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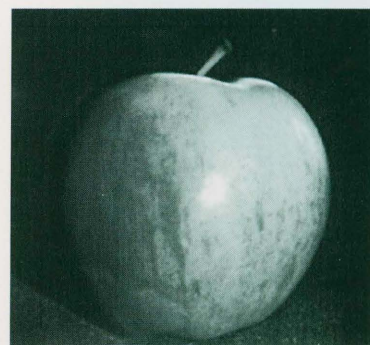

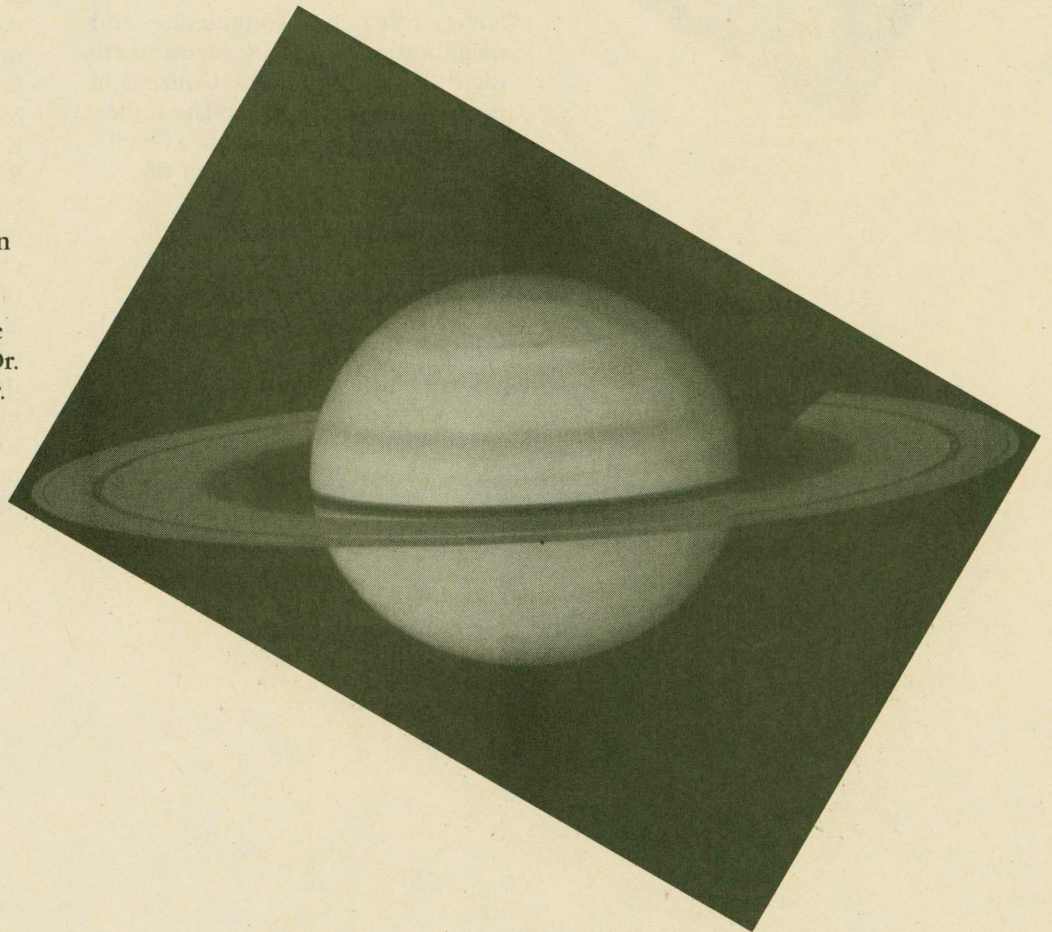

## *UNC Recreation Center*

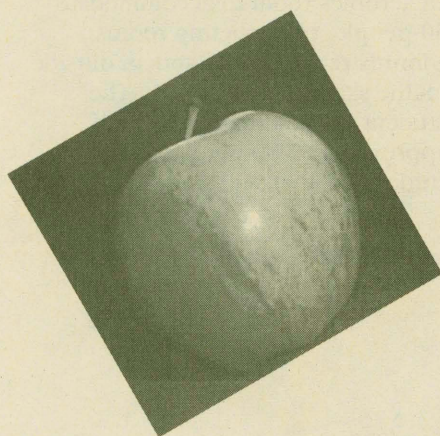
UNC's \$8 million, 80,000 square-foot student recreation center opened last December. It boasts of five gyms, a 6,000-square-foot space for cardiovascular machines like treadmills, stair step machines and weights, a one-tenth-mile indoor track, a climbing chamber, three racquetball courts and locker rooms. There's an aerobics room to accommodate 50 people, two meeting rooms, administrative offices and an outside, in-line skating hockey rink. The Student Representative Council approved a \$7.80 per credit hour student fee that will fund the center.

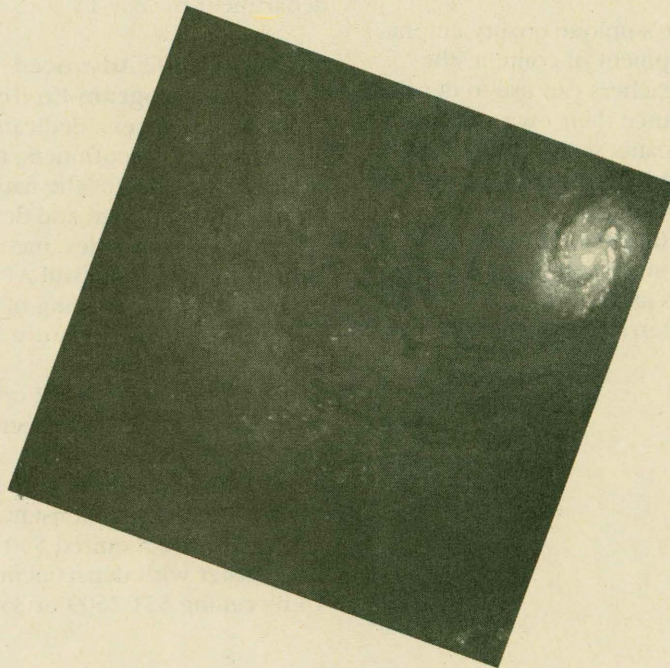

To transfer to UNC to earn a degree, you must first complete a UNC application and submit a transcript from each college you have attended. Transfer applicants who have completed less than 30 semester hours at other institutions also must submit a high school transcript and standardized test scores. Contact the Admissions Office for information and an application.

