The surcharge per credit hour for taking more than 18 hours (full-time student) is \$317 for undergraduates, \$338 for graduate students.

Student fees are included in the above rates. Student fees for those enrolled in fewer than 9 credit hours are \$14 per credit hour. Student fees for those enrolled in 9 or more credit hours are \$125 total. General University fees, student fees and health service fees are committed to support essential student activities and programs, the Student Health Center, and the Student Representative Council. You must pay these fees each term, whether or not you make use of the privileges and activities underwritten by the fees.

Tuition and fees are calculated on the total cumulative hours for which you are enrolled in the term. Rates quoted are for full credit hours. Courses with one-half credit hour will be prorated and rounded to the nearest whole dollar.

For financial aid purposes, full-time enrollment is considered 9 hours for undergraduate students or for graduate students. (See Student Financial Resources section in this publication for complete information.)

Course Audits

Students participating in any course must register for either credit or no credit (audit). If you are registering for no credit (audit), you must indicate 00 hours in the variable credit hours column of the Course Selection form. Tuition and fees are assessed at the same rate for audit as well as credit registrations.



Special Savings

The University of Northern Colorado offers its Frontiers of Knowledge institutes at the reduced tuition rate of \$120 per credit hour for out-of-state students. The courses are listed in the Frontiers of Knowledge Institute section. Course fees may vary depending on Institute.

Full-time students (9-18 credit hours) who enroll in a combination of reduced rate workshops and other courses will be charged first for the number of hours in reduced rate workshops at \$120 per credit hour, then for additional hours in other courses at the regular out-of-state rate. The maximum charge for tuition and fees will be for 9 credit hours — a full-time load. Reduced rate workshop credit hours will count toward a full-time load for tuition. Tuition and fees are calculated on the total cumulative hours for which you enroll.

For example, a graduate non-resident student enrolled in one 3-credit-hour reduced-rate workshop and 9 credit hours of other courses and workshops would receive the following savings:

Paying Accounts

All students who register by mail must include full payment with the mail-in registration form. (See Registration section.)

If you register for classes at the Registration Center or by telephone, you will have a Statement of Account and Change of Address form mailed to you. The May 13 billing will be sent to your current/local and home address while the June 17 and July 15 billings will be mailed to your current/local address only.

Your financial obligation to the University must be paid before 4 pm on the above due date. Failure to have all charges paid by July 30 will result in the cancellation of your Summer term classes even if the classes have been completed. (See Re-registration Fee section.)

Make payment at the Accounting Services windows in Carter Hall through one or a combination of the following methods:

- · Payment in full
- Payment through financial aid as approved by the Office of Student Financial Resources
- Payment through the deferral plan as explained in this publication
- Payment through the CASE- UNC plan as explained in this publication
- Payment through VISA or MasterCard

The University of Northern Colorado will not register a student, release a diploma, provide a transcript, or supply placement and other University services to any student or former student who has an outstanding financial obligation to the University other than a loan that is not yet due or on which payments are up to date. Also, failure to pay a financial obligation to the University when it is due may result in your account being placed with a collection agency and such action reported to a credit bureau. In addition, your account may be charged legal allowable collection charges and attorney fees to help secure repayment of the debt owed the University.

Instructional Fees

The Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Board of Trustees approve instructional fees. Courses that have instructional fees approved in addition to tuition have a "Fee Required" notation in the course schedule in this publication. In addition to specific course fees, the following academic program fees for students have been approved by the Board of Trustees:

- Business Major fee, \$15 per semester
- Business Minor fee, \$10 per semester
- Music Major fee, \$15 per semester



States four copies of a thesis, practicum or dissertation study: \$40

- Foreign language examination required for the doctoral program: \$10
- Graduate student continuous registration to allow student to remain in the program during periods of non-enrollment: \$20
- Towel/lock service in Butler-Hancock including clean towel daily and use of locker and lock: \$12 per semester
- Replacement of University identification card: \$5
- Handling of check presented in payment of account that for any reason turns out to be non-negotiable: \$20. (Note that non-negotiable payment is the same as non-payment and may result in cancellation of your enrollment.)