## Graduate Admission

(970) 351-2831 or 1-800-776-GRAD

To count any course credit toward a graduate degree at UNC, you must first be admitted to a graduate program. This admission is based upon an evaluation of your academic credentials by the Graduate School and the program faculty in your area of interest. Complete and submit the application packet available from the Graduate School, before you enroll in summer courses or immediately after.

In addition, contact the department that offers the degree program in which you are interested to determine if it has additional admissions criteria and procedures, degree requirements and/or special deadlines.

## Enrollment During Unclassified Admission Status

If you have applied for admission to a graduate degree program, but do not receive the Graduate Dean's certification of admission before your summer courses begin, you may enroll for graduate courses as an "unclassified (non-admitted) graduate student". However, if admission has not been granted by the time the course is completed, you must request permission from the program advisor and the Graduate School Dean to count such course credits in your graduate degree program once admitted. Only nine (9) semester hours of unclassified work can be transferred into a degree program. If you have not previously attended UNC, complete the Statistical Information form before or at registration.

For more information, consult the UNC Graduate Student Handbook, available at the UNC Bookstore, or call the Graduate School.

## Registration

(970) 351-2521

Do it early! Many summer courses are contingent upon sufficient enrollment. Register for your summer classes as early as possible to increase the likelihood of getting the class you want.

Course cancellations generally are announced on or before the first day of class, and efforts are made to notify you before the class starts.

You will receive your registration information (including the assigned registration time) in the mail if you were enrolled summer 1995 or spring 1996. Contact the Registration Center in the University Center if you do not receive registration information. You may select most classes by telephone, by mail, or in person at the Registration Center in the University Center; however, some types of registration can be done in person only.

Your registration is not complete until you pay tuition and fees.

## Four Ways To Register

### 1. By the Web

Connect via the World Wide Web, <http://community.univnorthco.edu/summer/index.html>, and select the registration option. Fill out the registration form and return to us online. If you have not attended UNC in the last 12 months, be sure to include the Student Information and the Certificate of Immunization forms.

**2. By Telephone.** You may register using the telephone registration system if you have received an assigned registration time. If you choose this method, you will be assessed a one-time-only summer semester fee of \$3. If you did not attend UNC during the last 12 months, first mail the completed Student Information and Certificate of Immunization forms to the Registration Center for processing before calling to register. Allow at least one week for the University to enter your information into the system. You may then register any time after April 29. (Use telephone registration worksheet before you call.)

**3. By Mail.** Complete and return the Course Selection by Mail form at least one week before the beginning of your first course. If you have not attended UNC in the last 12 months, be sure to include the Student Information and the Certificate of Immunization forms. Return your mail-in form as early as possible to the Registration Center to ensure enrollment in the courses you have chosen.

**4. In Person.** The Registration Center, second floor of the University Center, is open from 9am to 4pm on all regular working days.

Returning students from summer 1995 or spring 1996 may select courses at the Registration Center any time on or after your assigned registration date.

All students may register or make schedule changes beginning April 29.

At the Registration Center:

- Complete the Course Selection form included with the registration materials. Additional forms are available at the Registration Center.
- Take the completed form to the Registration Center staff who will enter your selections into the system. Be prepared to select other options in case your course selections are already full.
- Obtain the confirmation of your registration, which is printed immediately after you register, and check it for accuracy before you leave the Registration Center.
- Refer to the Costs section of this booklet for information on how to pay your bill and finalize your registration process. Refer to the back of this booklet for additional information about registration and forms. For more information, contact the Registration Center.

## Helpful Hints

- The instructor can grant permission to enroll in a restricted or closed class by using the touch-tone release process; however, you must register for the class yourself after the instructor releases it.
- Classes with the same ending and beginning times are considered "time conflicts" and you cannot register for them by phone. You will need to obtain and complete a Time Conflict form, available in the academic departments.
- If you register for a variable credit class and do not indicate the number of credits you want, your class will automatically default to the lowest possible number of credits.
- You can now print a copy of your class schedule at the Registration Center.
- Added classes and closed classes are listed on monitors located near the Registration Center.
- You can make schedule changes by completing an Add/Drop form found on the back of your Schedule Confirmation or at the Registration Center.

## Correspondence Courses

(Independent Study)  
(970) 351-2944

Set your own pace and choose the most convenient time and place to study. Not only can you enhance your skills, but you may be able to solve a scheduling problem or meet graduation requirements with this format. Independent study may be applied toward your college degree requirements if approved by your major advisor. See course listings in this bulletin.

## Course Audits

(970) 351-2521

You can register for audit (no credit) in a class by listing "0" credits on your Course Selection form or following the telephone registration instructions. You must select the audit option before the Add/Drop deadline. Tuition and fees are the same for credit or audit options.

You do not need to complete graded assignments or exams when you audit a course, but you are expected to attend classes. Successful completion of the course will result in assignment of a NC (no credit) grade.

## Course Load

- The maximum total course load for summer semester is 12 credits.
- You may take a maximum of nine (9) credits during either the First or Second 6-week Session (May 15-June 25 or June 26-Aug 9).
- You may take a maximum of twelve (12) credits during the 12-week Session (May 15-August 6) or the 13-week session (May 13-Aug 9).
- You must receive permission for an overload if you wish to take more than 12 credits during the entire summer. The Academic Advising Center can grant this permission for undergraduates. If you are a business major, permission is granted in the major department.

Graduate students can request exceptions, which are determined by their department, division, or school. Course load limitations apply to work completed in both on-campus and off-campus programs.

# 44 Summer Details

## Course Numbering

Courses numbered 100 to 499 are for undergraduate credit and those numbered 500 to 799 are for graduate credit. Undergraduates may not enroll in courses numbered 500-799 except juniors and seniors with cumulative grade point averages of 3.0 who may enroll in courses numbered 500. See UNC Bulletin for more detailed description.

## Course Restrictions

Registration restrictions placed on courses appear in the notes of the course description; several courses in this publication are restricted to certain groups of students. For further information regarding qualifications for a restricted class, contact the department or the instructor. If permission is granted, the instructor will use the touch-tone release system to open a space in the course, but afterward you must register for the class.

## English Essay Exam

Successful completion of the English Essay Exam is a graduation requirement for every student and may not be challenged or waived. Register for the exam by the first semester of your junior year at the Registration Center by 4pm on the Friday before the exam. To register, phone (970) 351-1576 or contact the Writing Center, Michener L173, (970) 351-2056.

## Faculty Drop

An instructor can drop a student from class if he or she does not attend the first two clock-hours of a class. Non-attendance will not automatically drop you, but if you cannot attend the first two hours of any class, it is advisable to contact the instructor before the class meets.

## Full-Time Enrollment

For financial aid and enrollment verification purposes, summer semester full-time enrollment is 9 credit hours for both undergraduate students and graduate students.

## Graduation

Commencement is scheduled for 9:30 am, Saturday, August 10. Application deadline dates for graduate students are May 17 (without a late fee) and June 28 (with a late fee). Application deadline date for undergraduates is June 3.

Students who participate in the ceremonies wear the appropriate attire, which may be rented at the UNC Bookstore.

If you are eligible, but plan not to participate in commencement, notify the Registrar (undergraduate) or Graduate School (graduate) at least two weeks before graduation.

## UNC and Aims Community College Cooperative Registration Agreement

If you will be enrolled for 12 on-campus credits and are paying full-time tuition at UNC or Aims Community College, you may be eligible to take one undergraduate class (maximum 5 credits) at the other school during the corresponding term without additional tuition charges.

You must meet prerequisite requirements and must pay any course fees other than tuition. Please refer to published transfer guides to determine courses which transfer between Aims and UNC. The free course at the host school must be one not offered at your home school during that corresponding term; equivalent course titles between institutions are listed on the course equivalency guide available at the

UNC Admissions Office or Aims Admissions Office. Continuing Education courses (including Directed Admissions Program courses) do not count in the 12 credit full-time requirement and cannot be taken as the free class.

Aims students register for UNC courses on the first class day at the UNC Registration Center in the University Center. UNC students register for Aims courses via normal procedures outlined in the Aims Schedule of Classes; however, in place of payment, the UNC student completes a certifying form at the Aims Cashier's Office. At the end of the term, students found to be ineligible will be billed for and must pay tuition charges to the host school.

## Immunization Proof

(970) 351-2412

Colorado law and State Health Department regulations require all students, undergraduate and graduate, enrolled in colleges and universities to submit proof of immunization. Students must submit the completed Certificate of Immunization or Statement of Exemption form to the Student Health Center before registration. If you are planning to register by mail, include your Immunization, Student Information, and Registration (Course Selection by Mail) forms in the packet for the Registration Center. These forms are in the back of this booklet.

If your proof of immunity is incomplete, contact the Student Health Center to sign an agreement to submit complete information within 30 days. You will not be allowed to register for the next term unless the agreement is satisfied, per Colorado State Statute.

A college student is defined by the State Board of Health as any student who is enrolled for one or more classes at a college or university and who is physically present at the institution. Students who are auditing classes are included, but students who are taking only correspondence or off-campus classes are not included.

## *In-State (Resident) Classification*

If you have been "domiciled" in Colorado for one year or more immediately preceding the first day of classes, you may be eligible for in-state tuition classification. A domicile is a "person's true, fixed and permanent home and place of habitation." It differs from the notion of residence or mere physical presence because a person may have only one true domicile at a given time. To establish a Colorado domicile, a person must be 21 years of age or emancipated.

Evidence that a Colorado domicile has been established includes meeting state requirements for a full one-year period for auto registration, driver's licensing, and payment of state income tax.

Active-duty Armed Forces personnel and their dependents stationed in Colorado on a permanent change-of-station basis may contact the Registrar's Office for information about qualifying for in-state tuition rates.

A student's tuition classification is determined before or at the time of registration. If, at a later date, you think that the tuition classification is no longer correct, you may obtain a petition to change your status from the Registrar's office, and complete and return it no later than the first day of classes for the given term.

## *Non-scheduled Courses*

Register for non-scheduled courses, such as practica, theses, internships and dissertations by completing the Non-scheduled Course form available through academic departments. Register for non-scheduled courses in person using course ID numbers 0727, 0728, and 0729.

## *PTE Courses and Screening*

Professional Teacher Education (PTE) is a set of experiences, requirements, courses and proficiency examinations applicable to all students seeking teacher licensure. Students wishing to enroll in PTE courses complete a screening process; some PTE courses may be taken concurrently with the screening process.

Students who have received a Colorado teaching certificate/license or who have completed an out-of-state teacher certification/licensure program and are eligible for Colorado licensure may be permitted to enroll in education courses without completing the full screening process. To register for PTE courses, contact the Office of Professional Services, McKee 103, (970) 351-2430.

## *Senior Citizens Audit*

(970) 351-2521

Senior citizen (over 60) may register for undergraduate lecture courses for no credit (audit) on a space-available basis, without paying tuition (program materials, lab and other fees will be paid by enrollee). Complete registration in person at the Registration Center, University Center.

## *Variable Credit Courses*

Some courses are available for a variable range of credit. To determine the number of credits you need for registration, check with the instructor. List the number of credits on your Course Selection form or follow the telephone registration instructions. You can make changes to variable credit courses until the Add/Drop deadlines.

## *Adding or Dropping Individual Courses*

(970) 351-2521

For instructions on Add/Drop procedures, refer to the telephone and/or in person registration instructions. You may add or drop individual classes during the Add/Drop period. For specific Add/Drop deadlines for short courses and workshops contact the Registration Center.