Alumni Association Fee

Students may contribute to the \$1.50 Alumni Association fee during the initial registration process. Contributions support scholarships and alumni programming for students. This is a voluntary option in telephone registration (see Touchtone Telephone Registration Instructions) and on the Mail-In Registration Form.



COPIRG Fee

Optional. In the spring of 1988, students voted to re-certify a chapter of the Colorado Public Interest Research Group (CoPIRG), to be funded by a \$3 waivable fee. CoPIRG is a statewide, student-directed, nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that conducts research, advocacy, and public education on such issues as voter registration, air pollution, good government, tenant's rights, toxic waste, safe drinking water, and consumer protection. Other CoPIRG chapters operate at Colorado State University and Metropolitan State College. Students have the opportunity every 3-4 years to show their support for their CoPIRG chapter and fee through a general student election.

This is a voluntary option in telephone registration (see Touchtone Telephone Registration Instructions) and on the Mail-In Registration Form.If you do not wish to support the UNC CoPIRG chapter, you may waive your CoPIRG fee at the time of initial registration or at the time you pay your bill.



Payment Deferral

A student may use the deferral plan by paying 1/3 of the total current term expenses (tuition, fees, and other charges) by 4 pm. on May 29. A second 1/3 payment plus appropriate deferral fee is due by 4 pm, July 1. The final 1/3 payment is due by 4 pm, July 30. If any amounts remain unpaid after this deadline, a late fee will be assessed and registration for the current and subsequent term will be cancelled.

CASE-UNC

The Credit Available for Student Employees at UNC (CASE) program allows students employed by the University to make arrangements through the Office of Student Employment, a unit of the Office of Student Financial Resources in Carter Hall to apply income from student employment (other than federal work-study) as it is earned to tuition, fees and other charges.



Expenses

If you have not paid your tuition, fees, and other charges within the allotted time, you will be assessed a late fee, based on past due balance, according to the following schedule:

Re-Registration Fee

If you do not pay tuition, fees, and other charges by July 30, you will have your current term schedule of classes cancelled. You may be re-registered, but only into the exact schedule for which you were enrolled at the time of cancellation, and you must pay an additional \$100 re-registration charge. If you are enrolled in zero to less than 9 credit hours, you will be assessed a \$50 fee. Payment must be made in the Accounts Receivable office.

Re-registration may be made only through August 7. No re-registration requests will be considered after this date.

Tuition Adjustment

Changes in tuition, fees, and other charges will occur during the add/drop period if the individual credit hours change from part-time to full-time or vice versa.

Effect of Class Withdrawal

Beginning the first class day, 15 percent of the tuition and fee costs for the class will be assessed. If a student completely withdraws from the University, 100 percent of tuition and fees will be assessed for classes that have been completed.



Cancellation

If classes are cancelled for nonpayment, 15 percent of the tuition and fee costs for those classes will be assessed.

In addition to the above charges, any costs associated with the following fees must be paid: Bookstore charges, deferral, graduation, health insurance, housing damages, ID card replacement, instructional fees, lab equipment not returned, late payments, library fines, lost athletic equipment, lost library books, matriculation, parking fines, short-check service charges, and unpaid short-term loans.

Summer fee payment procedures differ from those during the academic year. Refer to the appropriate class schedule for information.

Students with room and board contracts are assessed amounts based upon rates, policies, and procedures explained in Residence Life contractual materials.

In-State Classification

If you have been domiciled in Colorado for one year or more immediately preceding the first day of classes you may be eligible for in-state tuition classification. A domicile is a "person's true, fixed and permanent home and place of habitation." It differs from the notion of residence or mere physical presence because a person may have only one true domicile at a given time.

To be capable of establishing a Colorado domicile, a person must be 21 years of age or emancipated. Evidence of emancipation includes a person's ability "to meet all financial obligations, including the cost of education," along with "an affidavit from the parents stating their relinquishment of any claim or right to the care, custody and earnings of the minor."

Evidence that a Colorado domicile has been established includes the observance of all mandatory duties imposed on domiciliaries. State requirements concerning auto registration, driver's license, and payment of state income tax must be met for the full one-year period.

A student's tuition classification is determined before or at the time of registration. If, at a later date, you think that the tuition classification is no longer correct, you may petition for a change. Petitions must be submitted to the Registrar's office no later than the 10th day of classes for the given term.

Active-duty Armed Forces personnel and their dependents stationed in Colorado on a permanent change-of-station basis may contact the Registrar's office for information about qualifications for the lower in-state tuition rates.



Residence Life

Residence Hall Rooms

Residence halls house single undergraduate and graduate men and women. Two suite-styled, two-person rooms are joined by a vanity area. Rooms are furnished and utilities are paid except for long distance phone charges. Air conditioning is not available. Laundry, computer, television and music rooms are located in the building. A limited number of rooms for disabled students are available.

West Campus Apartments

Air-conditioned, high-rise buildings house single graduate students and those with families. Each apartment houses four persons. Apartments are furnished and utilities are paid except for long distance phone charges. Apartments have two bedrooms, a living room area, bath and kitchenette. Laundry, television, and music rooms are located in the buildings. Residence hall rooms (suite-style, not air conditioned) may be substituted if space is not available in the apartments. Meal service is also provided daily in a nearby air-conditioned dining room. Economical meal plans can be purchased, or you may purchase meals on a weekly or cash basis. Applicable city and state taxes is charged on food and lodging.

Student Family Apartments

Located at 509 18th Street, this facility provides economical housing for families with up to three children. To be eligible, a family member must be registered for at least the eight-week Summer Session or pre-registered for Fall semester. Most units are furnished and utilities are paid except telephone service. This facility has 93 apartments, a children's playground, laundry area, and recreation room. A limited number of apartments for disabled students are available. These units are not air-conditioned. Economical and convenient meal plans can be purchased for use in West Campus dining room or in the Food Court and Zachariah's at the University Center. The number of apartments is limited, and contracts should be secured as soon as possible. For more information, call the complex director at (303) 351-2570.

Meal Plan Requirements

Freshmen who are under 20 years of age and living in a residence hall must carry a full meal plan (breakfast, lunch and dinner, Monday-Sunday). All other undergraduate residents must carry either a full meal plan or choose between breakfast, lunch and dinner Monday-Friday or lunch and dinner Monday-Sunday. Brunch replaces lunch and dinner on Saturday and Sunday. Graduate and/or re-entry (at least 25 years of age) residents of Harrison must contract for any of the 10 optional meal plans offered. Purchase of a meal plan allows students to dine in air-conditioned Harrison Dining Room or the Food Court or Zachariah's at the University Center.

Housing Application

University Residence Life application materials and rates for students enrolled in courses for eight, twelve, or thirteen weeks this summer will be sent upon request by writing to Residence Life, Carter Hall, UNC, Greeley, Colorado 80639 or calling (303) 351-2721. Return your completed contract with the \$100 deposit to the same address. Note that the academic year contract is separate from the summer contract. Academic year (August-May) housing materials are sent after you are admitted to the University.



Student Services

· Parking

Parking at the University is by permit only. Summer Session permits are available for \$13 from Parking Services, Gray Hall, phone 351-1971. Vehicle registration is required. An application is included in this publication for summer students wishing to mail their permit orders.

Weekly permits are available for \$5 from Parking Services and the residence hall offices. Summer students who will be on campus less than a week may purchase daily permits (\$1 each) from the red dispensers located in student lots. A limited number of metered spaces also are provided in most parking lots.

Parking spaces for wheelchair and handicapped students are located in each campus lot, but a permit to use them is required from Parking Services. Call the Parking Services office if you need assistance, and arrangements will be made to meet you in the Parking Services lot. Wheelchair permits also can be purchased from the Resources for the Disabled office in McKee Hall.

Only during the Summer Session will no parking permit be required in J lot, the large parking lot south of West Campus residence halls (McCowen, Lawrenson, Turner and Harrison).

Parking Services hours are Monday-Friday, 8 am - 5 pm through Spring semester, and 7:30 am - 4 pm Summer semester.

ID Cards

All new students and returning students who have not enrolled at UNC since Fall 1981 are expected to have a photograph taken for their University ID card at the Michener Library circulation desk. Students selecting classes by mail should have their photographs taken during the first week of the semester. This ID is required to check out library materials, use recreation facilities, and purchase student tickets to campus events.