Appropriate changes in tuition, fees, and other charges will occur during the Add/Drop period. See calendar at the front of this bulletin for Add/Drop deadlines.

## *Withdrawing from Individual Courses*

(970) 351-2521

You may withdraw from individual classes beginning the first day of class until the mid-point of the class at the Registration Center. Instructor signatures are required for each class. The class will appear on transcripts as "W", a designation that will not affect your GPA. However, these classes remain calculated in your tuition and fees. You can initiate total withdrawal from all classes in person at the Dean of Students office. Please note, after classes begin, you will be charged a withdrawal fee for classes from which you withdraw even if you totally withdraw. To avoid this charge, you must withdraw from your classes BEFORE the session begins.

Besides tuition and fees, withdrawal may affect financial aid and enrollment verification status.

## Total Class Withdrawal

(970) 351-2796

Before the second class day of each session, a total withdrawal may be processed at the Registration Center. Beginning the second class day of each session, a withdrawal fee will be assessed if you completely withdraw from all of your classes. To avoid this charge, you must withdraw from your classes BEFORE the second day of class. Total withdrawals made after the session starts are processed at the Dean of Student's Office, Carter 3005.

## Costs

1. You, the student, (not a parent, guardian, spouse, agency of a foreign government, or other third party) are responsible for the payment of tuition, fees and other charges. You must either pay the full amount at the beginning of the summer semester, or pay one-third of the current summer term charges plus all prior term charges using the Payment Deferral Plan described below.

2. The University of Northern Colorado will not register a student, release a diploma, provide a transcript, or supply placement and other University services to any student or former student who has an outstanding financial obligation to the University other than a loan that is not yet due or on which payments are up to date. Failure to pay a financial obligation to the University when it is due may result in your account being placed with a collection agency and such action reported to a credit bureau. In addition, your account may be charged legal allowable collection charges and attorney fees to help secure repayment of the debt owed the University.

3. For financial purposes the three summer sessions are considered as one cumulative session. Therefore, tuition and fees are calculated on the total cumulative hours for which you are enrolled during the three terms.

4. All rates quoted in this booklet are approved by the Board of Trustees and are subject to change.

Your student fees and the University Technology fees are committed to support essential student activities and programs. You are required to pay these fees each term, whether or not you use activities and services underwritten by the fees.

You must register and pay tuition and fees to take a class for credit or to audit the class and receive no credit. For more information on auditing classes, see Registration, Course Audits. (Students taking only Independent Study or Off-Campus courses are not required to pay student technology, or recreation center fees.)

## Other Fees

In addition to general tuition and fees, a number of instructional and incidental fees have been established by the Provost and/or the Board of Trustees. Some courses have instructional fees approved in addition to tuition and are noted as "fee required" in their descriptions.

## Academic Program Fees

These fees apply to students in specific majors, only if you are enrolled in six (6) or more credit hours during a semester. In addition to specific course fees, these include:

- Business Major fee, \$20 per semester
- Business Minor fee, \$15 per semester
- Music Major fee, \$20 per semester

## Incidental Fees

Payment of all incidental and other fees may depend upon your student status-graduate or undergraduate, degree-seeking or summer-only, requesting services, etc. The required incidental fees include:

- Admission application \$30 under graduate and \$35 graduate
- Graduation \$20
- Undergraduate matriculation for new students \$60
- Foreign language examination required for the doctoral program \$10
- Graduate student continuous registration to allow student to remain in the program during periods of non-enrollment \$20

## Optional Incidental Fees

- **Alumni Association Fee \$1.50**  
Students may contribute \$1.50 to the Alumni Association as a voluntary option during registration. Contributions support scholarships and alumni programming for students.

- **CoPIRG \$4**

- Students may contribute \$4 to support the UNC chapter as a voluntary option during registration.

In the spring of 1991, students voted to re-certify the UNC chapter of the Colorado Public Interest Research Group (CoPIRG), to be funded by a \$4 waivable fee. CoPIRG is a statewide, student-directed, non-partisan, nonprofit organization that conducts research, advocacy, and public education on such issues as voter registration, air pollution, good government, tenant's rights, toxic waste, safe drinking water, and consumer protection. Other CoPIRG chapters operate at Colorado State University and Metropolitan State College. Students have the opportunity every 3-4 years to show their support for their CoPIRG chapter and fee through a general student election.

If you do not wish to support the UNC CoPIRG chapter, you may waive your CoPIRG fee at the time of initial registration or at the time you pay your bill.

## Other University Fees

- Each official academic transcript request: \$5
- To demonstrate oral English skills as a substitute for COMM 110: \$10
- To publish the abstract of a doctoral dissertation, assessed at the time the dissertation is accepted: \$65
- To bind and mail, within the United States, four copies of a thesis, practicum or dissertation study: \$60
- Towel/lock service in Butler-Hancock (include clean towel daily and use of locker and lock): \$12 per semester

- Replacement of University identification card: \$10
- Handling of check presented in payment of account that for any reason turns out to be non-negotiable \$20. Note that non-negotiable payment is the same as non-payment and may result in cancellation of your enrollment.
- Deferred Payment Agreement fee \$25 or \$50, based on balance

## Reduced Rate Tuition For Non-Residents

The University offers some special courses at a reduced rate tuition of \$123 per graduate credit hour for non-resident students. You will find these identified with stars (★) in the course listings in the front of the bulletin.

Full-time non-resident students (9-18 credit hours) who enroll in a combination of reduced rate and regular rate courses will be charged first for the reduced rate credits at \$123 per credit hour, then for additional credits at the regular non-resident rate. The maximum charge for tuition and fees is for nine (9) credit hours (the summer semester full-time load). Reduced rate credit hours count toward the full-time load for tuition. Please note that tuition and fees are calculated on the total cumulative hours (in all three summer sessions) for which you enroll.

For example, a graduate non-resident student enrolled in a three (3) credit reduced rate course and nine (9) credits in other courses receives the following net savings:

### Regular Tuition Rates

Enrolled for a total of 12 credit hours at regular rate  
Total cost = \$4295

### Reduced Tuition Rates

Enrolled for a total of 3 credit hours at reduced rate (3 x \$123) = \$369  
Enrolled for additional 9 credit hours in other courses

(non-resident graduate tuition assessed on only 6 credit hours)

(6 x \$477) = \$2862

Total cost = \$3231

**Net Tuition Savings = \$1064**

## When to Pay

After you register for classes, you will receive a Statement of Account by mail. The first billing (May 14) will be sent to both your current/local and home address while the second (June 18) and third (July 16) billings will be mailed to your current/local address only.

Your bill must be paid before 4pm on the above due date. Failure to have all charges paid by July 31 will result in the cancellation of your summer credits even if the classes have been completed.

## Where and How to Pay

Make payment at the Accounting Services windows in Carter Hall or by mail through one or a combination of the following methods:

- in full by cash, check, or credit card (VISA or MasterCard)
- through Financial Aid as approved by the Office of Student Financial Resources
- through the Payment Deferral Plan as described in this booklet
- through the CASE-UNC plan as described in this schedule

## Paying Late or In Part

If your account for past terms with UNC is current, you may use the Payment Deferral Plan.

- Pay one-third of the total summer term expenses (tuition, fees, and other charges) by 4pm, June 4.
- Pay the second one-third payment plus appropriate deferral fee by 4pm, July 8.
- Pay the final one-third by 4pm, July 31.

If any amount remains unpaid after the July 31 deadline, a late fee will be assessed and your registration for the current summer semester and future fall semester will be canceled.

If you decide to utilize the Payment Deferral Plan, you will be assessed the following deferral fees based on the amount deferred. If you do not pay your tuition, fees, and other charges on time, you will be assessed a late fee, based on the past due balance, as follows:

If your registration is canceled for non-payment, you may be eligible to re-register for an additional fee (see Paying for Re-registration below).

## CASE-UNC

The CASE-UNC (Credit Available for Student Employees program at UNC) allows students employed by the university to make arrangements through the Office of Student Employment in the Office of Student Financial Resources, Carter Hall to apply income as it is earned to tuition, fees and other charges from student employment other than federal work-study.

## Paying for Re-registration

July 31-August 9 only

If you do not pay your bill by July 31, your current summer semester schedule of classes and your future fall semester schedule of classes will be canceled. After paying your bill, you will be re-registered into the exact summer classes you were enrolled in at the time of cancellation. It is up to you to re-register for your fall classes. The fee to re-register for summer classes is \$100.00 for 9 or more credit hours and \$50.00 for less than 9 credit hours. Payment must be made to the Accounts Receivable Office, Carter Hall. You may re-register only through August 9.

## Consequences of Non-payment

If your classes are canceled for non-payment, 15 percent of the tuition and fee costs for those classes will be assessed.

In addition, any costs associated with the following must be paid: Arnie's charges, bookstore charges, deferral, graduation, health insurance, housing damages, ID card replacement, instructional fees, lab equipment not returned, late payments, library fines, lost athletic equipment, lost library books, matriculation, parking fines, phone features, short-check service charges, unpaid short-term loans and technology fees.

Assessments for students with room and board contracts are based upon rates, policies, and procedures explained in Residence Life contractual materials.

Certain federally funded financial aid programs mandate a different cancellation charge.

## Financial Aid

(970) 351-2502

The Office of Student Financial Resources administers several types of state and federal aid programs including grants, loans, employment, scholarships and veterans' benefits. However, funding for the summer semester historically has been limited to Federal Pell Grants and loans due to fiscal year-end expenditures. In all cases, students can be considered only if they have not reached their annual maximum limits by March 1.

You must submit the completed Summer Financial Aid Application available from the Office of Student Financial Resources. Other forms also may be required as described in the following information.

There are several funding options for summer term. You may apply for a loan for the first six week session, the second six week session or the full summer session. For the summer term only, all students (graduate and undergraduate) must be enrolled in at least 6 hours for each of the six or the full summer sessions to be considered for financial aid.

First six week session (May 15 to June 25), minimum 6 credit hours=graduate and undergraduate students eligible for loans. Undergraduate students with 6-9 credit hours eligible for Federal Pell Grant. The average Federal Pell Grant for summer 1995 was \$262.

Second six week session (June 26-August 6), minimum 6 credit hours=graduate and undergraduate students eligible for loans.

Full summer session, minimum 6 credit hours=graduate and undergraduate students eligible for loans.



## Required Forms

If you are a continuing student who received financial aid at UNC during the 1995-96 academic year and you will be attending during the Summer 96 term:

A summer Financial Aid Application can be obtained from the Office of Student Financial Resources, due on March 1. (If you have already filed a FAFSA form for the 1995-96 academic year, you will not need to complete another one for summer.)

If you are a new student beginning Summer 96:

Complete the 1995-96 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) which can be obtained from any college or university Financial Aid Office. The federal processor will accept the FAFSA until May 1, 1996. It takes approximately four to six weeks to be processed. **THE FEDERAL PROCESSOR WILL NOT ACCEPT FAFSA AFTER MAY 1, 1996.**

Complete the summer Financial Aid Application which can be obtained from the Office of Student Financial Resources.

If you are a continuing student but have not filed for financial aid:

Complete the 1995-96 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) which can be obtained from any college or university Financial Aid Office. The federal processor will accept the FAFSA until May 1, 1996. It takes approximately four to six weeks to be processed. The federal processor will not accept the FAFSA after May 1, 1996.

Complete the summer Financial Aid Application which can be obtained from the Office of Student Financial Resources.

If you accept a loan for summer, a loan application will be sent to you by the Colorado Student Loan Program (CSLP):

Federal Stafford (need-based) Loan for new and continuing students.

Federal Stafford (unsubsidized) Loan for new and continuing students.

Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students (PLUS)-for new and continuing undergraduates.

## Housing

Residence Life can provide you convenient, low-cost living and dining accommodations on campus, whether you will be attending a short term seminar, one of the summer sessions or staying at UNC for the entire summer.