Bookstore

The University Bookstore, located in the University Center, provides a complete line of textbooks, general books, computers, academic supplies, gift items, and collegiate clothing. A textbook "buy-back" is held at the end of each semester. The Bookstore is open 7:45 am - 5 pm Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday; 7:45 am - 7 pm Wednesday, and 11 am - 3 pm Saturday.



Financial Aid

The Office of Student Financial Resources administers several types of state and federal aid programs including grants, loans, employment, scholarships and veterans' benefits.

Funding for Summer Session, usually limited due to fiscal year-end expenditures, is awarded on a "priority" basis to continuing UNC students. However, students who are attending only the Summer term or who are enrolling in classes for the first time during Summer term may apply for a Stafford Loan. Those not eligible for this "need-based" loan may apply for the Supplemental Loan for Students (SLS) or Parent Loans for Undergraduate Students (PLUS). Applications are available from any bank, credit union, or savings and loan that participates in the Colorado Student Loan Program.

A supplemental summer application available from the Office of Student Financial Resources is required. It is due March 1. Continuing students will be considered for the Pell Grant, Stafford Loan, and the SLS/PLUS loan if they have not already reached their annual maximums. Loan applications will be accepted beginning April 15.

If you have already filed a United Student Aid Fund Singlefile Form (SF) or an ACT Family Financial Statement (FFS) for the 1991-92 academic year, you will not need to complete another one for summer. Simply submit the supplemental summer application and a loan application. If you have not filed a Need Analysis Report, you must do so before we can determine your loan eligibility. The USAF (SF) or the ACT (FFS) forms can be obtained from any college or university financial aid office. Complete and mail the form as soon as possible. It takes approximately four to six weeks to be processed. Applications must be received by the processor no later than May 1, 1992.

Student Services



Loans for Summer term may be obtained for full-time or half-time attendance. For the Summer term only, all students (graduate and undergraduate) enrolled in 9 semester hours will be considered full-time and all enrolled in at least 5 hours will be considered half-time. Hours completed during the Interim and Pre-Session may be included in this total; however, funds will be disbursed only during the eight-week session. Those attending only the one- and/or four-week session, will not be eligible for Summer financial assistance.

Example

Four-week Interim Session = no aid

One-week Pre-Session = no aid

Eight-week Regular Session in combination with four- and/or one-week hours totaling 5 credit hours = half-time eligibility

Eight-week Regular Session in combination with four- and/or one-week hours totaling 9 credit hours = full-time eligibility

Transcripts

Official transcripts with Summer Session grades are available within two weeks after the last day of the semester. Transcripts with degrees awarded Summer Semester are available three weeks after commencement. Order transcripts from the Registrar's office, Carter 3002. The student's signature and a \$3 fee per transcript are required.

When ordering a transcript, identify any specific Summer Semester course to be included. When all desired grades are posted on records, normal processing time is two working days after receipt of

the request. Faculty must submit grades to the Registrar's office by 4 pm of the third working day after the end of a course. Grade changes or corrections are not accepted after the first two weeks of the academic semester after the receipt of the original grade by the Registrar's office.

Student Health Services

Health services at UNC are available to all enrolled students, and you are encouraged to use the Student Health Service just as you would other out-patient health facilities. The Health Center staff encourages you to make your health a priority, to seek care in the early stages of an illness, and to follow advice given by our Health Center professionals.

Student Health Services is supported entirely by student fees; no tuition or state appropriations are used. The mandatory health fee is included in the fees paid by all students to give all students access to the Health Center. A student's spouse may elect to pay the full health service fee, which is the same as for full-time students.

The staff includes nurse specialists, nurse practitioners and physicians contracted from the Greeley community. Call for appointments as early in the day as possible in order to receive full advantage of services. Each time you request services, you will be asked to show your current University ID card. If you have not turned in your Health History form, you will be required to complete the form before being seen by the medical staff.

Basic Services covered by your prepaid health fee include assessments by staff nurses, appointments with physicians based on nurse referral, diagnostic laboratory studies up to \$45 per semester with non-credit workshop participants excluded, first aid, health education, alcohol/drug evaluation, limited medications, and supplies. Additional services available at a fee include allergy

testing, allergy injections, screening for student teaching, injections (PPD, MR, DT), women's annual health exam, limited prescriptions, over-the-counter drugs, and nursing clearances, etc. Phone: (303) 351-2412.