If you are enrolling for a 6-week Session, make your request for undergraduate or graduate summer housing by writing to or calling the Residence Life office. Staff will return additional information and a contract that you complete, sign and return with a \$100 deposit. Charges for 6-week housing and meal services will appear on your University Statement of Account.

Undergraduates and Graduates may contract for room and board in a furnished West Campus Residence Hall. Six-week freshman students who live in the residence hall must carry the full meal plan which includes Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner, Monday through Sunday. All other students in the residence hall must carry the full meal plan or they may recontract for either Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner, Monday through Friday OR Lunch and Dinner, Monday through Sunday. Check the rates in the following Six-week Dining section.

Graduate or re-entry students (at least 25 years of age) can obtain housing in the West Campus Apartments, which are furnished and air-conditioned. Meal plans are available, but not required.

Students with families are eligible for accommodations in the West Campus Apartments or Students Family Apartments. The air-conditioned West Campus Apartments are furnished and have two bedrooms, a living area and a kitchenette. Student Family Apartments, located east of campus, have two bedrooms, a living room and kitchen. These year-round apartments fill quickly.

# 52 Telephone Registration Instructions

## Student ID Number

Your social security number is your student ID number unless you attended UNC before Fall 1971 or have been assigned a special number. If your student ID number is less than nine digits, enter zeros before it to make nine digits. After you enter your student ID number, wait for a voice response.

## Registration Number

The four-digit registration number appears with each course description. To insure that you enter the correct registration number, fill out the Registration Worksheet before you phone the system.

## To End Registration

The "8" key enters your class requests and leads to termination of your Telephone Registration session. Press this key after you have entered all transactions and wait for a voice response. If no classes are rejected, you will hear a list of your courses and fees, and the session will be terminated. If any of your classes are rejected, you will be returned to the add and drop functions. Your class schedule transactions are not final until this verification is completed.

Remember to always press "8" to finish your registration process.

## To Change Registration

After completing your initial registration, you may add and/or drop courses. Refer to the worksheet for more information. Students who wish to drop all of their classes must contact the Dean of Students office at (970) 351-2796, Carter 3005, to complete an exit interview.

## Optional Fees

Note that you will not be prompted for either the CoPIRG or Alumni Association fee request.

The CoPIRG fee can be waived only on your initial registration of the session. At that time if you do not wish to pay this fee, you must press the "9" key and wait for a voice response indicating that the fee has been waived.

You may contribute to the Alumni Association only on the initial registration of the semester. If you wish to pay the fee, enter 91 and wait for a voice response indicating that the fee has been applied to your bill.

## Cost to Register

A one-time-only summer semester fee of \$3 allows you to register for classes, change your schedule, obtain term grades, or obtain financial aid information by touch-tone telephone.

## Grades By Phone

12-week and second 6-week session grades will be available after 9 am on Friday, August 16. First 6-week session, short course, and workshop grades will be available as submitted.

Phone 351-2825 and enter service code 2 for grades, using your student information number (SIN), which is usually your birth month and date. Use two digits for month and date; precede a single digit number with a zero.

The system will give your grades for the current term or the date your grades will be available.

## Special Situations

- If you wish to audit a course, enter "0" (zero) and then the 4-digit registration number, and wait for a voice response. You will be charged tuition and student fees for audited courses.

- To register for variable credit courses, enter 1 and then the 4-digit registration number. Enter the desired number of credit hours in two digits (for example 01), and wait for a voice response.

- Time conflict courses, instructor-permission-only classes, and overloads cannot be added through the Telephone Registration System. These classes require you to have a special permit to enter them. You may obtain permit forms for schedule conflicts in the academic departments.

Restricted classes must be released by the instructor of record by using the touch tone release system.

## *Tuition and Fees*

Tuition is \$94 per credit hour. You may pay by MasterCard, VISA, check, money order or purchase order. The fee listed with tuition at the end of many course descriptions is for program delivery at locations close to you. Textbook costs and material fees are in addition to tuition and fees.

## *Class Times*

Dates listed by each course are the actual meeting times. Large projects and papers will be due approximately two weeks after the last day of class.

## *Class Location*

Specific class locations will be determined by the registration deadline listed in the course description. You will be notified of the exact class location with your registration confirmation.

## *Auditing a Course*

You may audit a course for no credit, by paying tuition and fees. Indicate "0" credit in the credit hours box on the registration form.

## *Financial Aid*

Assistance is available only to students enrolled in degree programs. For information including Veteran's benefits, contact the Office of Student Financial Resources at (970) 351-2502.

## *Out-of-State Teachers*

If you are seeking teacher licensure in Colorado, apply for your license with the Colorado Teacher Education and Certification Office, 201 East Colfax Avenue, Denver, Colorado 80203. Phone (303) 866-6623 for answers to your questions about evaluation of transcripts, experience, etc., and to determine if you are eligible for licensure in Colorado.

## *Course Withdrawal*

You may attend up to one-third of a course (defined as one-third of the total class contact hours of the scheduled course) and request a withdrawal with a partial refund. A withdrawal fee of \$12 per credit hour will be assessed. You may request a withdrawal with no refund if you attend more than one-third and up to one-half of the course. Withdrawals must be requested in writing.

## *Repeat a Course*

You may repeat a course prefix and class title for credit only when that fact is listed in the University of Northern Colorado Bulletin and only up to the maximum number of credits. When you take non-repeatable courses you will find credit hours are bracketed on your transcript and not included in the total credits. The grades for repeated courses are calculated into your grade point average. To verify your previous classes, check your grade report slips or request a current transcript.

## *Transcripts*

Send written request for official transcripts along with \$5 for each transcript requested to the Registrar-Records Office, University of Northern Colorado, Greeley, Colorado 80639. You may request that the transcript be held until your grades for this semester have been recorded.