Health Insurance


Health insurance is optional during the Summer Session. However, students who paid the insurance premium during the Spring semester are automatically covered during the Summer Session. Students new to the campus during the summer may purchase the health insurance plan. The student insurance premium for Summer 1992 is \$175. Contact the Student Health Insurance Office for additional information, phone (303) 351-1915.

Touchtone Phone Registration and Grade Information

If you are a new student or have not attended UNC Fall or Spring semester, mail your statistical information form and the immunization form to UNC for processing before using the touchtone telephone registration system. Allow two weeks for processing.

A \$3 usage fee paid each term allows students to register for classes and/or obtain term grades and financial aid information.



The New West Institute

Changes in demographics, economic patterns, environmental awareness, and political power have attracted the attention of students to the "New West." Their ideas and conclusions have challenged the prevailing view of a rural, agricultural, male-dominated world that shaped this region in the nineteenth century.

This summer, in order to help you organize the flow of information appearing constantly about new topics and themes of the American West, the UNC history department is offering the following sequence of short courses for undergraduate and graduate students, and especially teachers of history and related social studies disciplines.

Gender and the American West

Study women's participation in the development of the western United States. Earlier generations of western scholars emphasized the building of political and economic institutions in the youngest part of the country and ignored the roles that women played in both the public and private West. Topics and lecturers include::

The Old West and the Role of the Gender: Michael Welsh, history department, UNC, who teaches and writes western social and cultural history.

Women and the Western City: Virginia Scharff, history department, University of New Mexico. Dr. Scharff teaches 20th century U.S. social history, and is the author of *Taking the Wheel: Women and the Coming of the Motor Age*

Women of Color and the History of the West: Sarah J. Deutsch, history department, Clark University. Dr. Deutsch teaches Western and women's history, and is the author of No Separate Refuge: Culture, Class, and Gender on an Anglo Hispanic Frontier in the American Southwest, 1880-1940.

Women and the Land: The 19th Century: Elizabeth Jameson, director of women's studies, history department, University of New Mexico. Dr. Jameson is the author of *The Women's West*, and of a forthcoming book, *All That Glitters: Class, Culture and Community in Cripple Creek*.

Families and Children on the Western Frontier: Elliott West, history department, University of Arkansas. Dr. West teaches social and cultural history of the West, and has written Growing Up with the Country: Childhood on the Far Western Frontier.

Professional Women on the Western Frontier: Charles E. Rankin, editor, *Montana Magazine of Western History.* Rankin is the author of "Teaching: Opportunity and Limitation for Wyoming Women," in *Western Historical Quarterly.*

Public Images of Western Women: Sandra Schackel, history department, Boise State University. Dr. Schackel teaches western women's history and has written "The Civilizer, The Saloon Singer, and Their Modern Sister: Women in Western Films," in McDonald, ed. *Shooting Stars: Heroes and Heroines of Western Film.*

Women in Public Places: Toni Dewey, Women of the West Museum Project, Boulder, Colorado.


The Columbian Exchange in the Southwest



Neuropsychologically-Based Assessment and Intervention for Traumatic Brain Injury


Traumatic brain injuries (TBI) affect more than one million youths annually. Recent legislation has brought TBI to national attention and has highlighted the need for training in the area. The effects of brain injury are reflected in learning, behavior, work, play, and relationships with others.

In this institute, case studies and videotaped resources will be used to illustrate the effects of brain injuries on children and adolescents. Specific assessment techniques that contribute to a thorough description of assets and deficits following TBI will be described. Special attention will be given to recovery from TBI, and intervention programs will be covered in educational, vocational, and behavioral areas.

Practitioners in psychology, neuropsychology, private practice, special education, the health sciences, mental health, or others interested in traumatic brain injuries should attend.

American History

Challenging and current instruction in U.S. history, i.e., the American Revolution, Federalist Era, Civil War and New Deal, among others. Each of the six content sessions, along with methodology and materials sessions, will be directed by a nationally-known scholar or a successful AP teacher.

Biology

Review the AP biology exam and discuss testing and grading procedures, course organization and texts. Lab work will include all required labs as well as most of the suggested labs. A field trip is planned to Rocky Mountain National Park. Assistant Director Kathleen Jones is an experienced AP teacher/ reader.

Chemistry

Philosophy and intent of the AP Chemistry program. Course organization, suggested laboratory activities, and appropriate textbooks will be emphasized, as well as a review of the AP chemistry exam and grading procedures. The staff will consist of an experienced AP Chemistry teacher, a university-level chemistry faculty member, and a chemical educator experienced in reading and grading AP exams.

Computer Science

Course content; strategies for teaching, and grading of AP exams will be covered for both A and AB computer science courses. Students should be familiar with Pascal at the level of the A form of the AP exam. Selected, fundamental concepts unique to the AB form of the exam will be presented and used for hands-on experience.

Economics

John Morton, author of the APIP package for the Joint Council, will present this institute. Its features will include practical teaching methods of both AP Macro and AP Micro, as well as content speakers on international, monetary, and new developments in macro theory.

English

Formula for success: dedicated faculty, section leader for the national exam, and question leaders, table leaders, and graders from the national exam.

European History

Telephone Registration

Practice registration

Listed on the Touch-tone Telephone Registration Worksheet are practice student ID numbers and personal access (PAC) codes which you may use to practice registration. You may practice with these numbers for free.

Call 351-2825 – use the practice ID and PAC numbers. Enter 4 to indicate the summer term. If you receive a voice response indicating the number is in use, call again using a different practice number or wait until the number is available.

You will probably find that some classes already appear on the schedule because someone else may have used the practice number before you and did not drop the classes after practicing. If classes are on the schedule, drop all but one of the classes so you can register your requests only. You must leave one class on the schedule because students are required to contact the Dean of Students office at Carter Hall to drop or withdraw from all classes.

To help the next person who wants to practice, call back and drop the classes you added.

Student ID Number

This is your social security number unless you attended before Fall 1971 or have been assigned a special number. If your student identification number is less than nine digits long, enter zeros ahead of your number to make it nine digits in length. After you have entered your student identification number, wait for a voice response.

Optional Fees

CoPIRG fee - This can be waived only on the initial registration of the semester.

If you do not wish to pay the CoPIRG fee you must enter the W key (waive) and wait for a voice response indicating that the fee has been waived.

Alumni Association Fee - You may contribute to the Alumni Association only on the initial registration of the semester. If you wish to pay the fee enter 9 and 1 and wait for a voice response indicationg that the fee has been applied to your bill.

You will not be promted for either of these fee requests. Action must be taken prior to verifying requests.

Special situation codes

• If you wish to audit a course, enter O (zero) and then enter the 4-digit course ID number, and wait for a voice response. You will be charged tuition and student fees for audited courses.

• To register for variable credit courses, enter 1 and then enter the 4-digit course ID number. Enter the desired number of credit hours in two digits (example 01-18), and wait for a voice response.

• Time conflicts, instructor-permissiononly classes, overloads, and other similarly restricted classes cannot be added on the Touch-Tone Telephone Registration System. These classes will require you to have a special permit to enter them. Permit forms for schedule conflicts may be obtained at the Academic departments.

To complete your registration

The V (verify) key or 8 key enters your class requests and leads to termination of the Touch-Tone Telephone Registration. Press this key after all transactions have been entered into the system, and wait for a voice response to tell you which classes have been accepted. If there are no rejected classes, a list of your courses and tuition and student fee information will be given; and the registration session will be terminated. If any of your classes are not accepted, you will be returned to the add and drop functions. Your class schedule transactions are not finalized until the verification step is completed.

To change your registration

After your initial registration has been completed, you may complete drop and/or add transactions.

Students who wish to drop all of their classes must contact the Dean of Students office at 351-2796 Carter Hall - 3005 to complete an exit interview.

Grades by phone

Eight-week session grades will be available after 9 amon Friday, August 14. Interim session, pre-session, short course, and workshop grades will be available as submitted.

Call 351-2825 and enter service code 2 for grades, using your student information number (SIN), which is your birth month and date. Use two digits for month and date - precede a single number with a zero if necessary.

The system will give you your grades for the current term or the date your grades will be available. You will still receive a grade report in the mail.

Cost

A once-per-term fee of \$3 allows you to either register for classes, obtain term grades, or obtain financial aid information.