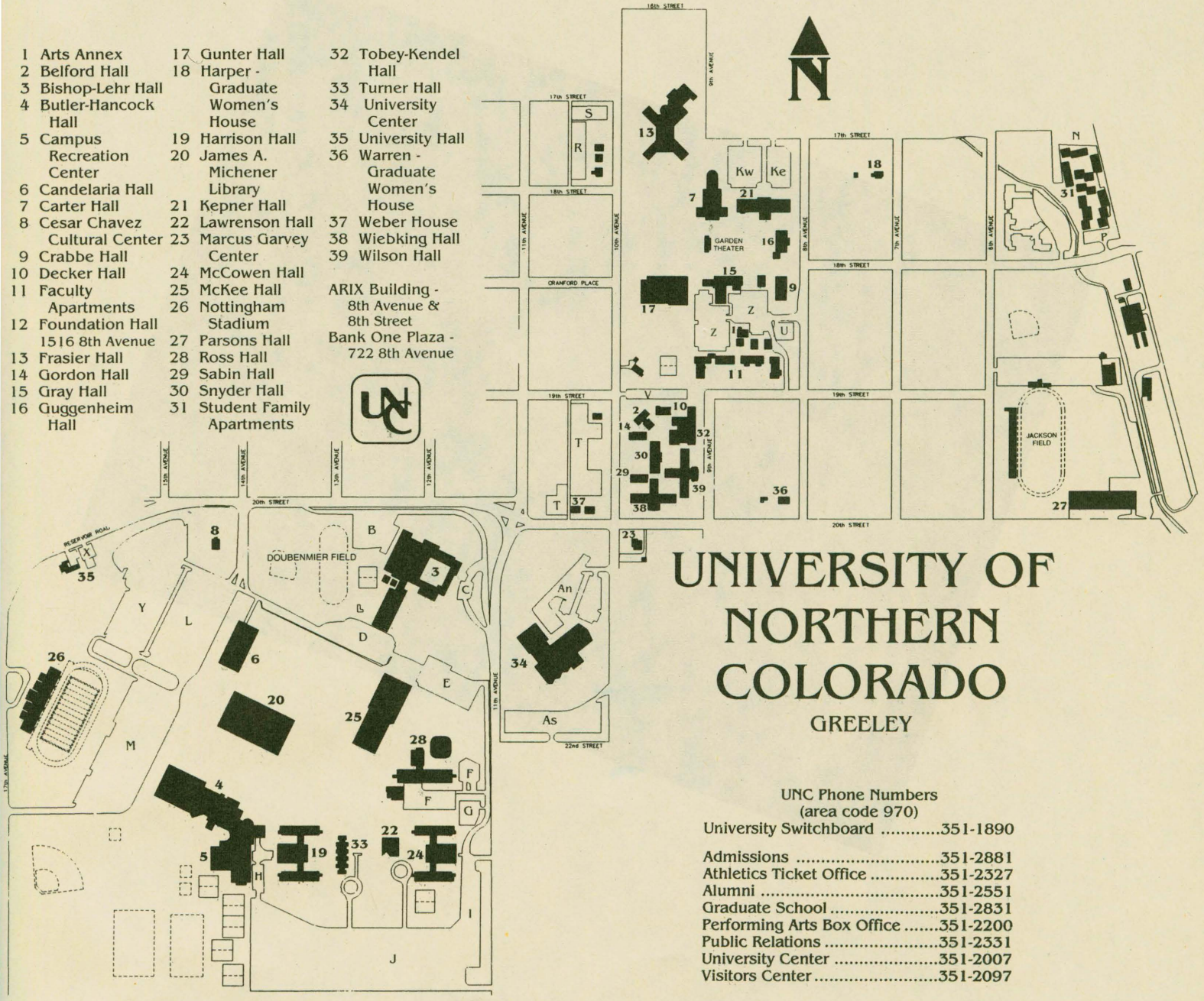

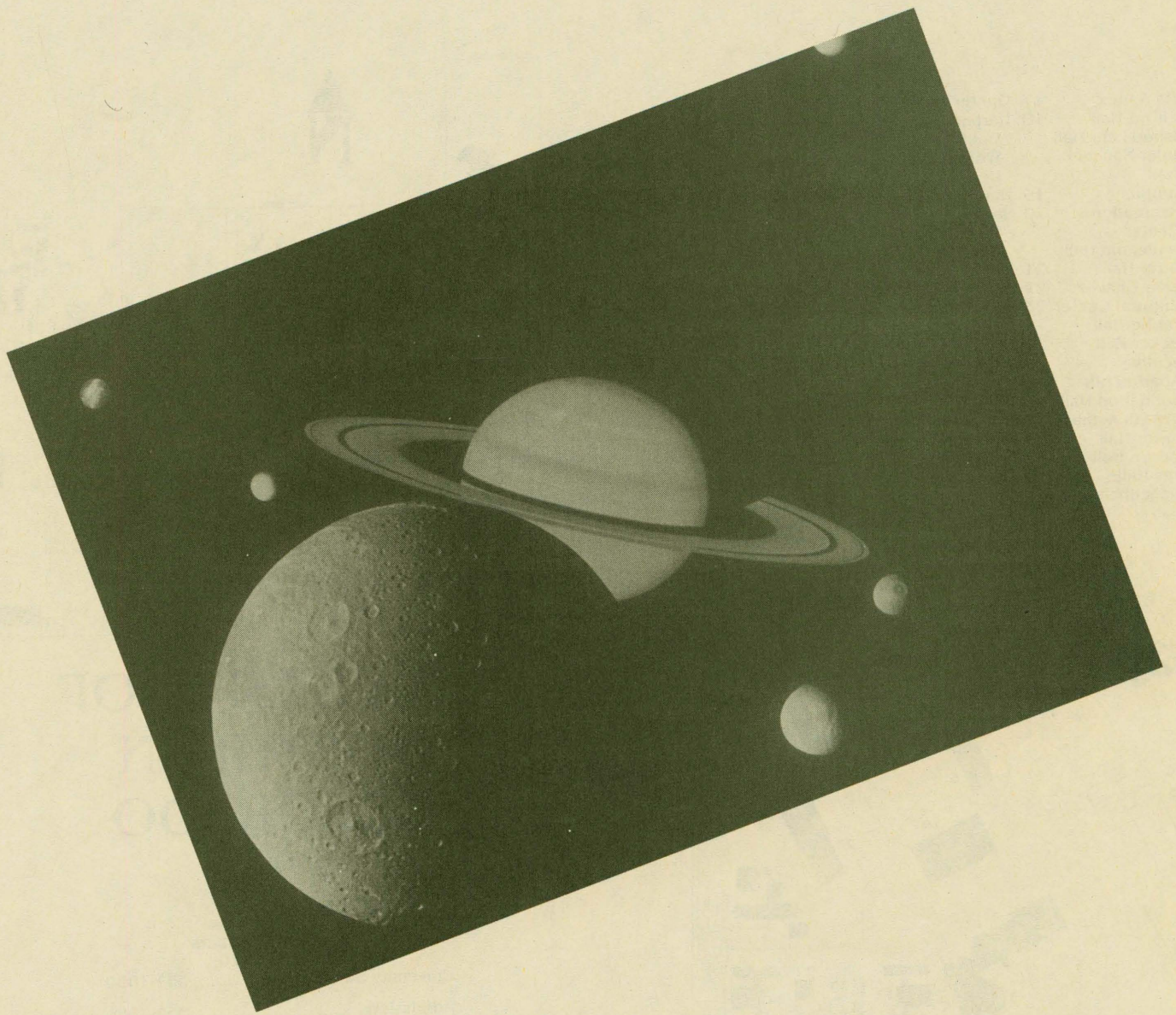


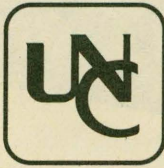

The University maintains an educational record for each student who is or has been enrolled at the University. In accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended (hereafter "Act"), the following student rights are covered by the Act and afforded to all eligible students at the University.

1. The right to inspect and review information contained in the student's educational records.
2. The right to request amendment of the contents of the student's educational records if believed to be inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy or other rights.
3. The right to prevent disclosure without consent, with certain exceptions, of personally identifiable information from the student's educational records.

Parents of dependent students as defined by Internal Revenue Code of 1954, Section 152 as amended are exceptions. All students under age 21 shall be assumed dependent unless the student notifies the Registrar's office in writing when they consider themselves to be of independent status of a student 21 years of age or older or one who has notified the Registrar's office of his/her independent status, a certified copy of the parent's most recent federal income tax form shall be required before any educational records or components thereof shall be released to the parents of the student.

4. The right to secure a copy of the University's policy.
5. The right to file complaints with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the University to comply with the provisions of the Act.

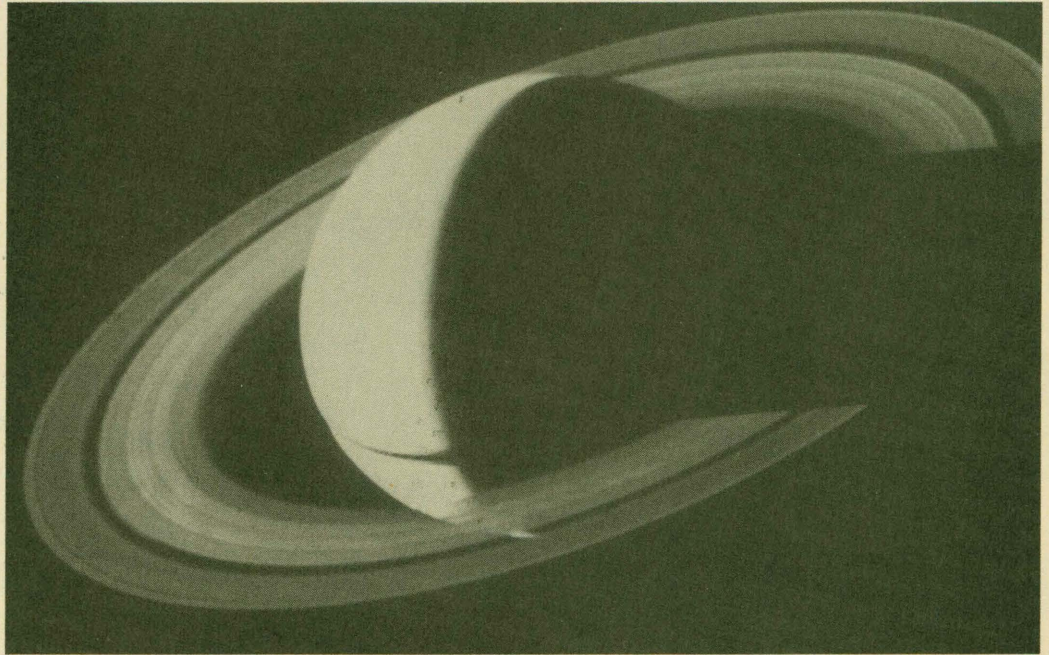
Each of these rights, with any limitations or exceptions, is explained in the University's policy statement, a copy of which may be obtained in the Registrar's office.

The items listed below are designated as Directory Information and may be released as to any student for any purpose at the discretion of the University unless a written request for nondisclosure is on file:

- Category I: Name, address, telephone number, dates of attendance, classification.
- Category II: Previous institution(s) attended, major field of study, awards, honors, degree(s) conferred, degrees pursued or being pursued.
- Category III: Past and present participation in officially recognized sports and activities, physical factors of athletes (height and weight), date and place of birth.

Current eligible students may prohibit general disclosure of this Directory Information by notifying the Registrar's office in writing, specifying the categories to be withheld, within 10 calendar days after the first scheduled class day of each term. The University will honor the request until the student notifies the Registrar's office in writing to allow the release of directory information. The student should carefully consider the consequences of any decision to withhold any category of Directory Information. Regardless of the effect upon a student, the University assumes no liability that may arise out of its compliance with a request that such information be withheld. It will be assumed that the failure on the part of a student to request the withholding of Directory Information indicates the student's consent to disclosure.

Any questions concerning the student's rights and responsibilities under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act should be referred to the Registrar's office.
